Dear Senator Humphrey:

The selection committee of Labor's International Hall of Fame has asked me to invite you to attend the 1977 Induction Dinner as an honored guest.

The Induction Dinner will be held on Tuesday, November 1, 1977, at the Fairlane Manor, 19000 Hubbard Drive, Dearborn, Michigan. The Fairlane Manor is one of the new facilities in the Detroit area. It is within five minutes of the Hyatt Regency Hotel and the Dearborn Inn. Transportation from the hotels will be furnished by a number of the local unions in the Detroit area.

Dave McClung, President of Labor's International Hall of Fame and National Democratic Committee member has been a good friend of labor for many years. He is arranging for entertainment by a group from Hawaii. The Hawaiian entertainment at the last Labor Hall of Fame banquet was a great success. There will be a drawing at the dinner for two round trip tickets to Hawaii.

Federal Judge Don Miller, one of the famed Four Horsemen from Notre Dame and Creighton Miller, former attorney for the Professional Football Players Association helped us with procedures for selecting inductees. We are following the same procedures as the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame. When the Labor's Hall of Fame was formed, Judge Miller stated, "I think the idea is one of the greatest innovations in the history of the labor movement." The most forceable criticism to date is that the formation of Labor's International Hall of Fame was long overdue. The enclosed news publication will bring you up to date on Labor's Hall of Fame activities.

The method of selecting inductees into Labor's International Hall of Fame has not been taken lightly. Creighton Miller, All American Football player from Notre Dame and a recent inductee into Football's Hall of Fame, contacted Dick Gallagher of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio.

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Mr. Gallagher informed us that twenty-six sports writers in twenty-six franchised cities have one vote each year for nominees into the Hall of Fame. The ratings of various sports teams throughout the year are set by Associated Press and United Press International.

Labor writers and members of the news media are in good positions to evaluate who should be inducted into Labor's International Hall of Fame. The above method of selecting inductees is more meaningful because it has the participation of the news media, a source outside of the labor movement.

This year the following categories will be inducted into the Labor's International Hall of Fame.

Labor Leaders - George Meany
Category One: Prominent Labor Champions:
Persons living or deceased who have made a lasting contribution to the lives of working men and women.

Category Two: Unsung Labor Heroes:
The unsung heroes, those persons living or deceased, who, although not achieving national or international prominence, epitomize the ideals of the rank and file without wide spread recognition.

Category Three: Labor Leaders *from Labor Champions*
Persons living or deceased whose administrative ability, personal fortitude and courage has enabled them to assume effective leadership roles in the labor movement.

RE: Installation of HHH as a "champion of labor" in the Labor Hall of Fame at Dearborn, Michigan.

I mentioned to you earlier that Dave McClung, Democratic National Committeeman from Hawaii and former President of our State Senate, who is President of the Labor Hall of Fame, was interested in trying to get something on video tape of the Senator for this occasion the night of November 1st. I told him that a video tape would not be possible and the question then was whether either a telephone hookup or the less desirable alternative of an audio tape could be prepared. The occasion is an installation dinner to be held at the Fairleigh Manor located in Dearborn, Michigan, with the dinner scheduled to start at 8:00 PM. I am told some 12 to 20 international vice presidents are expected to be in attendance. In addition to installing Humphrey as a "champion of labor", Harry Truman will also be given that same designation and George W. Bush will be installed in the category of "Labor Leader".

If HHH decides to do an oral tape, it can be sent to Dave McClung at 18500 Grandriver Avenue, Detroit, Michigan 48223 or if it is last minute send addressed to him "held for arrival" to the Hyatt Regency in Dearborn, Michigan. If you decide to do a telephone hookup on the evening of the banquet, which I know would be preferred, give me a call and I will get a local contact for

you as Dave McClung will not be in Beartown until the 31st.



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
