Dear Jane.

I have waited so long for an answer to my letter and have not recieved one yet so I have come to the conclusion that you must either be sick or very busy or else did not recieve mine.

We have a Bible class every Sabbath evening at seven o'clock and Mr Adams is the teacher. We have Sabbath school in the morning and the younger children go to it, and the Indian children

We have singing school Tuesday evening and Friday evenings.

Tuesday evening we have it at Mr. Adams, and Friday evening we have
it at our house. Every two weeks we have a soirce, and we play on
the melodeon.

Last evening after prayer meeting we were sitting sewing when we heard Howanke had come. We all started up and ran to the door but pretty soon Alfred (who had gone to see if there was any mail) came back and said he had not brought any mail from Traverse, he had only a few letters from Doctor Williamson's place. we were very much disappointed but we could not make him bring any mail.

We had examination yesterday of both the white children and the Indians. We had it down at the meeting house, the walls of which were partly covered with the Indians girls patchwork, with their names written on them. first we sung Friends we bid you welcome here &c. and then papa heard the Indian scholars read. Then we sung Try Try again The Hobby Horse and Lovely Rose Then Anna Jane Harriet read. Next Angelique Lydia and Thomas read Then Miss Spooner played America and sung the Sioux words to it Then us children did some sums on the black board and then Alfred Miss Hary and I played a piece on the melodeon and then we sung Children go

to and fro &c then Alfred Isabella and I recited in Geography then
John spoke a piece and then Thomas [hole in paper] spelled. Let us
with a cheerful mind Send our lives uprightly Virtue's paths e'er
taking All that's ill forsaking, Come let us all unite in this And
contentment we'll possess And then we'll all be glad glad glad. And
then we'll all be glad. We clapped our hands at the words glad glad,
and one of the Indians said Why dont you sing that all the time then
John and Joseph read, and then Sophia and Rosalie read. Then Harriet,
Anna, Angelique and I spoke a verse each of us. Then we sung Tis
near the spot in which I dwell &c. and then We're a band of free men,
and Miss Spooner played it, and then Isabella and I read & Miss Mary

and then Mr Adams prayed.

Traverse des Sioux August 11 1852

Rev S. B. Treat Dear Sir

You know that I have been expecting to ask a release from the service of the A.B.C.F.M. It seems to me the time has come when I should ask for such release And I am happy to state that so far as I know this mission is out of debt Last year the high water destroyed most of our crop and we had to buy a good deal of extra provision But having hired out a horse and a yoke of oxen I have been able to meet this demand

I will tell you some of the principal things we have at this station. There is one horse sixteen head of cattle one old wagon nearly worn out three log chains two of them broken one broad ax &C. 3 or 4 plows. We have in our house one clock one bureau one table one stand three cheap bedsteads besides a few home made affairs cupboard book case &C. and two stoves & I might mention scythes augers chisels axes hoes &C. Now I think we should have all our household stuff. One yoke of Oxen one log chain two plows one cow & calf and perhaps something to make beef next winter.

There has been an offer of three hundred dollars for the house at the same time the man said that it was more than it was worth Now as we have no house prepared to go to I would like to purchase this one And although it did not cost three hundred dollars I think it will be worth that to me perhaps there are other things which I should have mentioned in this letter but I must close Mr Riggs has taken away one cow & Dr Williamson a yoke of oxen When I entered on the work of assistant missionary I thought it was for life And now if I could see how I could be useful in the work with out neglecting my own family I would like to labor in it But it seems plain that we should withdraw And we have great reason to thank the Lord for his kind care over us among this heathen people And although our success

has not been all that we hoped for I have never regretted entering on the work Gods word will not return void

We have eight children four of them profess to love the Lord O that they may all be useful in life and happy in death I hope we shall never lose our interest in the missionary work


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







