





as of JANUARY 9, 1988

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

# Chapter Career Networking

During 1988 Zeta Nu Sigma experienced growth in its Chapter membership. The Executive Board reviewed the occupations of Chapter and found that many brothers worked in similar technical and non-technical careers. In some instances, brothers process degrees in the very same field.

We proposed a program to establish a career network within the Chapter with the following objectives.

- A. To improve the knowledge about our job to each other.
- B. To promote career development.
- C. To assist brothers with career search and job placement.
- D. To improve the respect for all chosen careers.
- E. To recognize the wealth of talent that Zeta Nu Sigma processes.

During the course of employment there are going to be changes that one has to make. When there is a network in place to assist with a career change, career development or having someone to talk to who understands your job situation, that makes a difference.

We sought to instill this program under the directorship of Bigger and Better Business. The director would assist brothers, circulate information relevant to the objectives stated above. The director of Bigger and Better Business also represents the chapter at regular meetings of the Minneapolis Black Business Network. Information on job opportunities or career seminars could be shared with interested brothers on frequent basis. We feel this form of communication will strengthen our membership on a professional and fraternal level.

# **Tax Seminar**

Bigger and Better Business presented a Tax Seminar given by Timothy McWatt, a tax consultant in Minneapolis. Mr. McWatt informed our group about the areas of tax rates, income levels/brackets, changes in tax laws and how to avoid tax problems at year end.

He reviewed ways to systematically track taxes on a month-to-month basis and record deductions. He focused on the tax situation of single wage earners and married couples. The use of a tax worksheet was encouraged to ensure enough tax was being withheld.

Mr. McWatt's excellent use of charts, tables and other publications gave everyone an understanding of basic tax laws. With the sweeping changes in the tax structure, this type of information is vital.

Many questions Mr. McWatt answered applied to a particular person or family situation, although the information was helpful to all. Because taxes affects all of us and we cannot be a expert on the subject, seminars like these are very important.

Through our Bigger and Better Business program we sought to utilize the talent of a minority professional to enhance our understanding on taxes.

# Investment Seminar

In the times when financial security is a topic in which everyone speaks about, but not necessarily prepares for. Living in America, called the richest country in the world, many Black Americans are trapped in the daily shuffle of just making a living.

Zeta Nu Sigma sought to assist the community by sponsoring a no-cost investment seminar. The seminar was given by a local black realtor and entrepreneur named John Morgan.

Prior to the seminar various questions were submitted to Mr. Morgan to elaborate on during his discussion. They were:

- The federal section 202 housing program
- Homes for first time buyers
- Purchasing additional property as investment income

Mr. Morgan gave a realistic view of the raising cost of home ownership. He stressed a vital point that many Black Americans must find other alternatives to procure adequate housing such as community coop housing projects. A number of questions were answered about home ownership.

Finally, he discussed his investment proposal which encompassed purchasing houses within the community to renovate and resale them. This would allow us to help rebuild the community, establish a sense of pride, and gain profits all at the same time. Overall, everyone who attended gained more knowledge about investing.

Jay W. Tyson

As you travel the streets of Minneapolis and St. Paul, you're likely to pass buildings that were created by architect Jay W. Tyson.

Included in the structures he has designed are the telephone equipment buildings for U.S. West in several area cities and a downtown Minneapolis office building that formerly housed a vocational school. Currently, he is designing additions to the Eagan and Stillwater waste treatment plants with construction costs estimated at \$58 million.

Born in High Point, N.C., he holds a bachelor's degree from Agricultural and Technical College of Greensboro, N.C., and master's degree from the University of Illinois at Urbana. Mr. Tyson worked as a cartographic draftsman, instructor, and drafting technician before starting his own business in 1987. Tyson Associates, Inc. specializes in general architecture, interior designs and planning.

He is a member of numerous professional and civic organizations and holds several awards, including the 1986 University of Illinois Black Alumni Award, and citations from the Minneapolis Urban League and the City of Minneapolis.

He and his wife, Cynthia Tyson, have three adult children.

UNCF schools tend to  
make education a daily  
project, the school becomes  
the parent and the student,  
the offspring. Staff in most  
cases are available long af-  
ter school hours, says  
George "Tree" Robinson  
an ex-basketball player for  
Tuskegee Institute. "The  
member's of my squad and  
I often needed help due to  
our rigorous training and  
travel schedule. It was a  
motivational factor for us  
knowing the professors  
cared enough about our  
education to give us extra  
help."

Director of Education for  
the Sigma Chapter Louis  
Porter wishes to remind  
future high school  
graduates that UNCF  
schools offer a full  
curriculum of technical and  
non-technical fields. "If you  
apply yourself while there,  
your chance of landing a  
good job are just as good  
as a Big Ten grad. There  
are also special scholar-  
ships offered by the Twin  
City UNCF organization.  
In the past our chapter  
scholarships have gone to  
UNCF school attendees.  
We hope to offer more in  
the future."


Dear Ed,



Launa Q. Newman

Launa Q. Newman, president of the Minneapolis Spokesman and St. Paul Recorder, has helped provide a voice of advocacy for the Twin Cities Black Community for more than two decades. Following in the tradition set by her late husband, Cecil Newman, Mrs. Newman has continued to provide a forum for news, problem-solving and ideas. She has also helped bring the newspaper into the 1980's, supervising the modernization of its production process.

A native of Des Moines, Iowa, she moved to Minneapolis in the 1958, married Cecil Newman in 1965 and began working in the business in 1967.

Once, she told an interviewer, "I knew what it meant to be a small businessman. I know the problems and sacrifices involved."

Fortunately for the people of Minnesota, Mrs. Newman has made the sacrifices necessary to keep the two newspapers publishing. She began working in the newspapers circulation department, then moved into management. Mrs. Newman reorganized the staff and office procedures, creating a system that remains with the newspaper today.

As a mother and grandmother, much of her time away from the business is dedicated to her family.

The education of our youth, not only encompasses reading, writing and arithmetic. There is a definite need to educate today's black students on career choices. Zeta Nu Sigma Chapter in 1988 committed itself (through the fraternities national education program) to the goal of providing the community's youth a better understanding of the careers available today.

### **Community Career Rap**

The Twin Cities Chapter of Sigma developed and coordinated with St. Paul's Central and Como high schools and the Hallie O. Brown community center a career rap. There were 104 participants in the event on November 2, 1988. An inspiring talk from coach LaRue Fields of the University of Minnesota Lady Gophers basketball team opened the event. Her message focused on why America needs her black youth to succeed.

Local professionals and Chapter Brothers Robertson, Nichols, Randle, Branch, Wheeler, Mims and Marshall were recruited by the education committee to discuss their careers. The ninth and tenth grade student visited two of their chosen career path panels and were lectured on four possible careers in their chosen areas. At the close of the event, the entire group was treated to a catered lunch sponsored by St. Cloud State University.

### **Augsberg College Workshop**

The Twin Cities Sigma Chapter members volunteered an evening of their time in November of 1988 to Augsberg's black student affairs department. Three Sigma men discussed, "What to Expect in the Corporate Setting" to potential college graduates. Each Chapter Brother (Doty, Wade and McKinnie) focused on what they gave to their corporate setting daily. The students were reminded that working hard now was the way to develop good work ethics and the best possible guarantee of a successful professional or vocational career.

Amos A. Haynes has been a leader in private and public service all of his adult life. 

## **Summary**

This summary will cover only the major issues discussed. A report with complete issue by issue discussion will be available on October 6, 1988.

Brother Curtis Clingman welcome all brothers to Chicago and called the meeting to order at 9:10 a.m.

The major issues discussed were:

1. The region needs to increase its membership of financial brothers as well as bring in new quality brothers.
2. The 1989 Diamond Jubilee Conclave will be in Washington D.C. The dates are August 8 – August 12. The hotel will be the Washington Hilton Inn at a cost of \$65.00/day. Please start planning and saving funds to attend.
3. Brother M. Willis resigned to focus efforts on planning 1989 regional conference. Brother C. Ross resigned to take Regional Director of Program.
4. The treasurer's report stated transferral of funds to pay to some outstanding debts. The region is approximately \$4,000.00 in debt due to unsuccessful 1988 regional and national reimbursements not received yet. Major bills will be paid as the regional decides.

5. The local host chapter in Chicago are well underway with the joint conference with the Zetas. The Hyatt will be the site located in downtown. The cost will be \$69/day. Corporate sponsors are being sought for donations. Each State Director must sell \$100.00 in ads. A well organized publicity campaign was presented to the Board by brothers Whitaker and Ballard. A daily and hourly agenda was reviewed, but some items are still being finalized. The conference looks to be financially rewarding.
6. State directors reviewed their reports. Discussion followed each report. Brothers Branch and Marshall of Minnesota discussed the progress of our chapters and future plans. No written report was submitted to the regional secretary.
7. Cluster meetings will be held at:
  - University of Iowa, October 15, 1988, Iowa City, Iowa
  - Bowling Green University, November 12, 1988, 45 miles from Toledo, OhioRegional paraphanelia (i.e., notepads, glasses, etc.) to raise funds for the treasurer.
8. Each State Director was requested to raise \$200.00 for the Club 100 Scholarship fund by December 15, 1988.
9. Computer lists of all financial brothers were given to all state directors. These lists must be verified and returned to the Secretary by October 22, 1988 (includes non-financial).
10. Brothers are asked to "Talk Up" the 1988 regional conference.

Meeting was adjourned at 8:00 p.m. with the singing of fraternity hymn.




## **Undergraduate Recruitment**





For Amos Haynes, the road to success was long and sometimes difficult. It was his own spirit and determination that helped him throughout his journey.

Born in LaChute, LA., the son of sharecroppers, he had to overcome several obstacles to become the computer systems expert and community leader that he is today. In November, he told a St. Paul Pioneer Press Dispatch reporter, "I've been through a lot of fights in my life - poverty, racism and war".

Mr. Haynes graduated from Wiley College in Texas, where he met the woman who would become his wife, Louise. He served in the Navy from 1943 until 1949, working on a transport ship and handling ammunition for the vessel's guns. In 1956, he moved to St. Paul to begin his life's work with computers. During his career he witnessed computers go from almost a novelty to an essential of everyday life.

His places of employment have included Univac, the Minnesota Department of Finance, the University of Minnesota's Institute of Technology, Control Data Corporation and 916 Area Vocational Technology Institute. In 1967, Control Data named Mr. Haynes as operations manager for a plant in North Minneapolis.

A decade ago, he established his own firm, Convergent Systems. His most recent employment has been with UNISYS.

Extremely active in the community, he has served as president of the St. Paul Urban League and the Minnesota Business League. Mr. Haynes was also a board member for the Summit-University Crime Prevention Council, the Model Cities Health Clinic and the United Way of the St. Paul Area.

As a member of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc., Brother Haynes serves as a role model to members of Minnesota's chapter. He and his wife have three adult children.





# 1988 Zeta Nu Sigma Chapter Audit

By Robert Doty and Lonnie Coleman

We have examined the financial records of Zeta Nu Sigma Chapter of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity for the period ending 12/31/88. Our examination consisted of purging monthly financial activity, in order to determine propriety. Propriety was determined through research and inquiry of chapter officials.

Our review proved inconclusive, but through examination we noted no evidence of impropriety. Our examination results offered the following list of suggestions for better maintenance of the Chapter treasury:

1. Monthly bank statements should be balanced and reconciled on a monthly basis. The checkbook should maintain a on-going balance.
2. Receipts should be given for all monies received. The receipts should be maintained in an orderly manner by the treasurer.
3. No reimbursements should be issued without proper receipts or documentation.
4. No checks should be issued without proper authorization form and approval.
5. All deposit slips should include check information and any other individual documentation for verification purposes.
6. A written Treasurers report should be presented at every meeting. The report should include total monthly deposits, disbursements (with description), and final balances of checking and savings accounts.
7. The official Chapter register should be used to record all monthly financial transactions.
8. No blank checks should be issued.
9. The Chapter president should establish the format of an audit committee to audit the Chapter's books on a periodic basis. A mandatory audit should be performed annually. The audit committee should be responsible for preparing the Schedule A section of the Chapter report.
10. No checks should be written for cash.
11. The treasurer should be responsible for maintaining the financial status of Chapter members.
12. All checks should be issued sequentially. If a check is destroyed or voided, it should be recorded accordingly.
13. All wire transfers from savings to checking should be made with proper written approval.

# State of the Chapter

The 1988 fiscal year for Zeta Nu Sigma Chapter ended in the grand style just as it began. Though management style changes slowed our progress in the first months of the new year, the Chapter prospered after the new objectives were understood. As explained by the new Executive Board, those objectives of the new administration are:

- Development of an executive and general board that can effectively direct and manage the affairs of this graduate Chapter.
- Identification and implementation of programs that encourage the membership's participation, due to a committed desire to fulfill a social and civic responsibility through their fraternity.

The most successful programs were those which followed the objectives as with the career fair, special olympics and the UNCF fundraiser. Of the programs in 1988, the least successful was the Reactivation and Dues Drive. Unclear objectives and misdirected fraternity priorities limited the success of this program.

We were also not successful in improving communication between the graduate and the only undergraduate chapter in the state. The problem is the generation of time between us commonly referred to as the generation gap. The undergraduates underestimate our role in their development. As graduate men, it is our duty to correct this locally and nationally for the future of Phi Beta Sigma is at stake. The Chapter newsletter was published but not with the frequency or enthusiasm to excite or motivate graduate Brothers. This task has been reassigned for 1989.

The Chapter was extremely fortunate to have had experienced Brothers transfer into our membership. These Brothers provided input and directed key programs in 1988. Our numbers were boosted by the transferred Brothers but not to the ranks of 1987. The other factor hurting our numbers was value that members place on their financial obligation to the national body. With economics as they are, the Brothers feel they receive far too little from the national headquarters for their money. This must be improved. The national needs more visibility with financial members to promote reinstatement of non financial members.

We have great expectations for the five men who recently crossed into Sigma in 1988. They have already been assigned to key positions where their talents will be used to direct 1989 programs. Many of our 1988 programs will be addressed again in 1989 with the only change being bigger and better outcomes for them all. With the resources available in Zeta Nu Sigma the future looks bright. The legacy of professionalism left to us by our departed founder, Brother Haynes is the ingredient that will help this Chapter retain its role model position in the Great Lakes Region.


