ARRIVAL STATEMENT

BRUSSELS

Mr. Prime Minister:

Mrs. Humphrey and I wish to thank you for your generous and moving welcome.

Europe, are making to build a new and vital community within Europe.

A strong and independent Europe is the first necessity for a strong Atlantic Partnership. For our partnership, if it is to be real and effective, must be a partnership of equals -- not of junior and

senior partners.

I thank you, Mr. Prime Minister, for your kind words about myself. I will do my best while I am here to make clear the policies of my government. And I

look forward to the opportunity to hear from you, and the members of your government, the views and concerns ~~which~~ are so important to us.

When you say we are among friends,

we know that you are right. Belgium and America have always been friends and we shall always remain so.

Thank you, President Hallstein. Less than
two weeks ago you celebrated, and we celebrated,
the tenth anniversary of the Treaties of Rome.

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Those treaties have been important documents
in the life of Europe as they have been in the
life of America. We supported the formulation
of those treaties ten years ago. And we support
today the European unity which has flowed

from them.

The Communities you lead are the hope of
the future and the new generation in Europe.
This new generation, God willing, will not have
to live through the experiences of our

generation. It will be able to build on the firm
foundation you and your colleagues have built.

I wish this evening to make it crystal
clear: My government has supported, and will
continue to support, the constructive work of

European unity. And we shall continue to support the building of a strong and lasting Atlantic Partnership -- a partnership between equals able to meet their responsibilities and carry their burdens, each in his own way.

The unity you have built -- and the unity which is still to come -- have given strength to Western values and to the movement which is now under way toward ending the old wounds and divisions in Europe.

You have come a long way in ten years, and we have come a long way with you.

If we maintain our resolve, our determination, and our partnership, who is to say where the next ten years can lead?

Mr. President, I propose a toast to you, to your colleagues, and to the Atlantic Partnership which can be such a force in the world for security, for human well-being, and for peace.
