THAN 2,000 LIGHTS WENT OUT FOREVER IN YOUR RURAL WISCONSIN

LAST YEAR, AS THEY HAVE EACH OF THE PAST FIVE YEARS. EACH

LIGHT EXTINGUISHED REPRESENTS A FAMILY FARMING OPERATION

THAT HAS PASSED FROM THE AMERICAN SCENE.

IN JUST THE PAST DECADE WISCONSIN HAS LOST NEARLY ONE FIFTH OF THE FAMILY FARMS. BUT THE PROBLEM ISN'T CONFINED TO WISCONSIN. THE SAME THING IS HAPPENING ALL ACROSS OUR NATION. IT ADDS UP TO AN APPALLING LOSS.
