





In Chairman Wells absence, Committeeman Fowble of St. Paul presided. There were present Messrs. Calderwood, Kalnes, Dorsett, Thompson, Morrow and Allen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The financial report of the week was read and referred to the auditing committee.

The matter of the Committee's banking was discussed and referred to Mr. Calderwood with power to act.

There was a somewhat lengthly discussion of the advisability of sending out a large number of letters to our people of the state urging them to bring pressure on their legislative representatives in favor of the Prohibition measure now before the Bensee and soon to be introduced in the House.

Mr. Stromme moved that the committee send out 2000 of such letters. Mr. Kalnes supported the motion and it passed.

Mr. Stromme reported on the St. Paul banquet and told of some difficulties in the way of settlement.

Mr. Kalnes moved that Messrs Calderwood and Stromme be empowered to settle with the Ryan management on a \$400 dollar basis or as their appears to them satisfactory. The motion carried.



MEETING OF THE PROHIBITION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. Headquarters, January 12, 1914. There were present: Chairman Calderwood and Messrs. Engle, Thompson, Dorsett and Wells of the Committee; Visiting Mr. R. M. Calderwood of Williston, North Dakota, a brother of the Chairman. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The financial report for the week ending January ninth was read and referred to the auditing committee. The chairman brought to the attention of the Committee the prospective congressional campaigns in Minnesota. Consideration of the action of the Party in the same was deferred until a later date. It is reported that the First Baptist Church could not be secured for a state conference on February the 12th. The Chairman announced that Dr. Ishkanian and himself had agreed tentatively on February the seventeenth and eighteenth as a proper date for the gathering. The Committeed by vote determined to suggest February twenty-fourth and twenty-fifth for the conference. The Chairman was authorized to name three persons who with himself should represent the Party on any committee of arrangements for the conference that may be constituted by the allied temperance forces. Adjourned. Secretary Pro Tem.

MEETING OF THE PROHIBITION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. Headquarters, January 5, 1914. There were present: Chairman Calderwood, and Messrs. Dorsett, thompson, Morse, Engle and Wells; Visiting, Geo. W. Harden and D. D. Lester and Rev. W. A. Rice. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The financial report for the week ending January 3 was read and referred to the auditing committee. A letter was read from Dr. Ishkanian of the Minnesota Temperance Union Association to Mr. Morse of the Committee regarding the ground to be covered in the program of the proposed conference of the temperance forces. After considerable discussion, Mr. Morse was authorized to report that the thought of the Committee was an informal discussion on methods of accomplishing the overthrow of the liquor traffic. The Chairman reported that it would be necessary for Prohibition candidates on the state ticket to receive 2,345 votes at the primaries in order that their names may be placed upon the official ballot. The Chairman was directed to communicate with the living brother of L. M. Stewart, lately deceased, regarding a contribution or bequest to the Committee. Adjourned. Secretary Pro Tem.



Roberts and Wells. Visiting, A. L. Markve. Rev. Stanley H. Roberts and E. E. Lobeck. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The financial report for the week ending March 21st was read and referred to the Auditing Committee. Mr. Engle read a copy of a letter which he had recently sent to Hon. W. E. The Chairman submitted a proposition from the publishers of Victory, the new Prohibition weekly continuing Clean Politics and the American Advance. Providing one thousand subscriptions can be secured among the several states, the Minnesota Committee will be furnished any number of copies desired at twenty cents a year and if ten thousand copies are taken be allowed two columns of space weekly or four columns bi-weekly for state matter. All subscriptions above ten thousand will be accepted at fifteen cents a year without entitling the state to more space. The matter was referred to a committee consisting of Messrs. Thompson, Haggard and Wells.

On the suggestion of the Chairman it was determined to arrange for scientific temperance and Prohibition party exhibits at county fairs, enlisting the aid of Christian Endeavor societies and similar organizations throughout the state in making the necessary arrangements therefor.

A motion was adopted approving Quincy Lee Morrow's plan of reaching the people in shops, mills and elsewhere with the understanding that the Committee be financially responsible in connection therewith to the same extent as at the present time for a sufficient period to test the results of the undertaking.

Mr. Markve submitted a plan for an advance man to collect the cost of running the Governor's Car at the places which it is proposed that it shall visit. The plan was adopted with the additional provision that a second advance man shall accompany the financial man to arrange dates and do such advertising as may then be practicable. Mr. Wells was made a committee to report a plan of propaganda for the Minnesota State Fiar. Also to communicate with the managers of the approaching suffrage parade, assuring them of our interest in the parade and inquiring whether it is desired that we shall take part as an organization. Ad journed.




