The Cogwheel has been the symbol of George Weitbrecht Mechanic Arts High School ever since our first principal recognized its importance in the machine. By replacing the treacherous leather belt that had been used in the transfer of power, the cogwheel insured safety. Thus the speed, service and strength of the machine was used as the symbol of our paper and M Books.

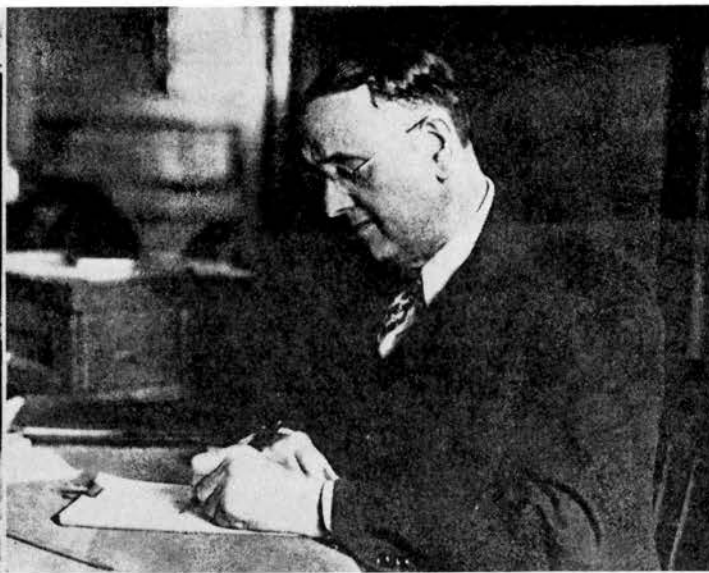

SENIOR REPRESENTATIVES

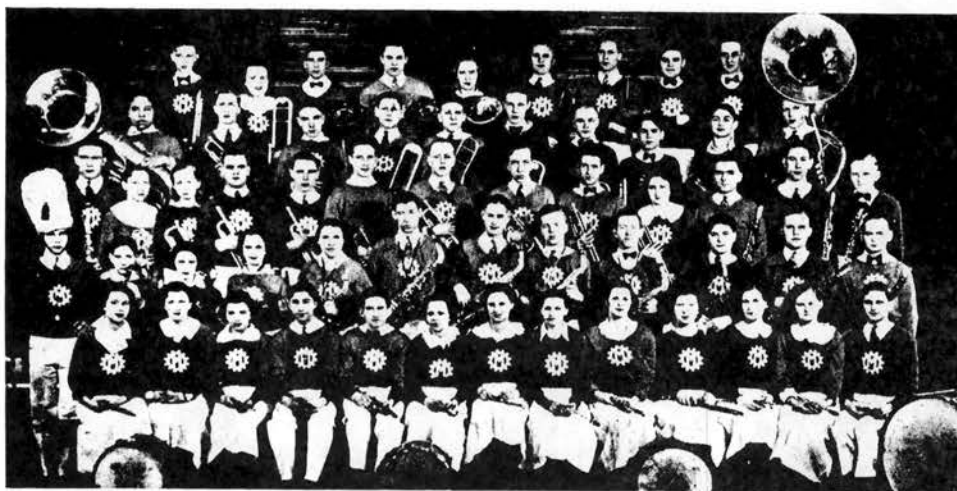

Three received special mention from national headquarters. The story, "A Tenderfoot Goes Hunting," by Clifford Baker was commended for its humor and concrete descriptions.

LeVonne Davy and Arline Koberg were praised for two newspaper stories. At a business meeting, March 17, plans were discussed for a joint Quill and Scroll banquet of the respective chapters of Central and Mechanic Arts, such as was held the preceding year at the Hotel Lowry.

At a second initiation held in the spring, new members were enrolled in the society.

THE PHYSICS CLUB

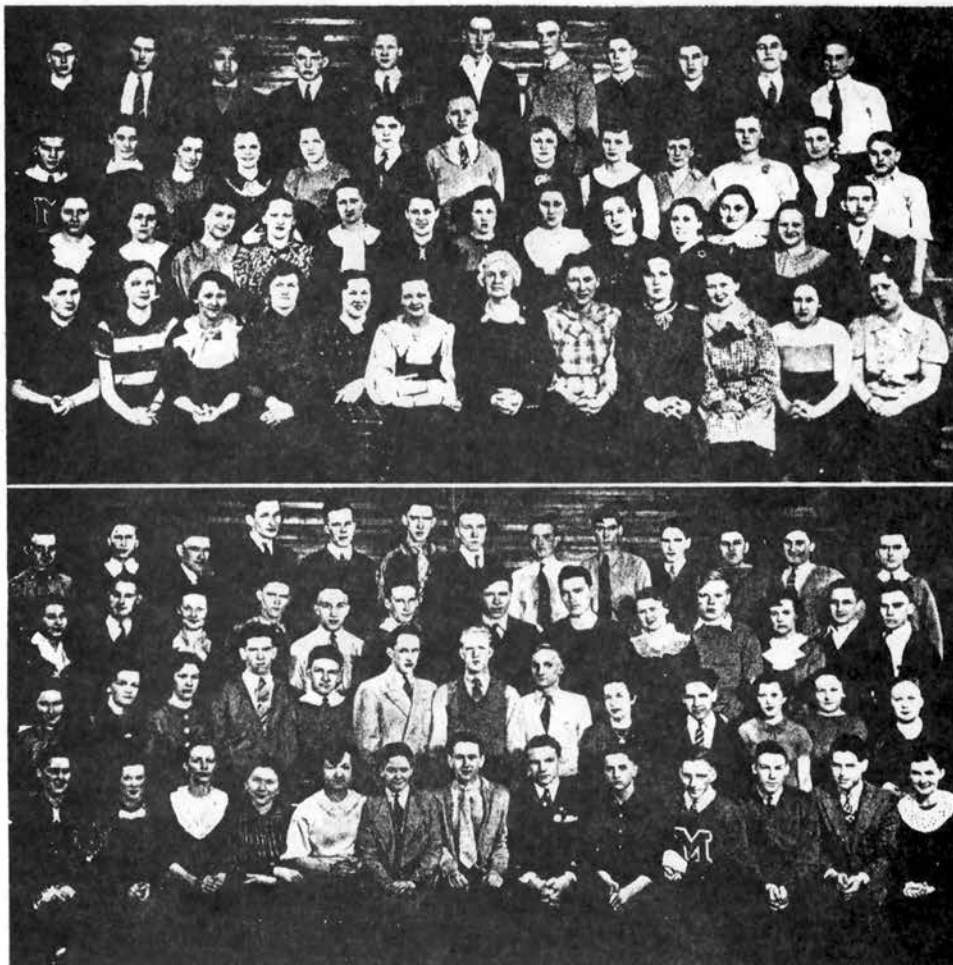
