Haggard, Thompson, Calderwood, Wells, Lobeck, Dorsett, Sheields and Mrs. Taylor visiting C. E. Price. The minutes of the preceding meeting were presented informally from notes taken at the previous meeting, the final copy not being prepared. A committee consisting of Messrs. Wells, Lobeck and Calderwood was elected to recommend a list of names to be elected by the Committee as delegates to the coming National Convention. The Executive Secretary presented his resignation as member of this committee to be effective beginning with February 18th, 1918, which was accepted, and a committee consisting of Messrs. Haggard, Wells and Lobeck was appointed to draft resolutions of appreciation for his service to the Committee. It was moved and ordered that the claims of Mr. Shields for \$200.00, balance due on services rendered prior to August 10th. 1911. be allowed on the books of the Committee. The matter of retaining the Northern Information Bureau in capacity of secret service agents for the Committee was informally discussed and left open for further action. The matter of employing Mr. H. E. Kerchner was informally discussed and upon proper motion was carried over until the next next meeting. It was moved and carried that Mr. Calderwood be requested to make a proposition to the Committee as to how much time, if any, he could give to carrying on the work as its executive. A committee consisting of Messes. Haggard. Thompson and Lobeck was appointed with authority to act in connection with the choosing of an executive. of the Committee. MINUTES OF MEETING OF PROHIBITION STATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE Feb. 12, 1918. Those present were Messrs, Haggard, Vroman, Calderwood, Dorsett, Thompson, Lobeck, Wells, Shields, and Mrs. Taylor. Senator Lobeck was elected Chairman pro tem. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The financial report of the preceding week was read, and supplemented by a complete report on the present standing of the Committee as shown by the report of the auditor who recently went over the accounts of the past few months and re-opened the books for the current year. The report was referred to the auditing committee under the rules. After an informal discussion of the financial situation the Committee on the selection of a chairman reported favorable to the selection of Mr. Calderwood, and upon motion he was elected Chairman. It was ordered that the best arrangement possible be made with presentoutlay the Northern Information Bureau for services, the cost to be not over \$100.a year. It was moved and ordered that a Committee be appointed to draft resolutions for presentation to Mr. H. H. Parish, concerning his recent bereavement upon the death of his wife. It was ordered that all field employees of the Committee be called to Headquarters for a conference of a few days. It was directed that the name of the Chairman be substituted for that of the Secretary on the Committee's checks. Upon proper motion the Committee adjourned John A. Shields, Secy.

MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTER MEETING. FEBRUARY 19. 1918. There were present Chairman W. G. Calderwood presiding. Mrs A. A. Taylor, C. W. Dorsett, E. E. Lobeck and Geo. F. Wells. The minutes of the last meeting were corrected, read and approved. Mr. Calderwood reported that we have paid the Northern Information Bureau \$100 for Service, not exceeding six months, with the understanding that the service will be extended to a year upon the further payment of \$100. Mr. Wells reported that invitations to serve as delegates to the approaching National Convention had been sent to the delegates and alternate delegates to the National Convention in St. Paul, and that a few favorable replies had been recieved. A motion was adopted to send flowers to Mrs. C.W. Dorsett with the love and best wishes of the Committee. Mr. Calderwood outlined a plan of picnin, work, the preliminary correspondence for which, is being conducted by Mr. Lobeck. Mr. Calderwood informed the Committee that he had suggested to Chairman Jones, of the Minnesota Dry Federation the weekly publication of a news bulletin, which shall be furnished free to the newspapers of the State. He said he has offered to supply Mr. Jones with such portion of the necessary matter as he should desire. The Chairman announced that the field men will be guests of mthe Committee at Minneapolis on the 22nd., and 23rd. insts., A conference or school of methods will be held with a view to increased efficiency during the year. The Chairman also announced that he had made a temporary loan of \$100 to the Minnesota Dry Federation: Meeting adjourned. Secretary Pro Dem.

MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING March 26. 1918 There were present Chairman W. G. Calderwood, presiding, Mesdmes A. A. Taylor and W. G. Calderwood, Rev. Stanley B. Roberts, F. P. Vroman, W. C. Thompson, C. W. Dorsett. E. E. Lobeck, Dr. Geo. D. Halfard and Geo. F. Wells. The minutes of the last preceding meeting were read and approved. The financial report was read and referred to the auditing committee under the rules. Chairman Calderwood reported that all but \$250 of enough to pay the last obligation of the Committee was in sight, and that he was making a special effort to accomplish this result on Saturday. He also stated that he had sent a series of three letters to the makers of several hundred old pledges, and that unusually encouraging results were being obtained. The Chairman reported that of the 30 members of the State Committee to whom had been submitted the referendum ordered by the Executive Sommittee, regarding the holding of a state convention, 26 had voted "I", one had declined to vote, and three had not been heard from. The Chairman gave the substance of the views of attorneys Yan Fos. n and Markvo as to the legal rights of the present Prohibition State Committee in case of a change in manofrom Prohibition Party to National Party at the approaching state convention. It was determined that the convention be held at the court house hall, if obtainable, and that arrangements should be made for a large rally on the evening of the convention in the interest of the state and rational amendments. Mesers. Wells, Haggard and Vroman were made a committies on hall and other details connected with the convention, with power to act. The fixing of the date of the convention being before the Committee, Mr. Thompson moved that the date be changed from April 9th to April 16th, in order to afford a more thorough study of the advisability of a charge of name of the party in Minnesota. The motion was defeated and April 9th was fixed as the date of the convention, opening at nine o'clock. The Committee named Frank P. Vroman for temporary chairman of the convention.

Mr. Calderwood gave some interesting facts connected with the work of the Minnesota Dry Federation.

He outlined his plan for outdoor work during the campaign as a signed to be by the Federation. About 60 picnics were held by us during last year. Mr, Lobeck is at work on plans for holding approximately three in each county, making a total of 258 picnics, of which 75 have already been signed up, and this with only one-third of the states covered so far.

It is planned to hold automobile street meetings in each of 904 caties and villages, a total ov 5116 such meetings. Our total in the campaign of 1913 was 798. The present plan is to man the automobiles with Homer L. Castle of Pennsylvania, J. Howard Kershner of Eansas, and H. H. Parish, one of our field men, and a fourth to be selected later. These auto batteries are planning to cover the state twice. It is planned that the third and fourth coverings of the territory shall be accomplished by local talent under the auspects of county chairmen, on Sundays September 22nd and Sunday October 13th, respectively. So far as it practicable it is intended that on these days where shall be a cavalcade; first of automobiles accompanied by instrumental music, second, one with vicel music, preferably a male quartet, and third, the Speakers.

The estimated cost of the street meetings is \$15660. The average cost of the meetings which use paid speakers and hired machines is estimated at \$7.80 each, or a total of \$12,854.40. An effort will be made to collect one-half of this amount in advance from a few of the larger givers at each point, the remainder being payable at the meeting.

# EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING MARCH 12. 1918.

There were present, Chairman W. G. Calderwood, E. E. Lobeck, Mrs.A. A. Taylor, F. P. CVroman, C. W. Dorsett, and Geo.F. Wells, Visiting: Chas. J. Hall.

The minutes of the last preceeding meeting were read and approved.

The financial reports for the last two weeks were read and referred to the auditors under the rules.

Messrs. Dorsett and Thompson were made a committee to reappraise the personal property of the committee. Mr. Calderwood made a brief report of the national convention at Chicago on the 5th and 6th insts., giving somewhat in detail the action taken by the convention in relation to the proposed merger withthe National Party, and the steps leading thereto.

It was ordered that, if approved by a referendum vote of themembers of the State Committee, a state convention shall be held in Minneapolis April 9th., to consider the change of the name of the prohibition Party in Minnesota to the National Party.

It was determined that the first quarterly number of the Minnesota Patriot be issued at once, that it shall be devoted cheifly to a report of the recent national conventions of the Prohibition Party and of the National Party and to the pending State and Federal amendments, and that an exrensive circulation of this issue shall be considered favorably. Adjourned.

#### MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING March 26. 1918 There were present Chairman W. G. Calderwood, presiding, Mesdmes A. A. Taylor and W. G. Calderwood, Rev. Stanley B. Roberts, F. P. Vroman, W. C. Thompson, C. W. Dorsett, E. H. Lobeck, Dr. Geo. D. Haggard and Geo. F. Wells. The minutes of the last preceding meeting were read and approved. The financial report was read and referred to the auditing committee under the rules. Chairman Calderwood reported that all but \$250 of enough to pay the last obligation of the Committee was in sight, and that he was making a special effort to accomplish this result on Saturday. He also stated that he had sent a series of three letters to the makers of several hundred old pledges, and that unusually encouraging results were being obtained. The Chairman reported that of the 30 members of the State Committee to whom had been submitted the referendum ordered by the Executive Committee, regarding the holding of a state convention. 26 had voted "Take one had declined to vote, and three had not been heard from. The Chairman gave the substance of the views of attorneys Van Fossen and Markve as to the legal rights of the present Prohibition State Committee in case of a change in namefrom Prohibition Barty to National Party at the approaching state convention. It was determined that the convention be held at the court house hall, if obtainable, and that arrangements should be made for a large rally on the evening of the convention in the interest of the state and mational amendments. Messrs. Wells, Haggard and Vroman were made a committee on hall and other details connected with the convention, with power to act. The fixing of the date of the convention being before the Committee, Mr. Thompson moved that the date be changed from April 9th to April 16th, in order to afford a more thorough study of the advisability of a change of name of the party in Minnesota. The motion was defeated and April 9th was fixed as the date of the convention, opening at nine o'clock. The Committee named Frank P. Vroman for temporary chairman of the convention.

Mr. Calderwood gave some interesting facts connected with the work of the Minnesota Dry Federation.

He outlined his plan for outdoor work during the campaign as assigned to us by the Federation. About 60 picnics were held by us during last year. Mr, Lobeck is at work on plans for holding approximately three in each county, making a total of 258 picnics, of which 75 have already been signed up, and this with only one-third of the states covered so far.

It is planned to hold automobile street meetings in each of 904 cities and villages, a total ov 31616 such meetings. Our total in the campaign of 1913 was 798. The present plan is to man the automobiles with Homer L. Castle of Pennsylvania, J. Howard Kershner of Kansas, and H. H. Parish, one of our field men, and a fourth to be selected later. These auto batteries are planning to cover the state twice. It is planned that the third and fourth coverings of the territory shall be accomplished by local talent under the auspices of county chairmen, on Sunday, September 22nd and Sunday October 13th, respectively. So far as it practicable it is intended that on these days there shall be a cavalcade; first of automobiles accompanied by instrumental music, second, one with vocal music, preferably a male quartet, and third, the speakers.

The estimated cost of the street meetings is \$15,660. The average cost of the meetings which use paid speakers and hired machines is estimated at \$7.80 each, or a total of \$12,854.40. An effort will be made to collect one-half of this amount in advance from \$ few of yhe larger givers at each point, the remainder being payable at the meeting.
