## Humphrey Greeted at Rally By 200 Antipoverty Aides

More than 200 poverty workers turned out to welcome Vice President Hubert Humphrey, at a rally outside the offices of a Philadelphia Antipoverty Action Committee community action council, in West Philadelphia.

They were there, one said, to shake the hand of "a man who has worked hard in the war on poverty."

What they didn't expect, some said later, was to have their greeting converted into a political rally by the presence of Mayor Tate and Sen. Joseph S. Clark (D-Pa), who accompanied Humphrey.

They were dismayed and surprised, they said, when Humphrey, speaking in front of the Poverty Area K office at 52d and Arch sts., praised Mayor Tate and spoke in support of his administration.

Federal regulations prohibit partisan political activity by paid antipoverty workers.

In addition to the Area K workers, almost the whole staff of the PAAC office, at 1316 Arch st., attended.

Miss Barbara L. Weems, act-

ing director of PAAC, was there. So was Samuel L. Evans, appointed by Mayor Tate to the original PAAC board and now vice chairman.

Miss Weems said the welcoming program was arranged in "about 24 hours." She said 13 delegate agencies operating poverty projects under PAAC were represented.

They included the Young Men's Christian Association, Opportunities Industrialization Center and the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Philadelphia.
