The "Jack-Leg" Preacher

THIS piece is about two kinds of Preachers. One is the dedicated minister of I religion to whom people may look for spiritual guidance and leadership. The other is the faker who is too lazy or unwilling to work and lives by making a racket out of religion.

Prince Hall was a minister. In his early days in Boston he followed the trade of a leather worker taught him by his father in Barbadoes. Responding to the persistent call for spiritual leadership of his people, he left the workbench and prepared for the Christian ministry. From this vantage point he was drawn naturally into the Masonic Fraternity; for then even as now the life of the masses of the Negro people was largely organized around two centers-the church and the fraternal organization. The first Negro Grand Lodge of Negro Freemasons was organized under the leadership of Prince Hall in Boston, Massachusetts, June 24, 1791.

The second Grand Lodge of Negro Freemasons was organized in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, December 27, 1815. The leaders in that enterprise were Absalom Jones, an Episcopal priest, and Richard Allen, a Methodist minister who founded the African Methodist Episcopal Church in his fight against segregation in that denomination.

There are over three hundred thousand Prince Hall Masons in this country today. Prominent in the building of that great organization are the honored names of many christian ministers who are held and deserve to be held in grateful esteem. This tribute to Masons of the cloth is our method of separating the sheep from the goats and to make it possible to speak plainly concerning a certain species of rascals who plunder the unfortunate among their own people. This reference is to the class of racketeers who, like the rest of their ilk, live on their wits. Their techniques are well established and uniformly followed. Take the typical illustration of "Rev." "Dr." Jackleg: First by self-ordination he becomes overnight a "prophet" of the "Holy Live Forever Saints." Next he secures a tabernacle-usually an empty and unrentable store which he dedicates with a smear over its show windows to blank out the peering and curiosity of the "great unwashed." One day he receives through the mails an offer like the circular letter addrssed to "preachers" from which the following excerpt is taken:

MASONS, beside having a Christian Program, is asking every Religious Leader to help us maintain a clean Christian Program the year round.

To help in this, we offer every Pastor a Free Membership, and an opportunity to earn \$\$\$'s while bringing a clean Fraternal Program to the community to co-operate with the Church.

Here is what we will pay you:

- 1. Just for calling a meeting to organize a club for a Lodge, you as the Pastor will receive 50¢ for each person attending.
- 2. You will receive \$1.00 for each person attending who will join and pay at least \$1.00 on his application, (if 10 persons join, you will receive \$10.00).
- 3. For each person paying his joining fee in full, you will receive

This is the greatest opportunity ever afforded for you to make some real money. The Deputy will pay the Minister, and the Supreme Office will repay the 50¢ for each member attending.

He accepts this opportunity "to make an easy buck." And so recruiting for bogus masonry becomes a profitable adjunct to his "Church." Eventually he capitalizes on the experience thus acquired and organizes a "Masonic" order of

This brief sketch explains the fact that so large a percentage of clandestine masonic outfits are organized or manned by "Jack-leg" preachers. And what is a "Jack-leg preacher?" Answer: A "Jack-leg" preacher is a shrewd, semi-illiterate racketeer who preys upon the underprivileged members of his own group in the name of religion, adding thereto any other accompaniments which he finds profitable. Clandestine Masonry is one of these other accompaniments.

The Sovereign Grand Commander Retires as Corporation Counsel Of The City Of New Haven

In the middle of his fourth term the Sovereign Grand Commander has retired as the head of the Legal Department of the City of New Haven. This action brings to a close a half century of almost continuous public service to his adopted home city. Commenting on his reluctance to accept reappointment in December, 1959, Crawford said in his letter to Lee:

"You will recall that when I received your letter in December, 1959, appointing me to a fourth term as corporation counsel of the city, I indicated my reluctance to accept the same and only did so because of difficult problems then confronting your administration.

"Many of these were making heavy and insistent demands upon this office, and it seemed to me that to withdraw at that time would be less than conscientious.

> Widely recognized as an authority on municipal law, Crawford, over the years, has been a member of or counsel for four city charter commissions studying and making suggestions for improving the legal basis of the government. He has also served as charter revision consultant for numerous Connecticut towns.

The Wind of Change Is Blowing

WHEN I returned from Rome in mid-January as the newly elected president of the International Conference of Social Work I was irritated as well as amused by the emphasis placed by the New York press on my election. The headlines ran something like this, "First Negro To Head International Body," thereby following the lead of the Daily American published in Rome and the overseas wire services which immediately followed suit.

The talk in Executive Committee meetings was not of developing national interest in Asia, for such interest was already strongly established. In fact, the Asians were making plans for a regional conference of their own in 1963. The focus of organizing attention was Africa -how to set up National Committees most quickly in Nigeria and Ghana, in Somaliland and Morocco, in Tunisia and Liberia. For only Committees representing independent countries can become formally affiliated with the Conference.

The next Conference will be in 1962 and in Brazil's metropolis of Rio. One Brazilian delegate said to me after my election, "I can hardly wait for 1962 when you will open the Conference's session in our Rio!" I knew what she meant. She had reference to the strong infiltration of the African blood into the Brazilian population. She was thinking of the tremendous emotional impact that would result from the experience of an American of African descent presiding in Afro-Indian-Portugese Brazil at an international gathering bringing together people from literally every quarter of the globe. Here is the wind of change blowing not from Africa and Asia into Europe, but gathered in Rome from those continents and blowing across the ocean through the United States into a resurgent Latin America with the promise of new inter-cultural and international understanding that comes from people forgetting race and working together merely as people. It will be a fine thing when American public opinion begins to feel and respond to that wind.

A Distinction With A Difference

Judge George E. Bushnell 33°, Sovereign Grand Commander of the Northern Supreme Council (White) A.A.S.R., testified in a recent case in Philadelphia brought by this Supreme Council and the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania against a group of Fitzpatrick bodies. On cross-examination Judge Bushnell, after pointing out the difference between social recognition and acknowledgment of legitimacy, testified as follows in response to questions by the defendants' counsel:

Q-Judge Bushnell, you have already defined and distinguished the word "Clandestine." Is there any other Negro Masonic body in the United States that the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States or the Supreme Council recognizes as being legitimate other than Prince

A-No, sir. * * * * We know that Prince Hall is legitimate.

Q-Are you in a position at this point, Judge, to tell me why?

A-We know that they are legitimate in their origin. We know that they are right in their philosophy. We know that they are trying to benefit mankind. We know that a lot of these other groups are just commercializing Masonry and preying on their fellow citizens and adding to the misery of the world and we don't want to have any part of it.



His interests are wide and varied. He is a trustee of St. John's AME Church and a former superintendent of its Sunday school





THIS will introduce Illustrious E. Winfred Helm 33°, a native of Mt. Vernon, Illinois, the Inspector General who is responsible for most of the photographs reproduced in the BULLETIN and for the moving pictures of the Annual Sessions of the Supreme Council made for preservation in its archives.
