PREFACE

The appended statement of accounts comprises the financial work of the Paris Depot of the American Fund for French Wounded from its commencement in November, 1914, until the thirty-first of December, 1916.

As the procedure of work in France is, of necessity, different from that which is pursued by the various committees of this society throughout America, we include in this statement a few points which may be of interest to those generous contributors who are responsible for the success of this Depot.

The Headquarters of the society are at 122, Madison Avenue, New-York, and the executive policy emanates from there. Supplies are sent from all over the United States and coming from the various committees pass through the hands of the officials at the Headquarters. The Paris Depot is also in receipt of independent contributions from individuals and organizations. All gifts are received and distributed by a force of volunteer workers in Paris, and are sent out in response to appeals from Hospitals throughout France.

The Policy of the Paris Depot has been to make the work personal, and in order to carry this out, small branches have been established in various centers in France. Among them Pau, Nice, Vichy, Chambéry, Brittany, etc. Each of our so-called branches is represented by a delegate from the Depot. She is accompanied by a chauffeuse with motor-car. They receive weekly consignments and establish a miniature Paris Depot. They visit the Hospitals within a wide radius, and from their stores supply immediate wants.

On the first visit, the motor-car is filled with the comfort bags, which have become an emblem of American sympathy, and this effects

a very happy entrance into the Hospital. Once there, we become the friends of the officials and of the *poilus*.

Where a great need is found in a large military Hospital of perhaps one thousand beds, the order is sent to Paris to be filled direct from the main depot.

In addition to the work of establishing small centers, we have distributed supplies, in response to letters, and these have been sent throughout the interior of France.

All orders which come by mail go first to the Hospital Department, and after being passed upon there, are sent to the warehouse, thence to the packing-room and dispatched immediately. Appeals that have come in the morning, have been filled and shipped the same afternoon. The faithful work that has been done in the Packing Department is worthy of the most unstinted praise.

All this entails a large amount of shipping which is carried on by volunteers, assisted by two territorials requisitioned for the purpose. In the last year 11,202 cases were received, and 11,110 cases dispatched. They were sent to 3,747 Hospitals. The majority of the cases from America are unpacked on arrival. We are so often asked the reason for this labor that we are very glad to state the whys and wherefores.

For example: Hospital X asks for blankets and pillows; another Hospital asks for chaises-longues, shirts and bed linen; a third may wish only surgical dressings and instruments; a fourth may ask for an apparatus for the operating room. As many cases from America contain mixed articles it would be poor economy to send these out, in a haphazard way. We dispatch therefore to each Hospital *only* such articles as it actually asks for. This eliminates all waste. Each bale leaving this Depot contains a letter saying from whom the articles come, and thus carries the word of sympathy direct from the donor in America to the wounded recipient in France.

A great feature of the work has been the motor service which has grown into a recognized unit, and is known throughout France. The cars are the gift of friends in America, many of whom send a monthly allowance for the maintenance of their cars. This amounts approximately to one hundred and twenty-five dollars per month per car. After one year's service, there is much wear and tear, and new cars are needed to maintain our standard of efficiency. The American Red Cross has helped in the support of these motors most liberally, sending us \$300.00 per month towards the running expenses.

The expenses of the Paris Depot are met by the executive offices in America. Aside from this generous support, checks more or less per-

sonal have been received and the committee in Paris, accordingly, established a "Discretionary Fund". This is drawn upon at various times when a sudden case of want is presented.

There are also various funds called "Instrument Fund", "Tuberculosis Fund", "Game Fund", "Tobacco Fund", etc., established in response to the personal wishes of the donors.

The average number of workers in connection with the Paris Depot is about 50. The only paid employees are the soldiers who do the manual labor of shifting cases, the women who clean, and three stenographers. We hope, before another year, to encourage American girls to take up this last important work, thereby reducing the expenses of the office.

During the summer of 1916, the American Fund for French Wounded became affiliated with the American Field Ambulance Service, and this cooperative work has been most effective in its results. The men who come from America to offer their services for such work in France are detained in Paris for a short time until necessary papers are secured. During this period, we find there are many of them willing to cooperate with our volunteers and they come to us daily, rendering useful service. On leaving for the front, they frequently load their cars with supplies from the Depot.

The Paris Depot wishes to express its thanks to the American Red Cross who has been unstinted in its generosity and most helpful in its attitude throughout the career of this society. We are also very grateful to various other organizations and individuals throughout the United States who have sent supplies independently. The gifts of the latter donors, we have distributed in the same personal way, and take pleasure in transmitting the thanks of the *poilus* to these generous donors in the same way we do to our own committees.

The officials of France have extended to us every courtesy and have made the work a pleasure. Monsieur Justin Godart, Sous-Secrétaire d'Etat du Service de Santé Militaire, who is much loved by the wounded men of France, has directed the work in a helpful way and has always expressed his personal interest in the part which the American woman is playing.

Until August 1916, the Paris Depot worked under difficult circumstances due to inadequate quarters, but through the generosity of a member of our Committee, we are now most comfortably installed in the Alcazar d'Eté, on the Champs-Élysées. We also have at our disposal the large theatre adjacent to our premises, and there we receive and dispatch the cases which come from America.

During the first week of our existence in France, we sent out 13 bales; during the last week of December, 1916, we sent out 472 bales and cases. The phenomenal growth of this organization is due to the generosity of the American woman who has labored unceasingly and has encouraged us through her example. The need in France is as potent today as it was two years ago. Hospital conditions are greatly improved. The French Government has met the situation in a manner which calls forth the praise of the entire civilized world. But the needs are still great, and are due to inability to manufacture necessary Hospital articles in France, the scarcity of wool, rubber, glass, etc. France has been asked to shoulder the burdens of a great part of the world struggle of today. She has met it heroically, and we beg the privilege of extending to her such help as we American women are proud to offer.
