Traverse des Sioux January 1st 1855

Dear Friend

It is about bed time but I have been writing a little and would like to bid you a happy New Year before I go to bed O 'tis a great comfort that for the small sum of 3 cents we can have a New Years interview. May I not hope you are writing to me to night. Your step father got a letter from you last mail from which we have heard that you expected to go to teaching school I hope you will find it both pleasant and profitable. There has nothing of note transpired here since I last wrote. I am still on nettles about the timber claim I dont know what I ought to say or do to Fournier. Your step Father seems to think that it is not possible to do any other way than to go by Uncle Sams survey But I do not think Fournier has any right at all to come over your line If I had only been smart enough to have gone out there as soon as it was surveyed and straightened up. I suppose there would have been no trouble I do feel & feel deeply and sorely that I have not done my duty in this thing I deserve to be cast off by you as an unfaithful partner O that I could now remedy it But Alas! it is too late This lags as a heavy weight upon my spirits. I have not done much towards making rails yet Your step Father & I made a bargain that He would make rails as many days for me as I would haul for him. We have made about 800 rails and stakes He has helped me 8 days You will laugh but perhaps we will get a good many yet before spring I want about 3600 I expect to make mine all on the N.W. 40 of the plot I scratched for you. There is about 25 acres of it and I thought you would rather have the one the shanty is on and I did not want to make on i & theis you take it I am pretty stout Uncle John says I can make as many rails as any body but I cannot I can

average about 80 a day It is late I must close Farewell write soon & often to your Friend A W HUGGINS

I sold old Bill to day for \$49.00 \$20. down & the rest soon I could send you if you want it \$75.00. I hardly know what to do but hop to hear from you again soon The cattle have been running out all winter at some hay stacks on Mr Heweys claim I got a couple of yoke up & hauled rails a few days They were very Buckish at first as fiery as any horses you ever saw but they were oxen before I quit We have had positively the handsomest Dec. that ever was seen in any country & January bids fair to be ditto Minnesota lovely Minnesota this is the country to live in all except the fruit I am in a terrible mess, fuss or distress about where to put my field I picked out a place once and broke nearly 2 acres but I have been thinking of changing and coming up to my north line north of the sugar trees I wish you were here to advise me but you are not & I do not know what to do I do not exactly like the idea of living over out of sight facing all those Marshes Still in the hill side over by the water hole would be a good place for a root house cowsheds &.c. &.c. and there is the water too good all the year One argument against another I find it very difficult to decide but decide I must and I think it likely that when you come back you will see 10 or 15 acres under cultivation just south of Doctors Marsh If I am spared.

The clock is striking eleven only one more hour remains of the first day of the New Year. What changes have taken place during the last year! God only knows what changes will take place this year I feel sorry & ashamed to see how I have commenced this year How little I have thought of God O that I may spend 1855 better than 1854 But I must stop my Egotism Give my love to grandmother I have written to Uncle Isaac No more at present
