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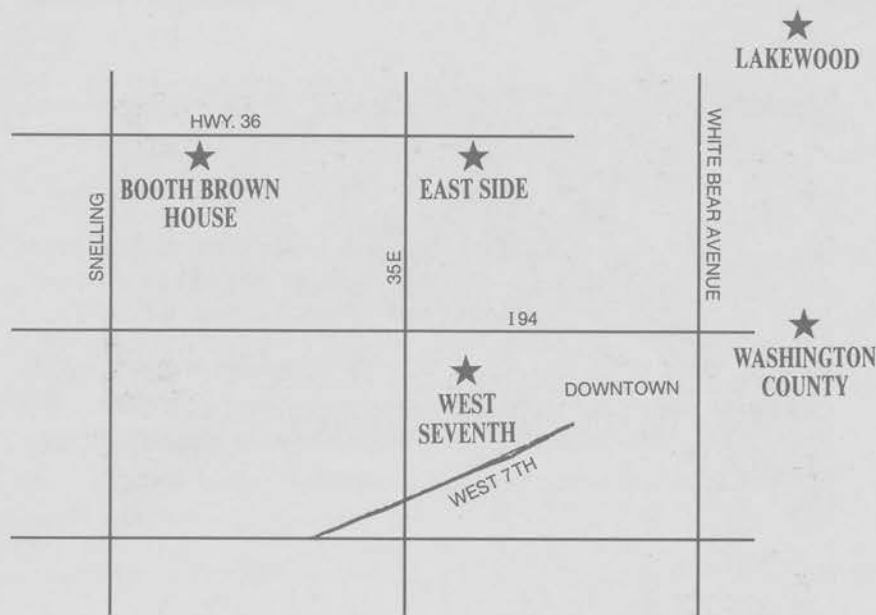

THE HISTORY OF THE SALVATION ARMY

IN 1865,

William Booth left the Methodist ministry to preach as an independent evangelist in the slums of London's East End. Many converts were won, but they didn't feel "at home" in churches, so Booth set up Christian Mission Centers.



IN 1878,

Booth adopted the name "The Salvation Army" for his organization. Missions became "corps"; members, "soldiers"; ministers, "officers"; and Booth himself, "General."

This "army" was furnished with uniforms, a flag, a brass band, and martial music. It met in tents, theaters, dance halls and the outdoors.



At first, the Army was persecuted by church people, because it was so unconventional. Despite this persecution, the Army successfully attacked social ills – hunger, homelessness and poverty.

Booth wrote a book called *In Darkest England and the Way Out*, which set a pattern for social welfare. He proposed to deal with social problems using totally private resources.



IN 1880,

Commissioner George Scott Railton and seven young women began work in New York City, helping the poor and combining Gospel preaching with social work.

Army work soon began to spread rapidly around the world – to India, Australia, South America, Pakistan and many European countries.



BY THE EARLY 1900'S,

The Salvation Army had thousands of officers and soldiers in 36 countries.

Many special services emerged, such as women's social work (1884), the first food depot (1888), the first day nursery (1890), and the first Army missionary hospital (1901).



DURING WORLD WAR II,

The Salvation Army operated 3,000 service units for the armed forces ... and led in the formation of the USO.

Since World War II, the Army has continued its own worldwide program.



TODAY --

The Salvation Army continues to work where the need is greatest, motivated by its faith in God and its love for all people!

The Salvation Army serves people in **102 COUNTRIES**

For example,
in places
such as:

THE USA

In many major American cities, The Salvation Army operates homeless and transitional shelters, group homes for people with mental retardation, drop-in centers for runaways and drug addicts, and programs to combat child abuse.

THE WEST INDIES

In Jamaica, the Army maintains an outstanding school, community and adult rehabilitation centers, a training college and a home for people who are blind.

RUSSIA

After a 65-year ban, the Army returned to Russia in 1991, and now has centers in Moscow and St. Petersburg.

PARIS

The Army has a barge on the River Seine to provide food and shelter for the homeless.

INDIA

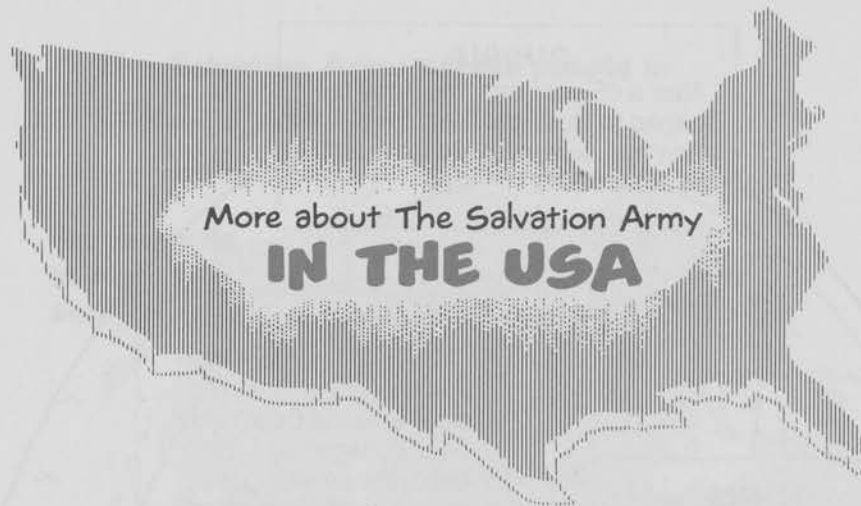
The Army has more than 4,900 centers, including the Catherine Booth Hospital at Nagercoil -- 50 buildings providing a variety of services (medical, surgical, rehabilitation) to thousands of patients each year.

AFRICA

The Army operates more than 4,000 centers across the continent, including schools for people who are blind and rehabilitation centers for children with physical disabilities.

ASIA

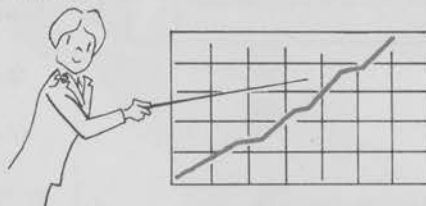
In Hong Kong, many young people learn trades at Army vocational training centers.

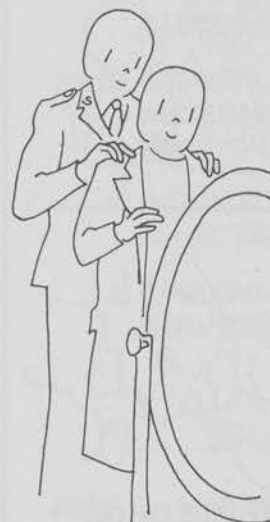

ELDERLY PEOPLE

Senior citizens are served through drop-in clubs, senior centers, housing facilities, friendly visitation in hospitals and nursing homes, and other programs, all designed to make their lives richer and more independent.

FAMILIES

Well staffed and thoroughly equipped day-care centers serve thousands of children and their parents. Counseling services cement family ties and help parents through difficult times.



YOUNG PEOPLE

An expanded network of summer camps, scouting groups and community centers for boys' and girls' clubs give children a chance to learn, grow and have fun!

DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSERS

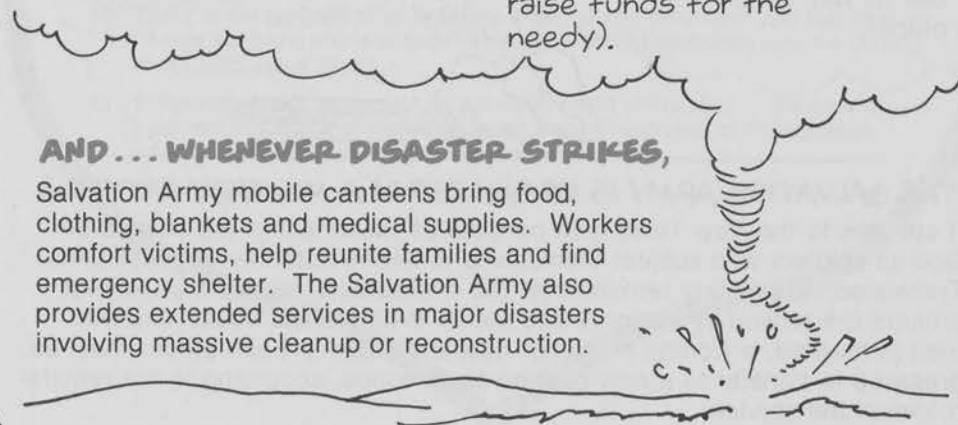
Counseling programs and rehabilitation centers for drug abusers have achieved excellent success rates. Salvationists run many alcoholism rehabilitation projects based in local communities.

The Salvation Army translates its faith into action by offering programs and services. The many **PROGRAMS THE ARMY OPERATES** around the world include:

- ☑ **EMERGENCY LODGES** and "skid row" centers
- ☑ **DISPENSARIES** and clinics
- ☑ **SERVICES TO PEOPLE WITH AIDS-RELATED ILLNESSES**
- ☑ **GENERAL AND MATERNITY HOSPITALS**
- ☑ **COUNSELING** for single parents
- ☑ **EMPLOYMENT SERVICES**
- ☑ **MISSING PERSONS BUREAUS**
- ☑ **SERVICE TO THE ARMED FORCES** (drop-in centers and military kits)
- ☑ **SERVICES IN CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTIONS**
- ☑ **ADULT REHABILITATION CENTERS**
- ☑ **SOCIAL SERVICE CENTERS**
- ☑ **CHRISTMAS APPEALS** and kettles (used to raise funds for the needy).

AND... WHENEVER DISASTER STRIKES,

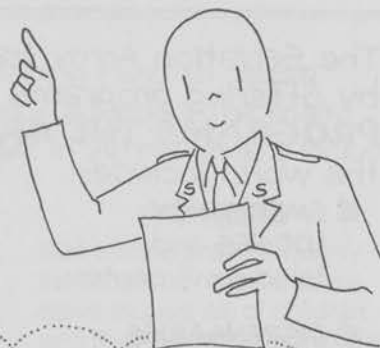
Salvation Army mobile canteens bring food, clothing, blankets and medical supplies. Workers comfort victims, help reunite families and find emergency shelter. The Salvation Army also provides extended services in major disasters involving massive cleanup or reconstruction.



ANYONE CAN JOIN THE SALVATION ARMY!

Soldiers must:

- be converted to Christ
- accept the doctrines of The Salvation Army (as summarized on the following page)
- agree to actively support the Army's principles and work.



There are 3 TYPES OF MEMBERS:

COMMISSIONED OFFICERS

— ordained ministers trained for full-time service in Salvation Army Schools for Officers' Training. These people dedicate their lives to the work of the Army. Each officer also belongs to a corps and is a soldier as well as an officer.

SOLDIERS

— members of the congregation who are in the local Corps Community Center (church-fellowship-social and community services).

ADHERENTS

— persons of good standing and character who, by attendance and financial support, consider The Salvation Army to be their place of worship.



THE SALVATION ARMY IS ORGANIZED IN A MILITARY PATTERN.

It adheres to the New Testament concept of enlistment in the service of God as soldiers who subject themselves to Divine authority and discipline. Translated into military terminology, the international leader is a General, officers are ranked by seniority and merit. Women hold equal rank with men (if married, a woman holds her husband's rank.) Each officer must be prepared to transfer to a new post on short notice, according to the requirements of the service.

DOCTRINES of The Salvation Army

THE SALVATIONIST BELIEVES

1. That the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments were given by inspiration of God, and they only constitute the divine rule of Christian faith and practice.
2. That there is only one God, who is infinitely perfect — the Creator, Preserver and Governor of all things, and who is the only proper object of religious worship.
3. That there are three persons in the Godhead — the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, undivided in essence and co-equal in power and glory.
4. That in the person of Jesus Christ the divine and human natures are united so that He is truly and properly God and truly and properly man.
5. That our first parents were created in a state of innocence but, by their disobedience, they lost their purity and happiness; and that in consequence of their fall all men have become sinners, totally depraved, and as such are justly exposed to the wrath of God.
6. That the Lord Jesus Christ has, by His suffering and death, made an atonement for the whole world, so that whosoever will may be saved.
7. That repentance toward God, faith in our Lord Jesus Christ and regeneration by the Holy Spirit are necessary to salvation.
8. That we are justified by grace, through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, and he that believeth hath the witness in himself.
9. That continuance in a state of salvation depends upon continued obedient faith in Christ.
10. That it is the privilege of all believers to be "wholly sanctified" and that their "whole spirit and soul and body" may be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.
11. In the immortality of the soul, in the resurrection of the body, in the general judgment at the end of the world, in the eternal happiness of the righteous and in the endless punishment of the wicked.

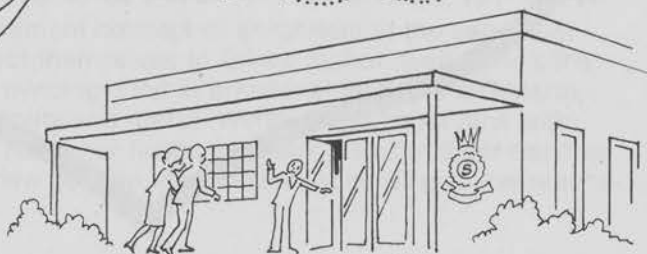
