President's Youth Opportunity Tax Force During the past two summers we have been able to find, each summer, more than 1 million jobs for young people -- jobs that did not previously exist ... jobs enabling young people to stay in school ... to learn a trade ... to stay after of the streets and out of trouble. And almost all these jobs were provided by the private satisfactors.

We found 1 million new jobs, because we used our imagination and because leaders in communities all over the country recognized that their young people were far too valuable to go to waste or to become social dynamite in the streets.

But we must do better in the days ahead. We have to find more leaders, such as yourselves, who are willing to step forward for young people.

Quite obviously, we must do even better across-the-board in education, in counseling, in job training, in employment, and in the war on poverty.

What more can we do? well —

I believe we ought to look into using our schools

12 months a year. The school belong to the People!

I believe we ought to bring more educational and social services -- in trailers and trucks, if need be -- into our urban and rural slums. If the young people there can't get outside to knowledge and daylight, we should be quicker to reach inside the slum

I believe we should establish new youth centers -staffed and governed as much as possible by young people
themselves -- in the slums. These centers could offer
everything from arithmetic to bowling, from counseling
to electronics.

We now have under consideration, in the Executive

Branch of our government, a number of new proposals which

could add up to nothing less than a National Youth Development

Program.

As these proposals and ideas are refined, we intend to put them forward to the Congress for action

Yet any new programs that may be forthcoming will require more for their success than commitment of money or resources by the federal government ... by state or local government ... by business or labor or our educational institutions alone.

It will require the commitment of all working together, and the personal commitment of individual citizens such as yourselves.

Tonight, I would like to propose a new national Charter for American Youth -- a Charter with both rights and responsibilities.

Let us start with responsibilities. Our young people should aspire to meeting:

- -- The responsibility to live cleanly and honestly.
- -- The responsibility to be respectful of others.
- -- The responsibility to know this nation, its history, its promise, and its system of democratic government and free enterprise.
- -- The responsibility to make the most of their education and opportunity.
- -- The responsibility to observe and respect the law so that we may, as Lincoln said, "let reverence for the laws ... become the political religion of the nation."
- -- The responsibility -- and I emphasize this -- to share with others the burdens of national service. (And may I say here that the President and the Congress will soon propose measures which will help spread that responsibility of national service more equally.)

Yet, if we expect our young people to fulfill these responsibilities, we must equally insure each young person's rights:

- -- The right to personal dignity, irrespective of his condition of birth; his race, creed or color.
- -- The right to individuality, to be himself and find himself in his own way.
  - -- The right to education of quality.
- -- The right to rise in his chosen occupation to the limit of his ability.
- -- The right to speak, and be heard and, if what he says makes sense, to be heeded.
  - -- The right to a wholesome and decent neighborhood.
- -- The right to be a citizen in every sense of the word; the right to participate in what is happening in this country and in the world.

If we insure those rights . . . if we make it possible for our young people to meet their responsibilities, I believe we may one day achieve the promise that the author Thomas Wolfe -- writing 30 years ago -- saw lying in the distance far ahead. It is the promise that today is within our reach:

"To every many his chance, to every man, regardless of his birth, his shining, golden opportunity. To every man the right to live, to work, to be himself, and to become whatever things his manhood and his vision can combine to make him.

This ... is the promise of America."

"Good morning and my congratulations for coming to this Dawn Patrol Breakfast at such an early hour. There is no better reason for such an early gathering than one organized to further the program of scouting in the greater New York City counsels. I am particularly pleased to learn that today you honor a great friend of scouting, His Eminence, Francis Cardinal Spellman. May I share with you a few thoughts on what Scouting means to me."

### Suggested Text for Comments for Boy Scout Film:

"I regard the Scouting program to be a principal bulwark of our free society. The attitudes adopted early by young members will ultimately determine this nation's destiny. I believe in Scouting and what Scouting has done and is continuing to do to build better men and a better America.

"Here with me are five fine young men from New York City, products of today's Scouting. I would like you to meet them.

"These young men who have reached the rank of Eagle Scout know the fun and excitement that is Scouting. They know the obligations that they, as participating citizens, have to their home, their church, their school, and their community. I am proud of my association with the scouting program. As a young man, I had the privilege of serving as the Scout Master of a small troop in Doland, South Dakota. I consider this one of the finest experiences I have had. I commend you who work with Scouting, whether you work with a Cub Pack, a Scouting Troop, or an Explorer Post. Or those of you who raise money for Scouting, or conduct a training course, or pass a lad on a merit badge, or if you just support the program in your local community. You have the desire to be of service, you want to be involved with mankind and the shaping of a nation because, as you work with tomorrows leaders, you build and mold our country's future.

"I commend also the sponsors of Scouting throughout America. Those churches, schools, fraternal and civic groups, labor and industry who have opened their doors to the youth of this great land. Through the leadership of these groups, Scouting becomes real and alive in the life of a boy. The Scouting program is designed to help these sponsors to further their own mission in the community.

"Someone once said that the Boy Scout movement is the most talked about but least understood movement in the world. Most think about Scouting in terms of good turns to old people and a healthy program in the out-of-doors for boys; but Scouting is more. Richard and Robert here are both members of a unique new Scouting group called <u>Special Interest Exploring</u>. Dick, what is the purpose of this new Scouting Program?

(Richard Torrenzano, age 16, will respond briefly. FYI <u>Special</u> <u>Interest Exploring</u> is a program sponsored by corporations and business to expose a young man to his vocational interest at a relatively early age.)

"The ideals of Scouting are not changed and I pray that they never will. The Scout oath and law are standards which we can all use as guides in our daily lives. When a Scout repeats the Scout oath --

on his honor to do his best, to do his duty to God and his country, to obey the Scout law, to help other people at all times, and to keep himself physically strong, mentally awake, and morally straight ...

this is a guide for all Americans -- for people everywhere. Support Scouting in every way with your time, your talents, your money, and your heart and you will build a better America."

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
