Your Majesty, Governor Anderson, Judge Sletten, Dr. Mork, members and friends of the Sesquicentennial. As it happens, most Americans outside this room are celebrating Columbus Day today. You remember Christopher Columbus, Your Majesty -- he's the fellow they say discovered America. But I must say it's good to be here with the true believers -- we know who it was!

Some might dispute this, but of one thing we are certain: since October 9, 1825, every aspect of the American experience has been enhanced and enriched by the sons and daughters of Norway.

I want to congratulate Dr. Mork and the officers and members of the Sesquicentennial Association for their tireless efforts in preparing these programs. These days will live in the memory of our fellow Minnesotans for years to come. These celebrations will be especially meaningful to the children of our State, who have seen living history. It is they who bring continuity to life. And it is they who will carry on the traditions and the customs we have celebrated.

I was privileged to be among those Americans who traveled to Norway to celebrate the departure of the RESTAURATION three months ago. There on your soil, Your Majesty, we praised the contributions made by the Norwegian settlers and their descendants to the history and the development of our own Nation.

This evening, on this side of the Atlantic, we offer that praise once again, and we extend our gratitude for your presence in our City and in our State.

Some 3 million Americans look to Norway as their homeland. And it is appropriate that they celebrate the mutuality of our two histories.

I look upon America as a tapestry -- each thread with its own distinct, vivid color and texture -- and each woven creatively and lovingly into the larger pattern.

America truly is a land of immigrants. Almost every nation

America truly is a land of immigrants. Almost every nation on earth has given us her people, and with them part of her culture and tradition. No nation has given more of herself and more of her heritage than Norway. No nation has added more to the strength of our democratic institutions. And none has blessed our soil with more beauty, enlightenment, or sense of purpose.

These 150 years of U.S. and Norway friendship and cooperation have created a strong bond between our people and between our governments. That you have come this long way to share in our celebrations is further testament to the strength of that friendship. We thank you. We salute you.

And let us rededicate ourselves to the cooperation and friendship between Norway and America which have marked our first 150 years of association.
