Righteousness has just scored a wonderful victory in the Indian country of Northern Minnesota, thanks to the unyielding efforts of W. G. Calderwood. It has been my privilege to observe and study directly or indirectly the lives of most of our great living Americans. And it is very seldom that I have discovered a man who measures as big as Mr. Calderwood. Forgetting self, he has dedicated his great talents to the service of humanity. He seeks to make the streets safer, and his Flag a holier emblem of the genuine ends of government. In questions of right, virtue and duty he is unfailing. He chooses the right with invincible resolution, daring, if need be, to stand alone; seeking at all times to render life more safe and happy, futures more permanent and pure.

Mr. Calderwood, whom you probably know to be the Prohibition nominee for governor, has laid down his campaign temporarily and has gone to Washington to combat the efforts of the brewers to delay enforcement in the Indian country. This is done in our interest, without remuneration and it seems only fair that we should show our appreciation.

I do not know whether or not you agree with Mr. Calderwood in his political views. It does not concern me. I take it that you do agree that the liquor traffic ought to die. and the sooner the better. To that end I urge that we support Mr. Calderwood.

His record on this issue is consistent. Some other candidates, it is true, stand for county option, but that only means: "Let the people decide," and is not necessarily a mark of hostility toward the liquor traffic. Mr. Lee, who had me guessing for a while, when asked to take a stand for "State Wide Prohibition at the earliest practical date, " which was agreed on at the get-together convention of the temperance forces of Minnesota, very kindly yet very firmly declined. In all his years of residence in Long Prairie he has not raised a finger against the local saloon, which is hardly consistent with anything that even looks like hostility toward humanity's greatest foe.

After some discussion the motion was prevailed. Ajournment was taken at 2:50 P M Signed Allen Secretary.



REGULAR MEETING OF THE PROHIBITION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Headquarters, July 13, 1914.

The meeting was called to order by the Vice Chairman at 12:45 P. M. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The financial report of the previous week was read and referred to the Auditing Committee.

There were present Dr. Haggard and Messrs. Stromme, Morse, Dorsett, Thompson, Kalnes, Leffler, Morrow, Vroman, Sumstad and Allen.

After discussing the auto tours and speaking situation Mr. Stromme moved that Mr. Holden be notified to stop with the car at the first good shop he can reach after the Thursday meetings and have it completely repaired. Mr. Thompson seconded this motion and it carried. Mr. Stromme also moved that the Committee advise Mr. Morrow to try out the big car in his campaign for the next few weeks, leaving the detail of the matter with Mr. Morrow. The motion prevailed.

Mr. Morrow moved and Mr. Morse seconded it that the office force be allowed a half holiday on Saturday afternoons during the remainder of the summer.

Mr. Morse moved that the Committee authorize the getting out of two enrollment pledges for voters, one of these to be conditional upon the enrollment of a sufficiently large percentage of the voters of the state to carry our issue and elect our candidates. Also that our field men be instructed to invariably present the unconditional pledge first and resort to the use of the conditional blank only when it became necessary to get a man who "would vote our ticket if he were sure of having enough support to win". The motion prevailed.

Mr. Morrow moved that a financial appeal be made from this office to the temperance and prohibition people in the territory covered by the Indian Treaty and that the Secretary be instructed to frame a letter making such an appeal. This motion prevailed.

Mr. Kalnes moved that Mr. Leffler be elected to represent our Committee on the Legislative Committee of the Get-Together forces to take Mr. Calderwood's place. The motion prevailed.

Adjournment was taken at 2:30 o'clock P. M.

Dr. Maggard moved and Mrs. Taylor supported him that the Committee extend greeting to Miss Gratia Countryman . --- Miss Countryman having recently suffered injury in an automobile accident.

It was moved and carried that the office be instructed to order more stickers in red and blue.

Mr. Morse moved that the Committee proceed to launch the Hundred Thousand Conditional Enrollment Campaign. After considerable discussion pro and con this motion prevailed.

Mr. Dorsett moved that we have a publicity week later in the season. This carried. Mr. Kalnes moved that publicity week be the first week after the State Fair. This carried.

Mr. Dorsett reported that the Ford automobile could be repaired and put in very good condition with new casings for the front wheels at a cost of about \$45. Mr. Kalnes moved that the repairs be made as outlined by Mr. Dorsett and this motion prevailed.

Rev. Hare moved that a Committee be appointed to edit Mr. Calderwood's letter to Rudolph Lee and make such use of it as seemed wise in the interest of the campaign. The Chairman appointed Messrs. Kalnes, Leffler, Houland Halle

and Allen. Adjourned at 2:10 P. M.

Upon reconsideration the proposition failed to pass. Rev. Hare moved that the Committee make an aggressive propaganda campaign at the State Fair. This carried. Dr. Haggard moved that Mr. Kalnes go out on a trial trip to interview the leading Prohibitionists of the state. This carried.

Mr. Leffler was called on and reported on recent detective trips.

My information has it that you are a candidate for the legislature of our state with a very good chance of election. I am just an everyday citizen but I take it that we have common ground in being intensely interested in the general welfare of the people of Minnesota. I want to tell you too that from what I have learned of your record and present standing on the important issues of this campaign, you have my hearty endorsement and whatever support I am able to give.

The liquor issue seems to be getting the big end of political attention this year. I think it is high time that the Booze Barons were called a halt and I am mighty glad for the non-partisan legislative act which has made possible the alignment in one solid force of the Prohibition advocates in this state. Probably you know that 14 candidates for the House and Senate are making their fight for election in support of some form of advanced liquor legislation. To my personal knowledge 106 are already standing squarely for statewide Prohibition. I. for one, regard such a stand as not only statesmanlike but patriotic. If you are one of those men let me go a step farther and say that, to my mind, it is not only the only logical position for a man who opposes the liquor traffic but it is a stroke of political wisdom. The few candidates who are confining their declarations and allegiance to county option are really declaring themselves for nothing but that the people should govern themselves by counties on the liquor question, by states on all others. In the final classification these men may be either wet or dry as they believe their respective counties will vote under a county option law. The county optionist cannot expect to have the enthusiastic support of temperance people. If he has a conviction of what is right in the matter, he is not being governed by it, nor even by the expediency of a good politician who always bids for all that is in sight and only takes less when it becomes necessary to compromise.

The good people of Minnesota want absolute Prohibition infinitely worse than they want further compromise measures. I think that, with hardly an exception, the voter who will passively support a candidate who declares for county option on the liquor question will be enthusiastic in his support of the same candidate declaring for total Prohibition -- the only measure which, as he sees it, will in any way affect the breweries.




