 I am glad to hear
 you are well. I am
 well. I have not had
 much of the
 performance. These
 are all well. I go
 out about every eight
 days. I am quite
 well. I have been out
 duty every day since
 we came here, except
 Sundays, and Sundays
 when it fell to my lot.
 The boys are all
 in tolerable good health.
 Thomas has got
 to be a great fat old
 fellow and as full of
 energy as a boy of ten
 years old. I have often
 thought what Chastity
 would say if she
 could see him in some
 of his positions.
 We have not had
 preaching here for
 weeks. Before that we
 had preaching nearly
 every Sabbath. About
 six weeks ago the
 story I think is his name
 from Lake Albert Lee
 preached here. He is a
 very intellectual man
 and a very good man.
 If you could have
 heard him and not seen
 him, you would have
 been very much
 surprised.

doubt if you could have decided whether
it was Mr. Stiggs preaching or not. I never
heard two preachers preach so near alike even
to the tone and accent. The (Mr. Strong) is
acquainted with the Lowery of our Presby-
tery. He says Mr. L. does not preach often
now. I think he said it was on account of
his health. There is a poor Indian woman
near here that I very much pity. She is very
near gone with the consumption. Her and her
husband came out here from Wisconsin
to make them a new house. She is a German.
I have not seen her out of their tent since they
came here. They have no children. I think her
husband or man does not care much for her.
He is around here a good deal and leaves her
out on the prairie in a little old cloth tent
with out any one to stay with her. I don't
think he stays away at night at all. He
says she is not afraid to sleep alone. I don't know
as she is a proper one. Her husband is very proper.
Her husband says he has a good English education.
Speaks English. Tell P. I wish he would send
me 50 or 100 worth of P. M. stamps. This is my last
piece of paper and no money to get more.

To all to whom these presents shall come: I,
Jonas Pettigrew of ~~Waukegan~~ ^{Waukegan} in the
County of Nicollet, in the State of Minn-
nesota, Administrator of the goods and
estate which were of Amos W. Huggins
late of Nicollet County, deceased, send
greeting: Whereas, By an order of
the Probate Court of the said County
of Nicollet and State of Minnesota, made
at a session of said Probate Court held
at Saint Peter within said County, on
the 10th day of February A.D. 1863, the
29th day of March A.D. 1863, at 11 o'clock
in the forenoon at the office of the Judge
of Probate, in Saint Peter, in said County
of Nicollet, was assigned for the hearing
of a petition of James W. Hattislaw praying
for reasons therein set forth and especially
for the reason that the said Amos W. Huggins
shortly before his death had sold and delivered
certain lands hereinafter described to the
said petitioner James W. ~~Hattislaw~~ ^{Hattislaw} who appeared
from certain writings and evidence produced
by said James W. ~~Hattislaw~~ ^{Hattislaw} but had neg-
lected or been unable to make to said
James W. ~~Hattislaw~~ ^{Hattislaw} a formal and full
deed and conveyance of said lands, notwithstanding the purchase price of said

land had been fully paid; And whereas
the said Petitioner gave notice in conform-
ity to the order of said Court of the
pendency of the said petition and the
hearing thereof, by causing a copy of
the order of said Probate Court for said
hearing, signed by E. A. Brown, Judge
of Probate for said County and Court,

West $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 8 Town 110 North of Range
26 West, bounded as follows, to wit: beginning
at the West $\frac{1}{4}$ Part Sec. 8 thence $78\frac{3}{4}^{\circ}$ on $\frac{1}{4}$
line $72\frac{3}{4}$ Rods, thence South 12° East 44
Rods, thence South $78\frac{3}{4}^{\circ}$ West $72\frac{3}{4}$ Rods
to section line, thence North 12° West on
section line 44 Rods to place of beginning
containing 20 acres, in McCollet County
and State of Tennessee, to have and to
hold the above granted premises, to the said
James W. Hollschow, his heirs and assigns,
to his and their behoof and use forever, together
with all and singular the appurtenances and
hereditaments therunto belonging, on and

an wise effecting, And I, the said ~~James~~
Pettijohn, for myself, my heirs, executors and
Administrators, do hereby covenant with
the said James W. Hollistown, his heirs and
assigns, that in pursuance of the orders
of said Court I make this conveyance,
and that in all respects I have complied
with said orders.
