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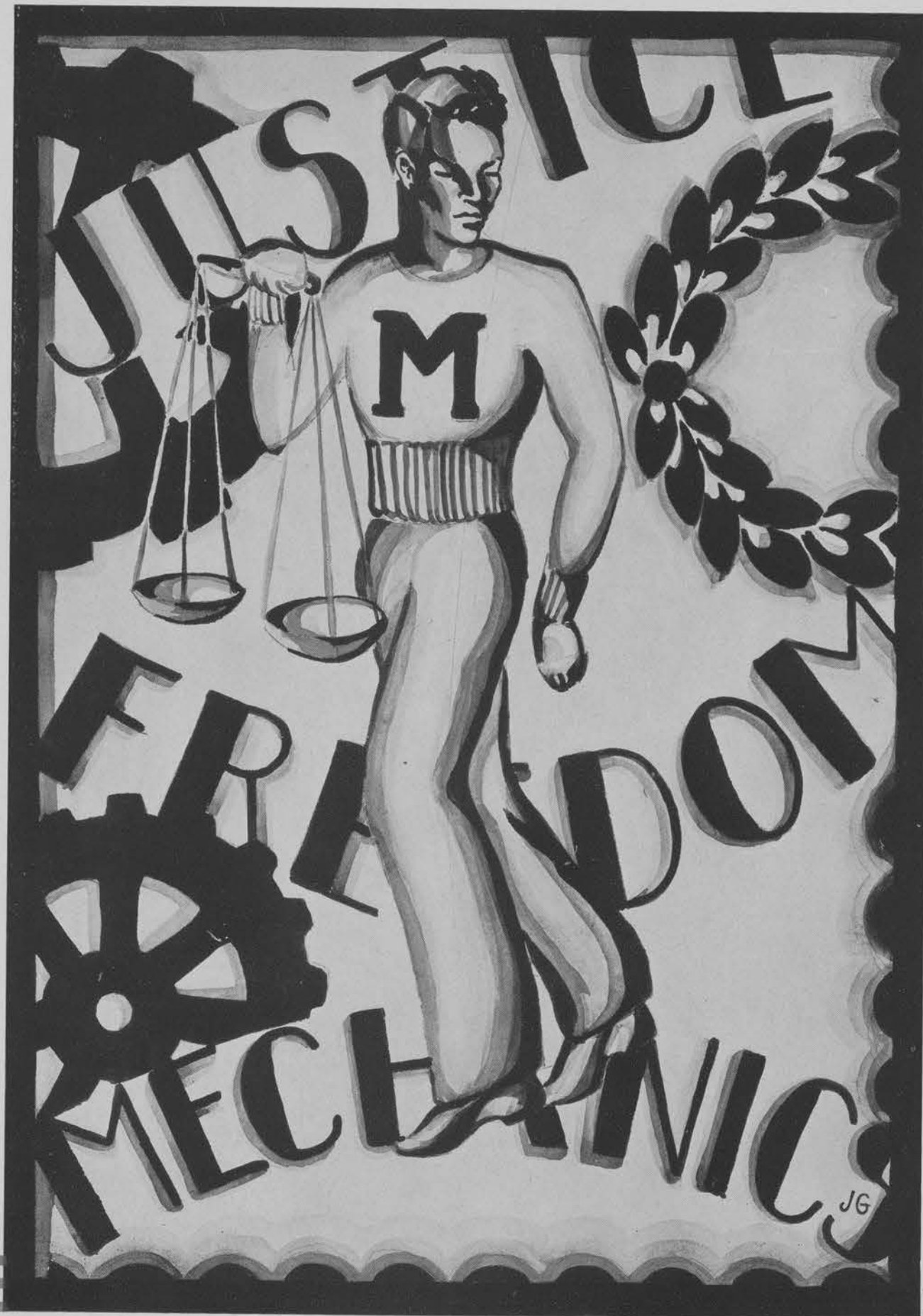

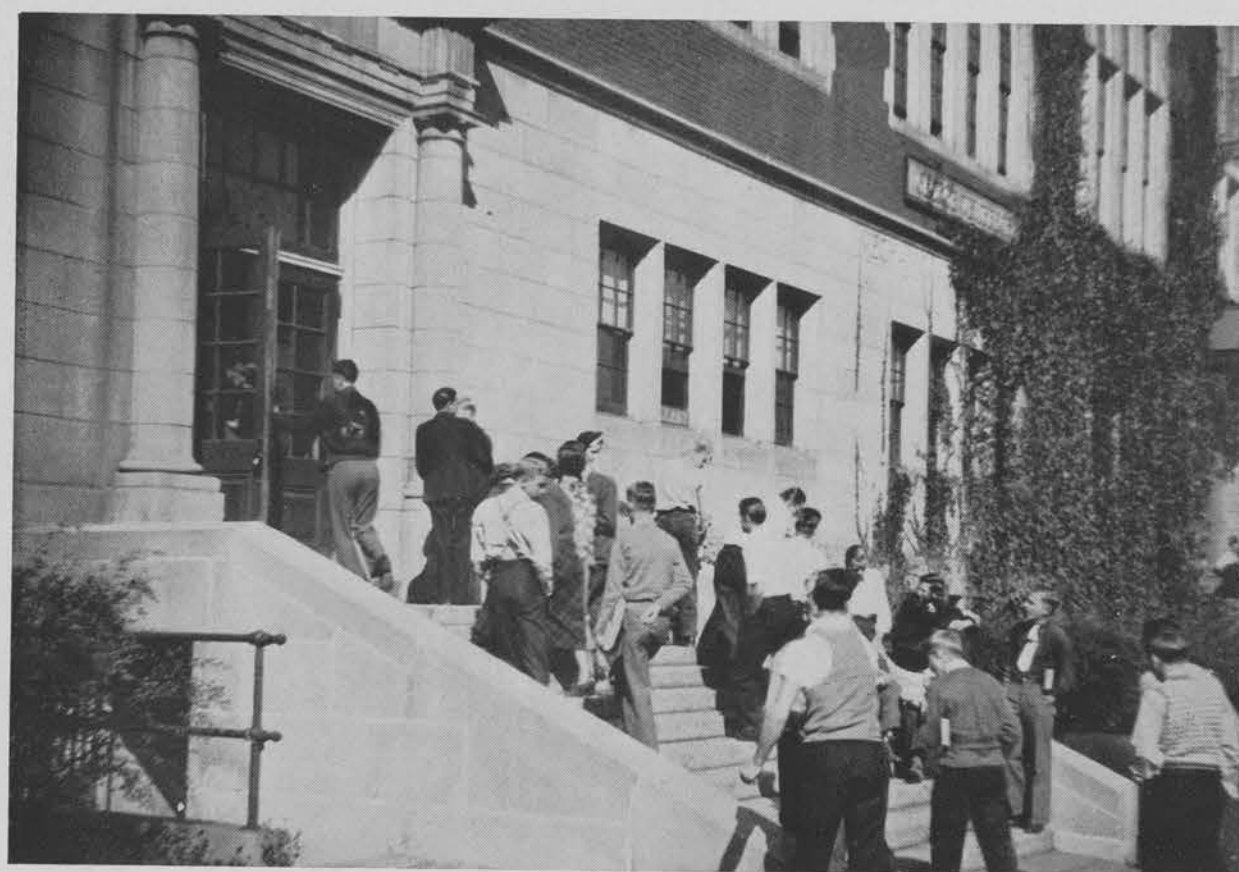

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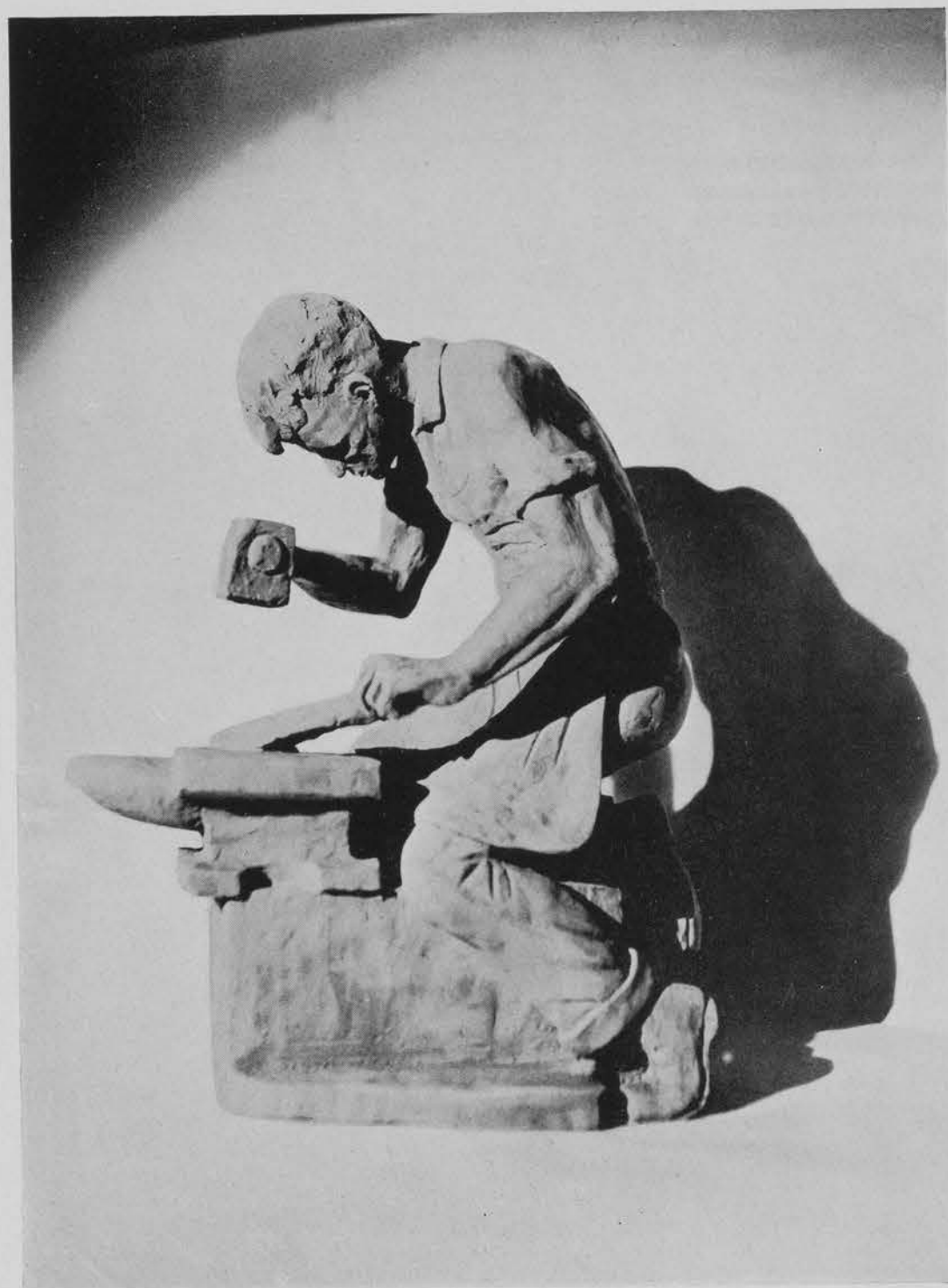

1887 - 1937

CHANGING SCENES FIFTY YEARS

7 HERE existed, **some fifty years ago**, at Tenth and Robert streets, a two-story, red brick building, the **St. Paul High School**, the only public high school in the city at that time.

There arose a desire at St. Paul High for technical education and so:

In the year—
1887—

In a **corner basement room** of the school, Mr. J. D. Ludden, chairman of the manual training committee, speaks to an audience of boys and faculty members:

"—Let this **portion of St. Paul High School** be dedicated as a **manual training** quarter for its students—"

1888—

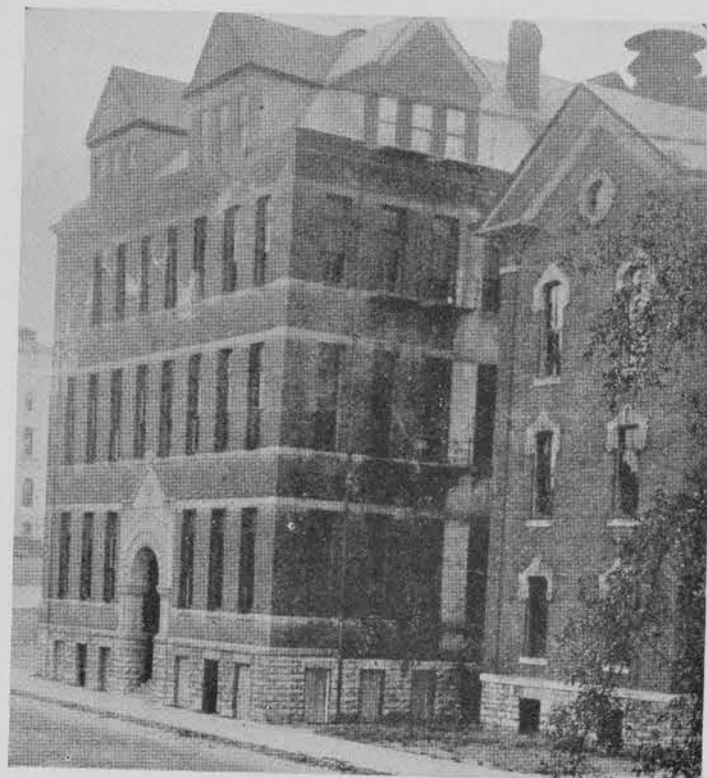
At a meeting of the Board of Education, B. F. Wright takes the floor:

"In view of the encroaching demand for technical training at St. Paul High School, I propose that a **separate building** be constructed for the purpose."

1889—

Standing on the steps of the **new school** on Park Avenue, Mr. Charles A. Bennet addresses a gathering of students:

"I am honored to have the privilege of officially opening the doors of the **Manual Training School** and happy to become its first principal."

At Central High School **George Weitbrecht**, a kindly chemistry and economics teacher, is approached by a group of men. After an earnest discussion the teacher speaks:

—1896

"Gentlemen, I accept the principalship of the Manual Training School with the provision that **academic classes** be included in the curricula; and that the school be henceforth known as **Mechanic Arts High School.**"

On the stage of the school auditorium, diplomas are presented to **fourteen** anxious scholars—the **first graduating class.**

—1897
June

The enrollment increases consistently. The student populace crowd into the assembly hall expressing their sentiments in their first school song:

—1909

"Let's make Mechanics large, boys,
It will not hold us all.
We used to go to school in it
When you and I were small.
But now we're growing large, boys,
And we need lots of room,
So when we get our nice new school—"

Construction begins—at the corner of Central and Robert streets. Steam shovels roar, pick-axes grate, and hammers ring.

November

Doors of the **new school** swing open for the first time—Six hundred eager students take possession of **uncarved** desks.

—1911
April

Grave-faced students file quietly into assembly. The silence is broken only by Mr. Lange's official announcement of the **first principal's death.**

—1916
February

"M-e-c-h-a-n-i-c-s! Fight! Team! Fight!" bursts from the new gym. Shouts one senior to another: "I'm thankful for two things: for the **new gym**, and because we're rid of **them pesky freshmen.**"

—1929

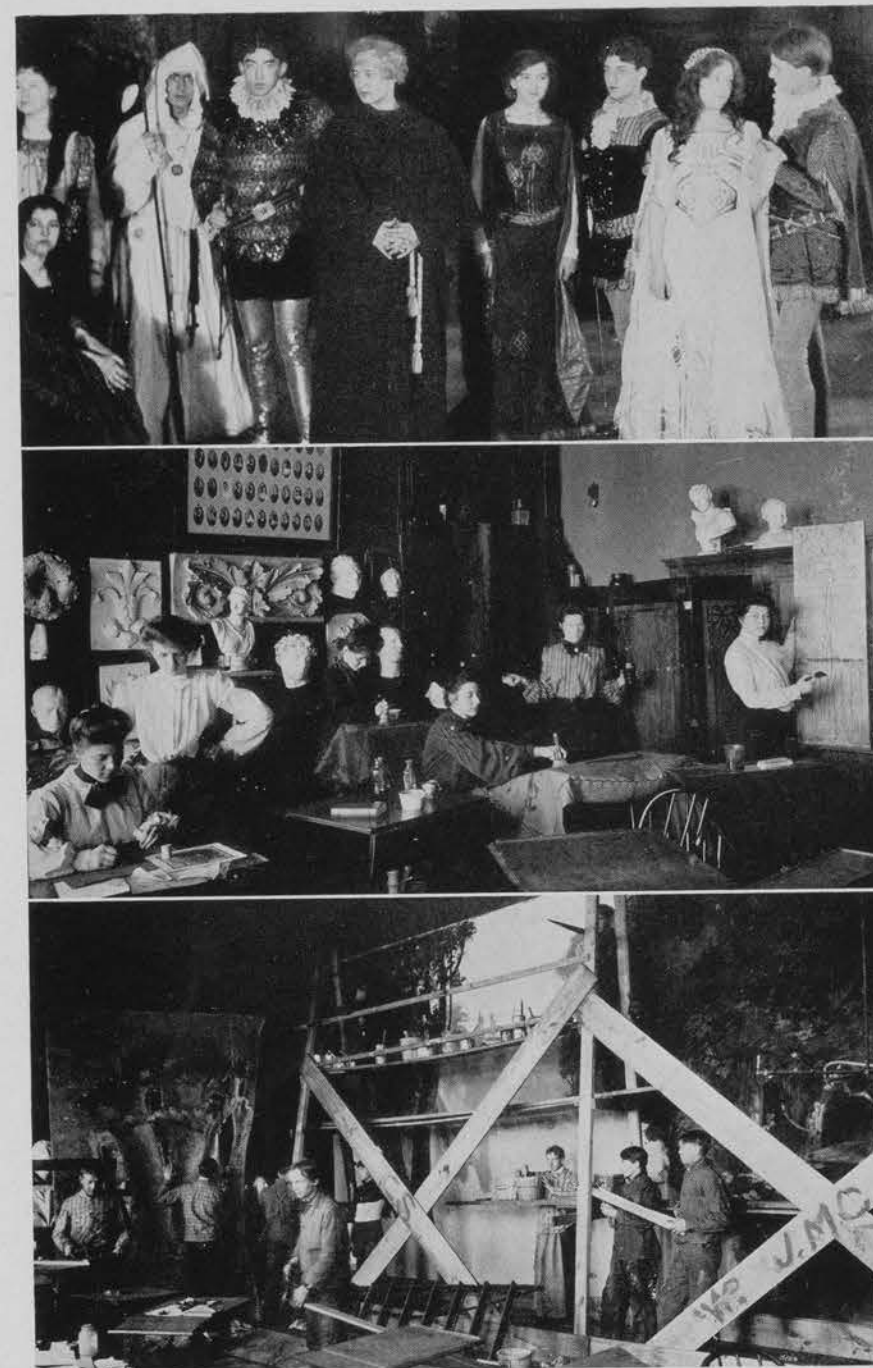
2168 high school students of **varying** creeds, colors, and ambitions pour in and out of familiar halls. Among the crowds bob occasional small figures with round childish faces. The **freshmen** are with us **again.** In fifty years' time we have grown from a **mere handful** of students in a **basement room** to the **second largest** high school in the City of St. Paul, the progressive Republic of Mechanic Arts.

- Dec. 1, 1900 Blue and white **cogwheel** becomes class symbol. Designer—Howard Flagg.
- May 5, 1905 **Mourner's Bench**—a new creation in school furniture—designed and produced by Mechanic Arts wood shop thrills World's Fair at St. Louis.
- SWISH! Feb. 26, 1907 **Handsome brown curtain!** M. A. H. S. students cheer.
- RETURNS! Nov. 1906 Mechanics students join the third party and **support Roosevelt** but to no avail—Wilson wins.
- BOOM-A-LACKA! Nov. 22, 1914 M. A. H. S. football team wins **state championship**.
- Jan. 28, 1915 Without coach, M. A. H. S. football boys win **state championship the second time**.
- NEWS! March 3, 1925 **Cogwheel** makes its debut as school paper—
- April 11, 1933 Cogwheel honored by first **Medalist rating**—
- KI-YI! Oct. 12, 1934 **Big Roundup!** M. A. H. S. students play Indian in halls.
- WIRE! May 8, 1935 Margaret McIntyre wins **national Latin award**.
- CRASH! Oct. 16, 1935 **Lightning rips** chimney of M. A. H. S.
- SWISH! Jan. 19, 1937 **New curtain** becomes reality—Fred Luft, president of senior class, makes presentation at school assembly.
- CONGRATULATIONS! June 18, 1937 The Republic of Mechanic Arts completes its **first fifty years of progress**.

MR. LANGE

CITIZENS of Mechanic Arts are particularly proud of their president, Mr. Dietrich Lange, nationally known naturalist, author, and educator. In his leisure time Mr. Lange may be found hiking, canoeing, and studying birds, trees, flowers, geology, or physical geography. Hunting he does with a camera. Suddenly his straight, wiry frame stands erect; his deep-set piercing eyes have discovered something. Out comes his camera to record his findings, an unusual bird nest, an out-of-season flower, an odd arrangement of stones, a stately moose looming up silently between fir branches.

Mr. Lange's first book, "The Hand Book of Nature," was published in 1898. To supply the boys of his own school with books which would be profitable as well as interesting reading, Mr. Lange next wrote a series of adventure and Indian stories.

Before coming to Mechanic Arts, Mr. Lange served as principal of Humboldt High School, St. Paul, and as superintendent of the St. Paul schools.

Mechanics would be a strange place without the brisk step, the snowy head, and the admonishing hand of its chief executive. Its citizens see him striding up and down the halls, chatting, directing, advising. And many a returning graduate has been heartened to have Mr. Lange greet him by his first name. Truly he practices what he preaches—"Be human before you're a teacher!"

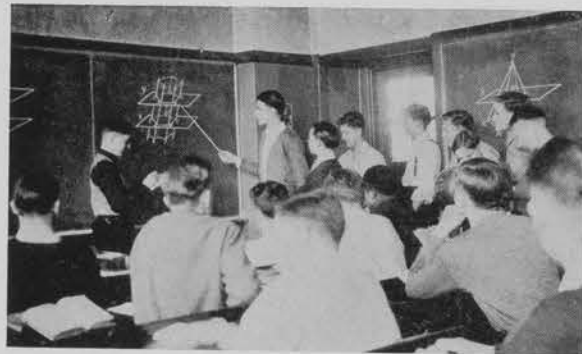

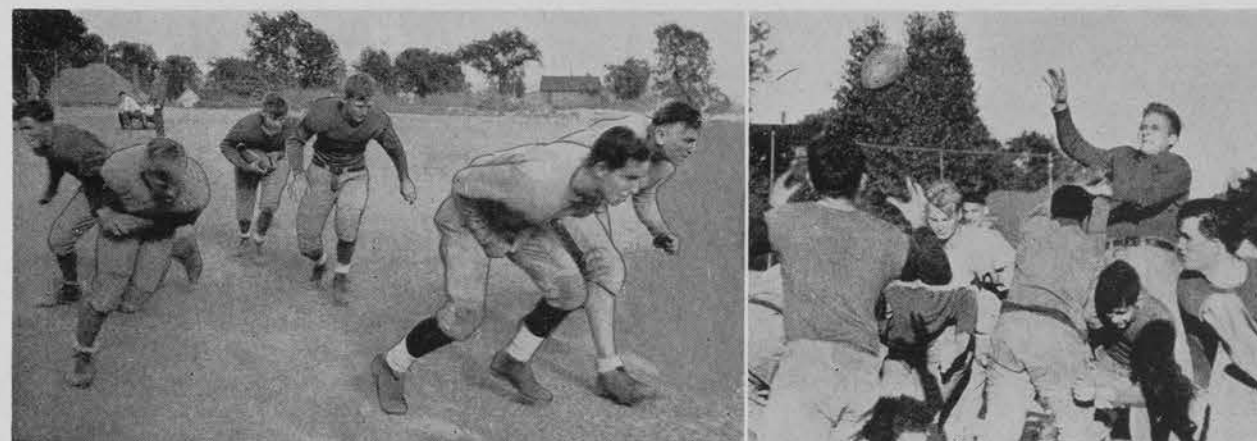
The Mechanic Arts eleven made their final bow to the brilliant 1936 football season after meeting Washington and losing, 34 to 0.

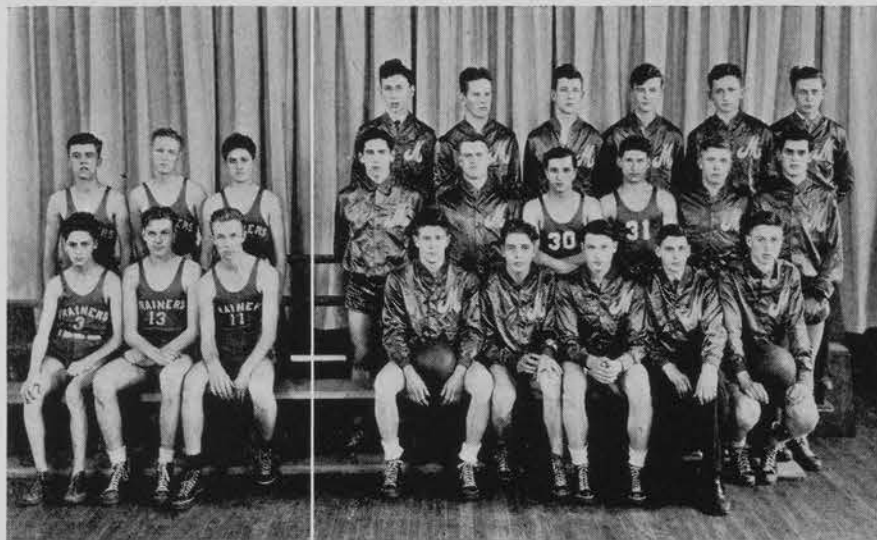

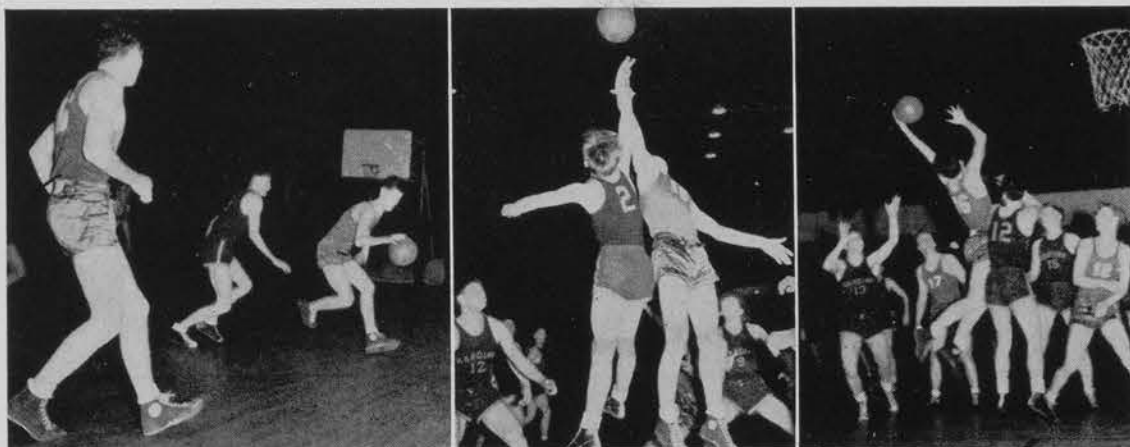

Basketball

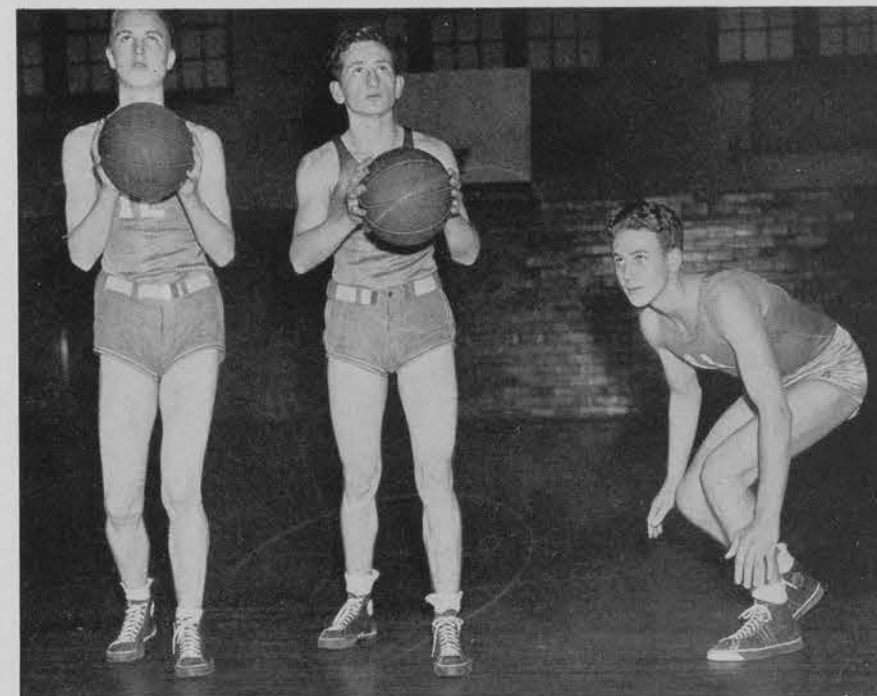
SOME one hundred aspirants answered Coach Leonard A. Torwick's call for basketball material. Of these, he retained the veterans, the experienced ones, and those who presented possibilities. Returning lettermen were Paul Sullivan, Harold Kosanke, Earl Evenson, Leslie Grohs, James Bagby, Ed Cooper, and Marion Anderson. Before the first scheduled game, Coach Torwick had assembled a smoothly functioning aggregation, one that promised to uphold Mechanic Arts' reputation for championship basketball teams.

The Trainer five wrought terror in the hearts of its conference opponents by winning easily its three pre-season games against Blue Earth, North St. Paul, and University High, and whipping Humboldt 42 to 28.

The basketball fever was especially high in St. Paul at this time largely because the contestants were quite evenly matched, and because admission prices were made so temptingly low. The center-jump method of putting the ball into play was eliminated in the first Harding game and instead the ball was thrown in from the sidelines by the team scored upon, so that the play moved more rapidly. Games were played in the municipal auditorium, when it was available, at the school gyms, and on the floors of the local colleges.

The blue and white basketekers took it out on Washington the following week 26 to 10.

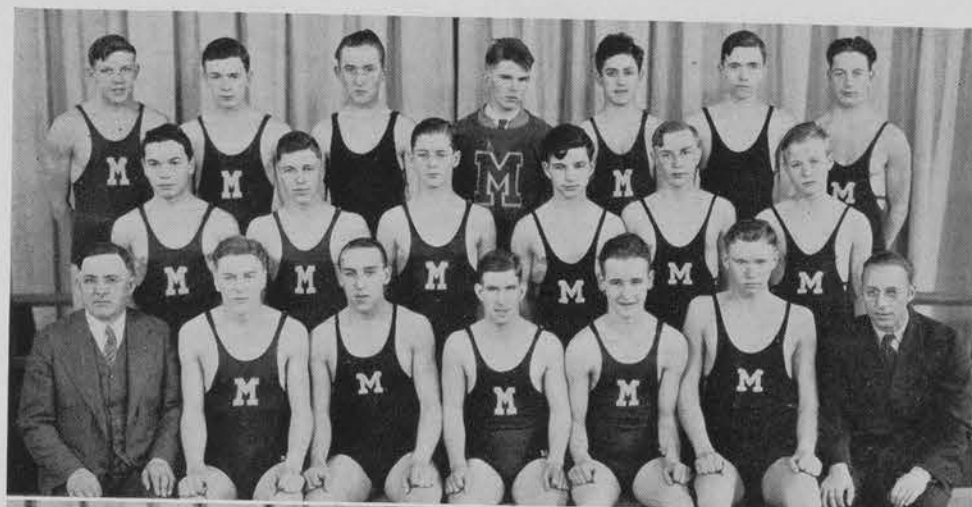

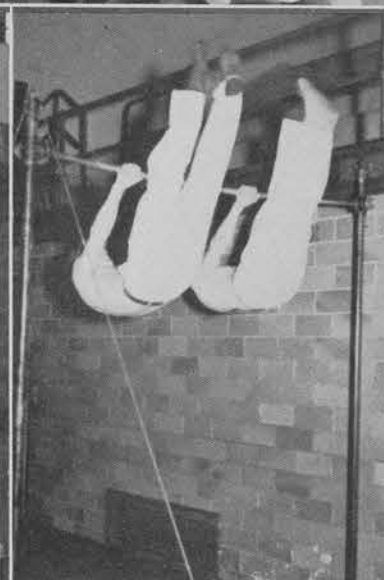
