Editorially ...

The Minnesota DeMolay Foundation is editing a new brochure that will be ready for distribution shortly, called "Minnesota DeMolay A Youth Organization". This brochure will supplement present literature that covers the history and purposes with information about the structure and organization of the Order of DeMolay in Minnesota and its relation to the International Supreme Council Organization.

MINNESOTA DEMOLAY A YOUTH ORGANIZATION

The Order of DeMolay is an organization for young men designed to build better citizens. It was founded in 1919 by the late Frank S. Land. Any young man, of good character, between the ages of 14 and 21 can, upon recommendation of two Chapter members, a Senior DeMolay or a Master Mason, apply for membership. Masonic relationship is not necessary to be eligible for membership.

DeMolay, an International organization, has 2500 Chapters in 12 countries and territories and lists the largest membership of any similar organization on earth. In Minnesota, there are 1900 members in 45 Chapters throughout the State, serving as agents for molding the character of the youth, building better citizenship and better leaders of tomorrow. It teaches love of parents, patriotism, reverence, cleanliness, courtesy, fidelity and toleration in a wholesome atmosphere among worthwhile associates.

The governing body of the Order is the International Supreme Council located in Kansas City, Missouri. It is composed of an elected Grand Master and five Officersprominent Masonic leaders from all parts of the world. Their office in Kansas City is the nerve center to keep DeMolay consistent in all jurisdictions. It is a source of unification, financed soley through the initiation fees paid by the new members.

DeMolayland is divided into jurisdictions, usually by states or parts of states, each supervised by an Executive officer who is an active member or deputy of the Supreme Council. He possesses and may exercise within his jurisdiction such power and authority as may be necessary to interpret the policies of DeMolay as outlined by the Supreme Council, or the Grand Master of DeMolay.

Each DeMolay Chapter has an Advisory Council, composed of at least six Master Masons. Advisors are appointed by the Executive officer upon recommendation by the Chapter's sponsoring body. This Council, as its name implies, advises Chapter Officers. It is purely legislative and ludicial. The members direct Chapter activiteis and finances through committees. One member acts as Council Chairman, another as Council Dad and the balance serve as chairman of a committee best adapted to his experience and talent, such as ritual, athletics, membership, etc., to aid and assist the young men with their

DeMolay Chapters have 23 Officers, four elective and the balance appointive by the Master Councilor. All serve six month terms, except the Treasurer who, because of the nature of the office, serves for one year. The Chapter is chartered by the Supreme Council to confer degrees, conduct membership drives, program projects and fun activities and send delegates to an annual Conclave. The Master Councilor is also a member of a State Congress, which meets to discuss Chapter programs, ideas and

A State Conclave planned once a year is conducted by the young men themselves. Delegates from each Chapter elect a State Master Councilor, Senior Councilor, Junior Councilor and Scribe-Treasurer. It hears committee reports, discusses and acts upon matters pertaining to the general welfare of DeMolay in the State in keeping with Supreme Council policies. State Officers, elected for one year, are responsible to the Executive Officer and the Supreme Council, through the will and pleasure of the Chapter delegates.

Normally, a DeMolay Chapter is self-supporting. The sponsoring body usually provides Chapter Advisors and facilities for meetings, but assumes no direct financial responsibilty for the Chapter. However, to promote the social, moral, fraternal, recreational and educational interests and welfare of these young men, an organization is needed and money to operate this organization is necessary.

Such funds are provided through the Minnesota De-Molay Foundation, Incorporated—a corporation designed to promote the interests and welfare of the young men by providing leadership and counsel through a Field Director, state administration and a central office for the state of Minnesota.

Membership in the Foundation includes representatives of the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free & Accepted Masons of Minnesota; the Scottish Rite; the York Rite; the Grotto; the Shrine; the DeMolay Legion of Honor Men and by virtue of their offices, the State Master Councilor and the International Supreme Council Executive Officer.

Masons in particular should be interested in this out standing youth movement. With the influence and inspiration the young men receive from the Masons serving as their adult advisors and from Masonic buildings housing their activities, they cannot help but become familiar generally with Freemasonry and thus be in a better position to seek Masonic light upon reaching their years of adulthood.

You as a Master Mason can be of invaluable help to this worthwhile youth organization by showing your interest in Minnesota DeMolay, both financially and personally.



118th GRAND LODGE COMMUNICATION

Grand Master Barnes opened the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of Minnesota, in the St. Paul Temple promptly at 10 a.m., April 1st.

Eleven Minnesota Past Grand Master, two other Past Grand Lodge Officers and 40 Masonic Leaders and distinguished guest from Minnesota, three Canadian Provinces and ten foreign jurisdictions were received and welcomed.

Thirteen resolutions were proposed, one being a Constitutional amendment was laid over for final action next year, one was lost and eleven were adopted. The resolution covering the establishment of a Memorial Lodge awaits final action next year; the resolution changing the composition of the Board of Corporate Trustees, by eliminating two past Grand Masters and replacing the number with Line Officers was adopted. The Board now has six top ranking Line Officers and two Past Grand Masters; the increase in the per capita tax, from \$3.00 to \$5.00 carried and is effective next year; permission for Lodges to change their by-laws to increase their dues, to take care of the two dollar per capita tax increase without the formality of Jurisprudence committee and Grand Master approval procedure was approved. However, the Grand Lodge office must be advised of the change and this new procedure does not include any changes other than the per capita increase; permission was granted for petition forms to now include a question regarding prior DeMolay membership; the composition of the Finance Committee was altered to remove the Deputy Grand Master, the Senior Warden to become chairman, the addition of the Junior Warden to take the place vacated by the Deputy Grand Master on the committee; auditing procedure removing the Lodge returns was approved; approval was also granted for the addition of a Long Range Planning Committee; there being some inequities in the payment of per diem, legislation was amended to clarify; the hold over Constitutional amendment covering the establishment of a foundation to accept and spend funds received from gifts, bequests, etc., was adopted. Legislation to change the membership of the Appropriations Committee was the only amendment that lost. The judgment of the Delegates that appointment of experience and talent was better procedure and necessary rather than establishing a committee composed of Line Officers possibly not trained or qualified in this kind of work, but by virtue of their office becoming members of this committee; the amendment permitting members of the Jurisprudence Committee to do committee work during Grand Lodge session was ap-

proved; the Delegates also approved the establishment of Table Lodges.

The Grand Secretary reported 274 chartered Lodges on the roll. Mystic Tie Lodge No. 37, Pine Island; Evansville Lodge No. 214, Evansville both surrendered their Charters. Onyx Lodge No. 266, Westbrook consolidated with Siloam Lodge No. 330, Jeffers. Membership has dropped from 62,876 to 61,515. There were 868 raised, 570 withdrew; 301 joined, 504 stricken, 57 restored, 1,513 deaths; 1,226 gain, 2,587 loss; 1,361 net loss. Financially it was stated that deficit spending was again necessary this year. Increased cost of Grand Lodge operation and the maintenance of the Home being greater than income because of membership decline and income drop. Other than the General Fund, the Reserve and Benevolent Funds were in good shape and well invested.

A suggested change in the age for petitioning the Fraternity will be offered for consideration next year. It is now required that a petitioner must be 21 years of age, in Minnesota, the proposed resolution will call for lowering this age to 18.

This was a busy session. A lot of work was accomplished. Attendance was not as good as it should have been, but this can probably be excused by the weather and travel conditions.

Hendrickson, Sr. Hopkins, Grand Marshal; Ross E. Fredrickson, Okebena, Grand Standard Bearer; Wesley H. Rethwill, Jr., Waseca, Grand Sword Bearer; Donald M. Severson, Minneapolis, Senior Grand Steward; A. Raymond Pavola, Duluth, Junior Grand Steward; Sam K. Dickinson, Jr. Aurora, Grand Pursuivant; George J. Wilson, St. Paul, Grand Tyler; Earl L. Lawrence Fink who was Worshipful Master of Capital CityLodge No. 217 at the time didn't agree, so he appointed a committee to do something about it. Donald E. Olsen, now Worshipful Master of the Lodge, is pleased to report that the committee was able to persuade Wor. Bro. Leland that his Masonic charity could be a real inspiration to other Masons to follow his example for a most worthy cause, and now it can be told.

The \$5,000 was given as a memorial to Helen Wright Eldridge to be used by the hospital at their discretion. Most Wor. Bro. Clyde E. Hegman, Past Grand Master, President of the Masonic Memorial Hospital Fund, Inc., indicated that the money would be used for research in the fight against cancer.


