Mr. Calderwood was asked to report on the income and outgo of the campaign that his report might enter into the discussion. The report follows these minutes.

He stated that most of the items of the report were only estimates and in many cases very conservative. He also stated that the cost of the 50,000 enrollment plan would be at least \$700. and perhaps \$1000.

After some further informal discussion the motion was called for and unanimously carried, as follows:--

We recommend the adoption and application of Mr. Well's suggested plan of getting bonuses pledged to help secure subscriptions to Public Weal, and further urge the presenting as far as possible of the paper, at all meetings and through our field workers.

Mr. Gill was asked for his experience in the matter of presenting two different propositions at the same meeting. Mr. Gill stated that in general he had not found it successful.

After further informal discussion the report was adopted as read.

Secretary Calderwood then reported on a State Fair plan. He expressed his opinion that from \$1,000 to \$1,200 could be secured for the erection of a permanent building on the State Fair grounds from men who could not be approached on other propositions.

Moved and seconded that a Committee of three be appointed to take up this matter. Carried. Calderwood, Wells and Engle appointed.

Mr. Engle reported that Judge Dickinson had decided the law that requires candidates to pay filing fees to be constitutional, and that the Supreme Court would meet to consider the appeal on

**REPORT OF THE OUTLOOK OF THE FIELD.**

Oct. 1, 1906.

-0-

The legislative campaign has exceeded our estimates, both in its enthusiasm, its hopefulness and its size. We have thirty-nine men nominated, representing 31 districts, as follows:--

1st District, Houston county, T. R. Stewart. We have a strong committee in this district and a strong organization. The local Committee hopes to elect their man. My personal judgment is adverse.

4th District, Olmsted county, Bert Crowell. A fair organization and a strong candidate. The Committee hopes to make gains of from 500% to 800%.

7th District, Dodge County, L. A. Andrist. We have an exceptionally strong Committee here; good organization and a vigorous organizer. The district is small, consisting of only sixteen precincts. The Committee expects to elect. Personally I only dare hope.

8th District, Steele county, F. G. Sloan. A very strong candidate with very little organization and very little work done up to this time. I estimate gains of 200%.

9th District, Freeborn county, T. E. Noble leading candidate. Geo. L. Briggs running mate. The campaign is for Noble who lacked only 98 votes of election two years ago. Organization is strong active and thorough. The candidate is well and favorably known. They confidently expect to win. My judgement is that it is the most hopeful district in the entire state and that we will score.

11th District, Blue Earth county, Brooks Hitchings. Strong candidate making an exceptionally vigorous campaign. They are bringing a good organization into line and have a small fund. Mr. H. Ellis Linninger has been perfecting the organization. They hold meetings over the entire district and I believe they will carry part of the country. The big adverse majority in Mankato, however, seems to make election an impossibility. They seem to feel that they have a fair chance of election.

12th District, Faribault county, J. F. Damon. A very strong candidate. They have an active and vigorous Committee, a good fund and a good organizer, Mr. C. J. Weston. They are confident of election and the situation looks hopeful.

13th District, Martin and Watonwan counties, Burr D. Alton leading candidate. N. C. Sorensen running mate. They have been making a hard fight and the situation seems very hopeful to them. From this end election hardly seems probable but still quite possible. Mr. N. B. Eldridge has done some very effective organizing in this district.

14th District, Cottonwood and Jackson counties. This district is divided on county lines. F. M. Dyer candidate in Cottonwood county and C. M. Forman candidate in Jackson county. We have a good organizer, Mr. E. W. Savage, in Cottonwood county and a fair organization. Election is impossible but we will make large gains.

16th District, Rock and Pipestone counties, John Michelson. Conditions are favorable. A fairly vigorous fight is being made. We had a good fight two years ago and ought to make strong gains this year. We had an organizer, Mr. L. E. Fechner, in the territory during the earlier part of the season. Election cannot be hoped for.

18th District, Lac qui Parle and Chippewa counties, Chas. E. Lasher. This is a gerrymandered district with division on county lines. We have no candidate in Lac qui Parle county. We are making a splendid fight in Chippewa with a good organizer, Mr. A. G. Ronning. We have covered the district thoroughly with speaking and have a large number of enrolled voters. Our organizer and Mr. Woertendyke who has been speaking there both feel that we stand a splendid show of election. The county belongs in the hopeful column.

20th District, Nicolett county, John Lansing. The county is not yet organized but being a small territory and there being a good organizer on the field, Mr. Olaf J. Nelson, with a college near at hand, the Republican candidate rather distasteful to many Republicans, and there being no Democratic nominee, gives occasion for more hope than could be indulged under other circumstances. Mr. Lansing feels quite sure that hard work will put the county into the hopeful if not into the safe column. It seems to early in the fight however, to make predictions.

21st District, Sibley county, J. August Swanson. There has been little organization in this county but much activity in the western part. A hard fight is now being made, \$200 having been raised for the purpose and the field begins to look hopeful under the aggressive work of Mr. Gill who is assisting the local Committee. It is rather too much to presume that we can elect in the county where sentiment is as strong against Prohibition as it is in the eastern part.

22nd District, Renville county, A. G. Gjevere. Conditions in this county make the fight very difficult but there can be no doubt but that we will make great gains and possibly land our man. The organization is fairly good. A. L. Markve, the Congressional district organizer, is devoting most of his time to this county. He is making a vigorous fight.

24th District, McLeod county, M. C. Madsen. This is the county in which two years ago we failed to elect by but thirty-one votes. Mr. Madsen is a very popular candidate, well known throughout the county and is making a hard fight. J. R. Julien, the organizer is intelligent and vigorous although not very sanguine. It would look like one of the winning counties.

25th District, Carver county. One man to be elected. Albert Gerdson. This county has been considered exceptionally hard territory and little work has been done until this year. Local interest has been greatly aroused by the activity of Mr. Peterson, Mr. Gerdson our present candidate, and others. While the organization is not complete we will make great gains.

27th District, Le Sueur County. There are two members of the lower house and one senator to be elected and we have nominees for all places as follows:- F. F. Marzahn, for senate, Fred C. Dressel and C. T. Barker for the lower house. Mr. E. L. Bost made one of the most effective campaigns in the history of the party during the early part of the canvass but was called home and the territory is now without an organizer. However the candidates are making a vigorous fight and our gains will be gratifying.

29th District, Goodhue county. This county is gerrymandered into three legislative districts. We have a nominee, Geo. H. Voxland, in the west district and are putting up a fierce fight for his election with C. A. Palmer as organizer. Mr. Palmer has conducted an exceptionally capable newspaper campaign. Mr. Voxland has personal friends everywhere throughout the county. We have the opposition there of the Republican party and the present outlook for election seems very hopeful to the local committee. From this office it looks like a fighting chance to elect.

30th District, Dakota county. There is one representative to be elected from this district and our nominee is C. W. Curry. The district contains a large percentage of foreign population which is segregated and therefore hard to reach. The organization is very weak and incomplete, and, while we have some of the best local workers in the state in the county, the above conditions make the contest hard and unequal. The local committee entertains hopes of election. These hopes do not seem to me to be well founded. I shall be gratified if we make gains of 40% or 60%.

33rd District, This is the 1st and 2nd wards of St. Paul, and we only have a nomination for senate against W. W. Dunn who is the attorney for the Hamm Brewing Co. and was last year chairman of the temperance committee in the senate. Our nominee is Jorgen Nelson and we will make a fairly aggressive fight although not a hopeful one.

37th District, 10th ward and parts of the 11th and 8th wards and all the country district of St. Paul. This district elects two men to the lower house and we have nominated one, Mr. Noltemier. We are putting up a vigorous fight, organizing the territory thoroughly, making splendid use of the four college institutions in the district and have an organizer, Mr. G. Q. Page, devoting his whole time to the campaign. Our men are hopeful although they recognize that the fight is a hard one.

29th District, 2nd and 9th wards of Minneapolis and the town of St. Anthony. Two men to be elected. W. G. Calderwood

is our candidate with Mr. Northfield as running mate. In this district last year with the same candidate we run the vote up nearly 1000%. The organization is probably the most thorough of any district in the state barring Freeborn county, and a vigorous fight will be made. Mr. Donald Babcock has devoted the summer months to organization and work and the committee entertains strong hopes of election in which this office, (Possibly influenced by personal consideration) joins. Without a hard fight, however, we will fail.

40th District, 4th ward of Minneapolis. Two men to be elected, our nominee is W. C. Thompson. No very vigorous fight will be made for election in this district. The Anti saloon League will back Mr. Thompson. Our vote, I believe, will double over last election.

42nd District, 7th, 11th and 12th wards and south part of the county. Two men to be elected. Donald McKenzie is our nominee with Mr. Lilengren as running mate. Organization is fairly strong. Mr. Harold B. Grozier a strong organizer is devoting his whole time to the effort. The outlook is certainly hopeful. Our friends believe that we are next to positive of election. The Anti Saloon League will back Mr. McKenzie.

43rd District, 8th and 13th wards and western part of the county. Two men to be elected. Our nominees are F. H. Mellen and W. L. Gardner. Our organization is fairly strong and a vigorous committee is pushing the campaign. While the district is not considered as hopeful as other fields the sentiment there is so strong along reform lines that they are not without hope.

44th District, part of the 3rd and 10th wards and northern part of the county. Two men to be elected. We have our state chairman in nomination with conditions which make the possibility of his election favorable. A very strong and active committee is thoroughly organizing and canvassing the territory and help is coming from nearly every quarter.

51st District, Cook, Lake and part of St. Louis counties. Two men to be elected. We have in nomination Frank Fulton. The feeling is strong that Mr. Fulton will make an unusual run. Our organization there is only in fair conditions but we have some loyal, faithful and active friends and Mr. Fulton is strong and popular. The local committee entertains hopes of election for which there hardly seems to be adequate foundation.

53rd District, comprising Hubbard, Todd and Wadena counties made nomination but the nomination papers were received too late and were refused on the technicality.

56th District, BigStone and Swift counties. One representative to be elected. Our nominee is C. W. Wheeler. Mr. Squire is devoting his entire time to the district with one or two helpers and he insists that there is little question of our winning out. That this territory is in the hopeful column is largely due to Mr. Squire's activity and while, from this distance it seems that enthusiasm somewhat overpowers his judgement still the district is hopeful.

58th District, Douglas and Pipestone counties. Douglas elects representative alone. There is one man to be elected. Our nominee is E. E. Lobeck one of the strongest campaigners in the northwest. He is fighting with the active support of the Anti Saloon League to score a victory against an unworthy Republican. The district seems to be among the very most hopeful. We have no organizer in this field but the Anti Saloon League will keep Mr. Youngdahl, their field man, in that territory for a considerable part of the campaign.

59th District, Otter Tail county. Four men to be elected. We have two nominees, Halver Thompson and E. W. Leeper. This District which a year ago seemed to be the most hopeful of any in the state has been given especial attention both by the state committee and by the local committee, Mr. Rice spending the major part of his time in that field. At this writing it hardly seems hopeful. If we win it will be largely a matter of chance.

61st District, This is a gerrymandered district, Norman county electing one man. Our nominee is H. A. Rask, a strong and capable candidate. Our men are putting up a vigorous fight organizing the territory thoroughly and feel hopeful. Active operations did not begin until late in the campaign and the outlook from this office is not especially sanguine.

63rd District, Marshall Kittson and Rosseau counties. Two men to be elected. Our nominees are Adolph S. Rokke. Our organization is but slight but conditions are favorable and our vote will show great gains. Our friends dare to hope for election but it hardly seems that the hope will be realized.

We are conducting one other notable campaign in Kandiyohi county for the election of Peter Bonde for sheriff. This county is almost wholly dry and would undoubtedly vote the last saloon out if the people could be assured of the enforcement of law. Mr. Bonde is backed by a splendid record of law enforcement. The fight for him will be desperate and I believe successful. The county consists largely of Scandinavians of the best class.



THE PLAN OF CAMPAIGN FOR 1907-8

Submitted by the State Secretary to the meeting of the State Committee  
Dec. 17, 1906.  
-----o-----

The campaign of 1906 has divided the territory of the state, roughly speaking, into three divisions. First, Active and organized territory which comprehends only those congressional districts over which there is appointed a congressional organizer under the college movement. Second, Active but unorganized territory which includes the territory where we have a considerable number of active and aggressive workers and where we might expect, with encouragement, to nominate and campaign for legislative nominees. This territory would clearly include some legislative districts where we conducted such campaign during the past. Third, Missionary fields.

The plan of the campaign should be centralized during the coming two years with still added accent on the legislative fight which has given us such phenomenal success since its adoption four years ago, and which seems to hold out unusually fair promise for the future. In other words, the objective still ought to be the legislature, and every effort of the campaign ought particularly to be centered on the legislative proposition. However, in the 3rd, 7th and 9th Congressional districts and if it is possible to get a reasonable organization in any of the others we ought to put up a fairly stiff fight for Congress with the hope of running up a Congressional vote that will justify us in the war cry which was started a year ago, "Congress in 1910." In this particular it might be remarked that the 1st and 2nd districts are also hopeful territory for a fight of this kind and the 5th district could easily be put in condition for a far more aggressive Congressional contest

than we have ever waged. Congressional fights might also be conducted in the 4th and the 8th districts which would give us a sweep of the whole state on the Congressional fight barring only the 6th district. This, of course, might open up.

The Order of Battle

All work done in the 3rd, 7th and 9th districts should be in conjunction with an according to the plans laid by the Congressional organizers, each of whom has a problem before him of getting the greatest possible results in 1908 out of his district. The chief help that we would need to give in each of these three districts would be a capable speaker who would be able to attract audiences and get results in funds and support from them. The purpose and plan in these congressional districts is that the Congressional district organizer should raise sufficient funds throughout his district to enable him to employ trained and capable college men to "gum shoe" the territory district by district and county by county, strengthening our organization, finding our friends and making new ones. In the prosecution of this work the enrollment cards should be used extensively.

For the second class of territory we should have a strong platform man who is also a capable result getter to visit all of the larger towns and villages where we have any considerable support. In connection with his work there ought to be some county and district conventions held in order that we might reap immediate results in organization, but his work should be supplemented by a strong organizer of some platform ability who should cover the smaller towns and country districts and build up those places which were not sufficiently developed now to support the work of the more expensive speakers. The Intercollegiate Prohibition Association propose that they leave the work among Minnesota Colleges to the Minnesota State Committee, which shall go ahead and raise funds along the plan already followed for Congressional District Organizers.

That the State Committee guarantee to the I.P.A. that a representative or representatives of the State Committee college work will work among the colleges at least two months of every year under the I.P.A., but primarily for the benefit of the state work in the securing of men for the Campaign field work, the I.P.A. charging for their services one hundred "Statesmen" subscriptions among the colleges.


The Banquet held as above, broke all records from every point of view - attendance, general interest, and amount of money raised. As nearly as we have been able to compute, the attendance was 520. The money pledged, most of it covering two years, was \$5489.83.

The addresses made by the speakers outside of party lines were all of them full of courage, and were hearty in their appreciation of the efforts put forth by the Prohibition party. There was every indication that not only the speakers but those of their hearers who were not allied with the organization, were looking kindly towards us with at least a hope that our successes might be such as to justify their uniting with us. It cannot be doubted that votes were made at the gathering.

Report of Secretary to the Executive Committee on plans for his work during the coming winter.

The action of this Committee, instructing the Secretary to spend the major part of his time (or so much as may seem necessary) in the State Legislature during the coming session, has made it necessary to considerably alter the plans heretofore submitted.

In addition to the work in the Legislature the following efforts are suggested:

1st. CHURCH CAMPAIGN. The churches of the city to be divided between the County Committee and the State Committee, such individual churches being assigned to each as may be mutually agreed upon.

The Secretary will seek the opportunity of speaking in each of these churches, making the purpose of his address to arouse the people to activity. No pledges or collection will be taken, but envelopes will be distributed among the people, upon which they may indicate their desire to actively ally themselves with the effort for the destruction of the liquor traffic. In this effort a number of our best ministers in the city will be sought to give their services without cost. The plan has been submitted to Dr. Stanley B. Roberts and Dr. P. A. Cool, both of whom have agreed to put at the disposal of the Committee such time as may be at their command for work along this line.

The names of those secured <sup>at these meetings</sup> will be classified with the aid of someone acquainted with the membership of the individual church. The more influential will be visited personally. Correspondence with each of the others, pointing toward definite results, probably the enrollment of voters, will be carried on.

At each church visited as above, a later week night meeting will be arranged, where the plans of the party may be discussed more fully and more at length, and where, if deemed wise, funds for the support of the work may be solicited.

The plan of this campaign is to cover both of the cities. In Minneapolis there are 135 churches that ought to be open to work along this line. The St. Paul situation has not been canvassed.

2nd. BUSINESS MEN'S CAMPAIGN. Through letters of introduction secured from our most active and aggressive men in business circles, it is proposed to reach one hundred, at least, of the prominent, influential business men who stand for higher and better things in government. It is believed that we can interest a large proportion of this class of citizens who heretofore have had but casual knowledge of the existence of the Prohibition party.

3rd. FINANCIAL CAMPAIGN. It is proposed to follow up both personally and in public meetings a vigorous and aggressive financial campaign in the Twin Cities. This of course is quite apart from the general work, being an outline of the activity of the Secretary during the session of Legislature.

This local plan of campaign can be made effective if the members of the Committee and the active Prohibitionists will lend their hearty co-operation along the several lines proposed. Otherwise, it must essentially fall with little and possibly no results. Therefore in presenting this plan it will be worse than folly for the Committee to express its approval by an empty vote. Approval must carry with it the individual and collective purpose of the Committee to give time, thought and co-operation to these plans.





Gentlemen of the State Committee:--

I am submitting herewith a formal budget for the ten months of the campaign, beginning January 1, 1908, and ending November 4, 1908.

In the very nature of the case, a large number of the items are little better than guesses, based, it is true, upon experiences of the past, but the campaign that is before us is planned on lines so far beyond the lines of any previous effort, that estimates are extremely difficult. We undoubtedly are nearer to the facts in the office accounts than we can be in the field accounts. Nevertheless, as to some of these items a word or two may not be amiss.

I have suggested an average of four additional office help beginning with the 1st day of June. I fancy this will be rather too small, yet the heads of our departments are people of experience and ability in organizing, and I hope to keep that average, although some months the extra help above this number will unquestionably be considerable.

I have added \$8 to rent, for we must have more room.

It will be recalled that a plan to send to a list of from 50,000 to 100,000 selected voters a letter laying on each man his personal responsibility for the results in his precinct, was discussed and seemed to have the favorable consideration of the Committee some time since. This will cost from \$500 to \$1,000 for postage, sending the matter under 1¢ cover. If this should not be done, the item of \$200 for postage is probably large. If it should be done, the item is probably small.

The item of \$400 for printing is probably small, although the exact increase of effort along this line cannot easily be foreseen.

The field salaries of the second six months may be considered as reasonably accurate. The field expenses are subject to so wide differences, as in many instances legislative organizers, especially, are entertained almost continuously without cost, that a considerable difference in the total may be expected.

Clearly in connection with this budget of expenses there ought to come an estimate of available assets. I think it will be wise for us to consider these items carefully during the coming week, at which time I will submit the other side of the account as accurately as may be. No small amount of time and thought and careful consideration will be necessary that any such estimate may have any working value.

REPORT of PROGRESS.

Re. High school essay and oratorical contests.

At a recent meeting power was conferred upon me to launch and promote a high school essay contest. While I was vested with power to act the question is of such importance that it deserves the combined wisdom of the committee, and I submit for your consideration a somewhat more definite plan, and recommend,

1. That a system of contests for excellence in treatment of some method for permanently settling the liquor problem be instituted among the high school students of this state, under the auspices of this committee; that the contest be on original productions of essays or orations, and limited to actual students of Minnesota high schools.

2. That the State Committee offer three prizes for the highest excellence, as follows--First, fifty (50) dollars; second, twenty-five (25) dollars, and third ten (10) dollars, payable upon award of grades; that the secretary be instructed to raise the total amount of ninety (90) dollars required for this purpose from sources not available for the general fund, if possible, but that this provision shall not be mandatory, but that ninety (90) dollars and the funds for carrying out the general plans of the proposition is hereby appropriated, to be drawn as occasion may arise, from the <sup>general</sup> funds of the Committee not otherwise appropriated.

3. That only such essays or orations shall be eligible in the competition for the state prizes as have been awarded first rank in a public contest in which not less than five (5) students shall have competed; provided however, that in event of the death or disability of any winner of any such first rank the second may be substituted.

4. The committee shall seek to stimulate local enterprise to offer prizes in the contests provided in the 3rd paragraph, as follows: First five (5) dollars, second two (2) dollars, and to the winner of the

HIGHSCHOOL ESSAY and ORATORICAL CONTESTS.

In taking up the details of the above matter it seemed to me unless the W. C. T. U. and this committee could get together that there should not be two systems presented to the teachers, parents and pupils that we were likely to fail of our purpose. The reasons for this conclusion were based upon the fact that high schools now have the debating teams (interschool), and an scholastic oratorical system, the Journal Trophy or prize contest, in addition to affairs of a strictly local nature.

Now if, in addition hereto, we should have two systems, very similar to regulations, and covering the same specific (and to the effect of many a narrow) field, this fact would, in itself, be the cause on the part of many for not encouraging the pupils to take up the contest.

I have written Mrs. Scovell, the State President of the W.C.T.U. setting forth these facts for her consideration, and shall report her progress upon receipt of her reply.

I am conscious that if anything is to be accomplished this year must be done quickly.


The financial report for the week ending May 2nd, was submitted and received.

My Dear Friend:--

The situation in this state is the most hopeful and cheering in the whole history of the fight, easily by a hundred fold.

There has never been a time when a steady step, firm purpose, and a clear conception of the necessities of the case were more important than now. If we allow ourselves to be drawn aside into the folly of supporting nominees representing those political organizations that are divided in their own ranks as to the wisdom of the Prohibition policy, we will push back the hour-hand of the reform and delay for years the consummation of our purposes. We shall not fail, but we may vastly delay the hour of victory.

At the risk of straining your patience, I want to call your attention to a few salient reasons why the Prohibition party should be a party - and behave like one.

1st. "A house divided against itself cannot stand." Then how foolish it is to expect a house divided against itself to not only stand, but to push forward against strong opposition. That the Republican party is divided against itself on the liquor question is beyond any doubt. It has been dominated and still is dominated by those powers which stand with the saloon; and even if it should pass laws, it would make those laws a by-word and a reproach; it would wink at and connive with criminals against the law, as it has done for years in every Prohibition state.

2nd. In order to get a law, it must have vastly more than a majority, because the "machine" will be against them. The real problem of legislation under present methods is the problem of Speakership. The County Option bill was not defeated on the 53rd day of the legislature, as the newspapers stated - It was defeated on the first day, when Lawrence H. Johnson was elected Speaker of the House; or, at latest, on the second day, when he appointed a committee that stood 12 to 2 against all genuine temperance legislation. Be that as it may - its defeat was NOT on the floor of the House, but in the election of the Speaker.

In 1902, in the Lower House in the Illinois Legislature, an overwhelming majority was in favor of Traction Reform legislation, but with the Speaker against them, the only method by which they could pass any Traction Reform legislation was to knock the Speaker down, blacken each other's eyes, break the furniture, and disgrace the state of Illinois forever - not because they lacked a majority, but because they lacked the Speaker.

The present Congress will adjourn, giving the people none of the legislation or reforms that are greatly needed, not because the people failed to elect congressmen favorable to those measures, but because those congressmen elected a Speaker who, to quote the Minneapolis Journal, established a "benevolent oligarchy" to defeat the will of the people.

built up the beginning of a party of principle. The dominant party, holding opposite views, would nominate a nice man, opposed to the attitude of his party, and together (nice man and dirty politician joining voice) they have come to the Prohibitionist and said, "Now just for this once won't you please get off the earth. It will be the best for you in the end." And we have sweetly simpered, "Yes ma'am, thank you."

Then we would start again from the ground, only to find that we had lost our material by our political imbecility. We will never amount to anything in seven million years by the watch, until we understand, with Lincoln, that the natural home of an honest voter is in a party that holds to his principles.

The Republicans never go to the Democrats and ask them to "unite for the good of the cause"; nor do the Democrats go to the Republicans. The reason is, that in the past both of these organizations have been consistently political. We have been inconsistent and non-political, while professing to be a political organization. But we stopped that business after the campaign of 1902, and the fruitage of our political wisdom in that particular has been marvelous - our gains have surpassed all precedent. By respecting ourselves, we have compelled others to respect us.

4th. "No man can serve two masters." Therefore a man cannot be true to the cause of temperance and prohibition, and at the same time be true to the Republican party, which for thirty years in this state has stood unswervingly for the protection of the saloon. The statute books of the state of Minnesota are the undisputable documentary evidence of this fact.

The man who owes his nomination and his election to that party, is in duty bound to uphold the principles of that party. The illustrations in proof of this in this state alone would exceed your patience. And a man of principle is more punctilious about his obligations than a rogue. L.H. Johnson, Speaker of the House, is a nice man. He introduced a County Option bill in 1901 - and opposed it in 1907, and appointed a Temperance (?) Committee of 12 to 3 for booze. Lieutenant-Governor Eberhart is a XX-11 Delux edition edition nice man, on record as favorable to county option - but appointed a Temperance (?) Committee of 8 to 1. Time would fail me to tell of Burdette Thayer, Senator Works, E.W. Gatas, Andrew McCoy, W.A. Nolan, and others sine finis.

5th. The need is not more men of principle - but a PARTY of principle. The members of the last legislature, the legislature before, and the legislature before, ad infinitum, were good enough. The thing that was wrong was the party through which those legislators were honored by election. If, by some hypnotic spell the legislators who are the present members of the House, who so brutally butchered every temperance measure, could have been made to believe that they were elected by the Prohibition party, they would have adopted the Prohibition measure without a single dissenting vote. Men do not go to the legislature to represent themselves, but their party. No man would need to have been made one whit better. The worst drunken bum, the most shameless grafter, boodler and bribe-taker, would have stood squarely for the bill. This would not have been because the Prohibition party

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

was so "good", but because prohibition is its principle. No Republican, no matter how corrupt, ever voted against the Protective Tariff when that was the clear policy of his party; nor against the Gold Standard when that was the policy of his party; and the same thing could be traced through the entire history of politics in this state and this nation; and it will be found that when a party had a dominant issue, its every member, however corrupt and venial he might be, was square on the party's issue. Men sell out on those issues upon which their party is divided.

6th. There is absolutely NO political issue between the political parties in this state to-day - I repeat it, absolutely none. The Washington Post of March the 6th, 1908, said, editorially,

"Everything political is in a chaotic state. Nobody knows what a Democrat is - nor is it much easier to tell what a Republican is. No man can imagine what will be written on the page of our political future of the next decade. All we know is - THAT THE OLD PARTIES ARE DEAD."

The Chicago Examiner of March the 13th, 1908, said, editorially,

"The noble discontent of a free people is the foundation stone of independence in political action. The idea is rusty and antiquated that there is only room for two parties in this country. There is room and pressing need for a new party, to champion new ideas, to give a brave and ringing voice to new principles and new convictions, to think and act along the broad, fearless lines that the age demands."

7th. We are asking very, very little of the old party men.

Every voter this fall will have an opportunity to vote for about 40 men. I am sure that those who are vigorously opposed to the liquor traffic will be glad to give one or two of their 40 votes, to the political party which honestly represents them. Hence, opponents of the saloon who care for principle more than for their party, will be willing to unite with the Prohibitionists in their legislative campaign, however unwilling they may be to give their support to the Prohibitionists on the county, state or national tickets. Many a man has said for years, "I will be with you any time it will do any good." This is the time he has been waiting for!

Finally: The crisis is here. The opportunity for which we have labored, prayed and paid for, lo, these years, is upon us. We will waste and dissipate the effects of our efforts if we allow ourselves to be cajoled or brow-beaten or wheedled into infidelity to our own colors.

May the God of righteous battles give us the courage of our convictions, and the nerve to "stay put" for a principle with a PARTY of PRINCIPLE back of it.
