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- MEETING OF THE PROHIBITION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE -

Headquarters -
Tuesday June 1st, 1915.

There were present: Vice-Chairman Dr. Haggard, Mrs. Taylor and Messrs. Hare, Kalmes, Markve, Vroman and Stromme and visiting Messrs. Dahle, Kelly, Ditmanson and Male.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The financial report for the week ending May 29th was read and referred to the Auditing Committee.

The committee on Jitney bus, or sale of our large automobiles reported that no definite progress had been made, owing to the fact that the Committee had been pressed for time.

Mr. Dahle reported that a committee of young people, members of the Minnesota Young People's Citizenship Committee, held a meeting in St. Paul, and it had been unanimously voted to take up the dry fight in Ramsey County as well.

Mr. Kalmes was made a committee of one to make the necessary report to the daily and weekly papers of this city.

Mr. Markve reported that the Minnesota Young People's Citizenship Committee had decided to enter the fight for a dry Hennepin County, and that petitions had been printed and the work was progressing nicely.

After some discussion the Committee voted to endorse the action taken by the Minnesota Young People's Citizenship Committee, and to enter the fight with them for a dry Hennepin County at once.

The Chairman appointed a committee of three, namely: Messrs. Markve, Vroman and Stromme, to draft appropriate resolutions covering same, and the following is the committee's report:

Whereas the Prohibition party has always favored voting the saloons out of village, town, county, state and nation, and

Whereas, the state legislature of Minnesota in the 1915 Session gave to the people a law giving the counties an opportunity to vote their own County Prohibition, and

Whereas, the Prohibition State Committee immediately after the passage of this law resolved to bring on and assist in the campaigns throughout the state for making the counties Prohibition under this law, and


Whereas, we believe that the time is now ripe to for Hennepin County to bring on a special election under the provisions of this law for the purpose of voting for or against Prohibition,

We hereby do resolve that

The proper petitions be circulated immediately to bring on such election, and that every notary public in Hennepin County interested in this fight be, and is hereby requested, to secure signers to such petitions.

It was voted that blanks should be printed at once and men sent with the blanks to the various notaries and town clerks throughout this County outside of the City of Minneapolis.

It was moved and carried that we buy an Overland automobile from A. J. Hokanson of Copas, Minnesota; Mr. Hokanson to give this Committee his commission and \$75 in addition on the car and also to assist in raising the balance to pay for the car. In case of failure to raise the balance, Mr. Hokanson will take the car off our hands next fall. It was moved and carried that the automobile shall not be turned over to any of our workers before such workers shall have a reasonably thorough knowledge of running the car properly.

It was moved and carried that we authorize the sale of the old Sears motor car for \$50.

It was moved and carried that the office of secretary of this committee be declared vacant. Mr. W. A. Stromme was unanimously elected to fill the vacancy in the office of secretary of this committee.

It was moved and carried that in the absence of the Chairman of this committee, the secretary be the chief executive of the committee.

The question of the special election under the county option law for Hennepin and Ramsey counties was discussed but no action taken.

The motion adjourned until Wednesday, June 16th at 1:30 P. M.

SPECIAL MEETING OF THE PROHIBITION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Headquarters, June 15, 1915.

There were present: Chairman Wells, Mrs. Taylor and Messrs. Calderwood, Hare, Morrow, Markve, Thompson, Vroman and Stromme; visiting: Hinshaw, Leffler and Bradford.

Mr. Calderwood offered a motion that the Committee prepare and circulate an enrollment card in Hennepin County, the persons signing to be pledged first for a dry county and second, for a dry state and nation and so arrange that the latter part can be struck out if desired. After some discussion the matter was made a special order of business for Monday.

It was moved and carried that a committee of three be appointed on publicity, form of pledge and campaign plans. The chair appointed Messrs. Calderwood, Vroman and Hare.

National Chairman Hinshaw was called upon and gave a brief talk on the outlook of the reform throughout the nation, showing that a great many prominent politicians in other parties are looking toward the adoption of this reform in their own parties, joining with someone now advocating the total overthrow of the liquor traffic or building up a new party for that purpose.

On motion the Committee adjourned.

Report of Special Committee on the Hennepin County Dry Campaign with recommendations to State Committee.
W. G. Calderwood, Chairman, Howard Hare, and Frank P. Vroman.

Your committee in session at residence of W. G. Calderwood, present, Calderwood and Vroman, recommend the following items for action by the Prohibition State Committee.

1. Special Voters enrollment campaign with a double pledge, one part for the Hennepin County campaign and the other for a dry state and nation. This pledge to be same as adopted previously by the Young People's committee.

2. Suggested that one or more vacant store buildings be secured to be used for display of posters, exhibits etc.,

3. Special emphasis to be placed on the publicity department headed by Mr. Kalnes to answer pamphlets and material published by the opposition. Open columns of the newspapers to be kept full of material relative to the question. Suggested that some person interested clip from all of the daily papers of the Twin Cities articles bearing on the question. These to be furnished to Mr. Kalnes. Record to be kept of column inches of publicity matter in papers.

4. Recommend for consideration a $\frac{1}{2}$ sheet poster with some live argument thereon to make dry votes. Use of small tackers now in stock.

5. Special Hennepin County slides for Stereopticon lecture to be given wherever possible.

6. Co-operation with other organizations in any plan looking toward a dry county.

REGULAR MEETING OF THE PROHIBITION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Headquarters, June 21, 1915.

There were present: Chairman Wells, Mrs. Taylor and Messrs. Haggard, Calderwood, Hare, Morrow, Vroman, Thompson, Kalnes and Stromme; visiting: Messrs. Dahle, Peterson, Anderson, Gustafson, Armstrong and Davis.

The minutes of the regular and special meetings were read, corrected and approved.

No financial report being ready that part of the routine business was omitted.

Mr. Vroman as member of the special committee to present plans of campaign ^{and} form of dual enrollment blank, reported the finding of said Committee, namely that we should adopt a dual enrollment and plan of advertising on billboards. After some discussion this was made a special order of business for Monday, the 28th. On motion the report of the committee was accepted but the committee was ordered to continue further work. Mr. Calderwood was released from the committee and Messrs. Hare and Haggard were added thereto.

It was ordered that our stock of literature and tackers should be used here in the city and throughout the state as well and that our fieldmen should be supplied with them.

It seemed wise to the committee that Mr. Kalnes' line of work should be enlarged to include the answering of false statements of the newspapers in the state and that he should be furnished with clippings from the daily papers so that such work might be done to the best of advantage.

Messrs. Vroman and Dahle reported on the work being done in Ramsey county, showing that there was a possibility of a vote being taken in Ramsey county at the same time it is taken in Hennepin.

Mr. Calderwood reported that we now have about 40 college men in the field and as far as he could judge they were the best equipped of any college men ever sent out by this Committee. He further stated that in company with National Chairman Hinshaw he had inspected the hotels, auditoriums and equipment for entertaining the National Convention in 1916 in St. Paul, Minneapolis and the Fair Grounds and as far as can be seen now the leaning is strongly in favor of deciding on the Fair Grounds as the place to hold the convention. He also reported that in a conversation with Judge Windom of Duluth, the Judge informed him that he knew a man in his city who he thought might give a considerable sum of money for the purpose of sending "National Prohibition" to the people of Duluth.

On motion the Committee adjourned.

REGULAR MEETING OF THE PROHIBITION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Headquarters, June 28, 1915.

There were present: Messrs. Kalnes, Thompson, Dorsett, Hare, Markve and Stromme, Mr. Kalnes acting as temporary chairman; Visiting: Messrs. Anderson and Norton.

The minutes for the preceding meeting not having been written, the Secretary gave a synopsis of the business transacted.

The financial report for the two weeks preceding was read and referred to the Auditing Committee.

Mr. Stromme reported that one of the cylinders for Car No. 2 had been cracked and the welding company of this city are of the opinion that it cannot be welded. The price of a new cylinder is \$60 and transportation charges and after some discussion the committee gave instructions to buy a new cylinder as soon as practicable.

It was also reported that negotiations have been entered into with the Miller-Davis Company to trade the addressing machine which we have no particular use for for filing cases and other supplies which the office is in need of. After some discussion the trade was approved provided a better deal cannot be made with the Venango Printing Company and the Secretary was instructed to write Mr. Ferguson in regard to it.

The Burroughs Adding Machine Company reported that they are unable to fill the contract made with this committee to supply us with a second-hand machine at \$100 but that they can supply us with a larger and higher-grade machine for \$140 on the same terms, namely \$20 down and \$10 a month with six percent interest on deferred payments until paid for. The Committee authorized a contract to be made for the \$140 machine.

Mr. Markve who had taken the place of Mr. Vroman on the special committee reported favorably on the dual pledge for Hennepin and other counties voting on the saloon question and submitted the form attached hereto. They also recommended that the Young People's blanks be used in Hennepin county rather than the Prohibition State Committee's blanks. The committee asked for further time to submit the size and prices of the poster campaign. On motion their report was adopted and further time granted on the posters.

Since the regular meeting would come on July 5th, the day to be celebrated as Independence Day the next meeting was called for Tuesday, July 6th.

It was moved and carried that the Chairman be authorized to send an appeal over the state to hold conferences for the purpose of getting subscriptions for "National Prohibition".

The motion was made and unanimously carried that Mr. W. G. Calderwood be elected as a member of the Executive Committee.

MINUTES OF THE PROHIBITION
EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Headquarters July 19, 1915.

The following persons were present:

Vice-chairman Haggard, Messrs. Thompson, Markve, Kalnes, Vroman and Stromme.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved. The Financial report for week ending July 17 was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

It was moved and carried that the Weekly Financial Report show as near as possible the liabilities of the Committee instead of showing certain items but once a month as the custom has been heretofore.

It was moved and carried that the secretary be instructed to write the editor, Mr. Quist, of the "Sacred Heart Journal", a letter of appreciation of his paper and inviting him to become a member of the State Committee.

It was moved and carried that the Committee take advertising space in the Good Templers program to the amount of \$1.50.

At a conference held in the city of Chicago on Tuesday, July 13th at the LaSalle Hotel and meeting at the call of National Chairman Virgil G. Hinshaw a movement nationwide in its scope was inaugurated. This conference was attended by Frank P. Vroman and he reports as follows about the meeting. Meeting was called to order and opened with prayer. Mr. Ira Landrith was elected chairman. There were present, Ira Landrith, a democrat, a Mr. Curtis of New York, Attorney, and prominent Progressive, William Shaw, Boston, former republican, Daniel Poling, and a number of our own people.

Ira Landrith, in his opening talk as chairman expressed the conviction that the day had arrived for the vindication of the party philosophy, and he came clear across the line and stands committed to a dry nation ~~plans~~ a dry administration. Mr. Shaw told of his campaign in Massachusetts and said he had become convinced that a man could not do very effective fighting while straddling the fence. Mr. Curtis told of the leanings of the progressives toward Prohibition and prophesied that Theodore Roosevelt would take a stand on the right side of the question. He told of others who were committed to the Prohibition policy and suggested a coalition of the forces of the Progressive and Prohibition parties.

After considerable discussion a committee consisting of Hinshaw, Poling and Landrith was appointed to form a new nationwide organization to enroll 5,000,000 voters who will support only such party or parties which stand committed to state and nationwide prohibition. Mr. Poling made the motion which in effect would force all old party men to bolt their parties if these parties do not take a consistent stand out his issue.

A very old party man present commended in glowing terms the spirit of the Prohibition party and their willingness to sacrifice themselves if need be that the Cause might triumph.

The committee of three is to take steps immediately to enlist 100 of the biggest men of the land in the campaign. No publicity is to be given the movement until the first 100 men are signed up.

As Mr. Landrith said "history was being made" that will change the political map of this nation. All present were requested not to publish anything about the meeting and to keep the matter quiet until the committee of three shall first give the matter to the press.

On motion the meeting adjourned.

On motion Mr. Dorsett was made temporary Chairman. Messrs. Dahle and Anderson visitors.


Minutes of last meeting read and approved.
