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BALTIMORE, Feb. 11--Following are excerpts from remarks by Senator Hubert H. Humphrey prepared for delivery before a Metropolitan Baltimore Council AFL-CIO COPE luncheon at the Lord Baltimore Hotel:

High unemployment in America is not an unalterable fact of life--despite what the Nixon Administration is attempting to tell the American public.

The Administration is trying to tell you that it's your fault that unemployment is high--that prices are high and that the American economy is in shambles.

Within the Nixon Administration, labor has lost a traditional and sympathetic advocate in the office of the Secretary of Labor. The Labor Department fights against the \$2 minimum wage, it tries to tamper with the Bureau of Labor Statistics reporting procedures. And the Labor Department has been the mouthpiece in an all out Administration attack on the unions of this nation.

The Secretary of Labor has lost the confidence of working people all across America.

I charge the Republican Administration with a failure to lead, with a lack of vision and purpose, with the failure to curb inflation, with a failure to stimulate production and with the tragic failure to put Americans back to work.

I refuse to believe that we are on the road to economic recovery as long as millions of American men and women are without jobs.

The only real way to help a man who is out of work is not to provide him with unemployment compensation, not to put him in an endless training program, not to put him on welfare but to give him a decent job.

2. Extend the coverage of unemployment benefits to farm employees, public employees, domestics and workers in small firms. These people are not protected today but make up an important and productive part of the American labor force.

3. Create new eligibility standards to assure equity and fairness in the system. People wait too long for the benefits. Benefits are sometimes arbitrarily reduced or cancelled. And pregnant women are often denied compensation.
