SUBJECT:

Address at the University of Wisconsin - March 16

Stevens Point.

Stevens Point is a town of approximately 11,000. The campus enrollment is about 8,000.

The students are quite unlike the ones encountered in Madison. Almost all of them come from towns under 1,000 population from the central Wisconsin area. They are more worried about jobs and education than campus disruptions and dropping out.

Stevens Point is a semi-industrialized area and has a strong labor movement and is in a Polish area. The area surrounding the town is small farm and dairy farm.

The speech is about young people beginning to get involved in the problems of rural and small-town America. We talk about national growth, urban-rural imbalance, and a need for greater opportunity in rural America. Our advance people tell us that this type of theme should go over well with the students.

IMPROVING THE QUALITY OF LIFE FOR MILLIONS OF AMERICANS

LIVING IN SMALL TOWNS AND ON FARMS TAKES RESOURCES -- NOT

PROMISES.

AND I DO NOT SEE TODAY TE COMMITMENT SE THE RESOURCES

FRAMENISTRATION JEAT SAYS IT CARES ABOUT THE FARMER,

THE WODVER AND THE STUDENT

AND I DO NOT SEE POSITIVE ACTION FROM AN ADMINISTRATION

VAT SAYS RURAL AMERICA MUST NOT BE EMPTLED OF PROMISE.

AGRICULTURE AS THE ESSENCE OF STREET OF STREET

PUPAL ANELGE IS IN TROUBLE TODAY AFFECTING COMMUNITIES AS

--A \$50 MILLION REDUCTION IN RURAL ENVIRONMENTAL

# PROTECTION ASSISTANCE

- --A DEEP CUT IN THE PROJECTED RATE FOR AREA AND DISTRICT
  DEVELOPMENT
- --A \$150 MILLION CUT IN LOANS FOR FARM AND EMERGENCY
  CREDIT

ALL OF THESE CUTBACKS SAY THE NEGLECT WILL CONTINUE AND THE LIFE OF THE PEOPLE IN CENTRAL WISCONSIN, MINNESOTA AND OTHER RURAL STATES WILL NOT IMPROVE.

WHEN RURAL AND SMALL TOWN AMERICA ARE NEGLECTED, THE ENTIRE NATION SUFFERS.

URBAN AMERICA CAN NO LONGER COPE WITH THE PRESSURE OF MILLIONS OF AMERICANS LEAVING FARMS AND SMALL TOWNS AND MOVING TO CITIES. SERVICES IN OUR CITIES ARE BREAKING DOWN, OUR URBAN ENVIRONMENT IS BADLY DETERIORATING AND THE QUALITY OF LIFE IS DECLINING FOR ALL.

SEVENTY-FIVE PERCENT OF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE ARE CROWDING ON TO 2 PERCENT OF THE LAND.

A QUESTION OF BALANCED NATIONAL GROWTH IS INVOLVED.

YET THE GOVERNMENT'S POLICIES AND PROGRAMS CONTINUE

TO FOSTER CONCENTRATIONS OF PEOPLE, JOBS AND RESOURCES IN

LARGE CITIES AND METROPOLITAN REGIONS OF THE NATION.

ALTHOUGH CLOSE TO 70 MILLION AMERICANS LIVE OUTSIDE
METROPOLITAN AREAS TODAY, THEY ARE BEING SHORT-CHANGED BY
ALMOST ALL FEDERAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS.

IF WE FAIL TO DO ANYTHING ABOUT THE IMBALANCE OF OUR GROWTH MORE THAN 50 PERCENT OF THE NATION'S POPULATION BY THE YEAR 2000 WILL BE LIVING ALONG THE UPPER ATLANTIC COAST, AROUND THE GREAT LAKES AND ALONG THE SOUTH CALIFORNIA COASTLINE.

THESE TRENDS AND THE PROBLEMS THEY CREATE ARE NOT INEVITABLE.

THEY CAN BE STOPPED. NOT BY A MASSIVE BACK-TO-THE-FARM MOVEMENT, BUT BY PROVIDING MORE JOB OPPORTUNITIES,

DECENT INCOMES, GOOD SCHOOLS, AND HOSPITALS IN RURAL AND

SMALL TOWN AMERICA.

BUT THESE THINGS ARE NOT A PRIVILEGE OF RURAL AMERICANS,
THEY ARE A RIGHT.

THE PROBLEMS OF STATES LIKE MINNESOTA AND WISCONSIN CAN
NO LONGER BE ISOLATED BECAUSE WHAT HAPPENS IN HIBBING OR
STEVENS POINT AFFECTS CHICAGO, MILWAUKEE AND MINNEAPOLIS,

IT IS NOT A LIBERAL ISSUE OR A CONSERVATIVE ISSUE. IT
IS NOT NORTHERN, SOUTHERN, MIDWESTERN OR WESTERN. IT IS THE
VERY LIFE OF OUR COUNTRY.

AND YOU HAVE TO BEGIN TO CARE. AND YOU MUST BEGIN
TO USE YOUR NEW-FOUND POLITICAL MUSCLE TO SEE THAT WE BEGIN
THE JOB OF MEETING THE NEEDS OF PEOPLE NO MATTER WHERE THEY
LIVE.
