nips Dr. W. says his name is Okaro
Gate^{that is the one eyed man}xica Waxtinape
Beji hiyanpa and Wakan
haxica went with Jona and
me to the meadow for a load of
rails and troubled Hig and
I very much and vexed me
more than a little

Gonas & I cut & split an
elm log that lay in ^{in the hollow} pasture

I saw Cijihyanpo throw a club at ^(the calves)

Jan 31st 1846 Rose at six O C

picked the gravel stones out of
one keg of wheat & ground it in
the forenoon & in the after

noon hauled 3 sled loads
of wood from the pasture

I gave Thunderface a small bag
of wheat & two turnips And he
renewed his promise to pay for
a bull which he got some years ^(ago)
February 2nd 1846 There were
forty at meeting yesterday & ten at
school today snow a half an
inch deep this morning we hauled
a little wood on the sled Tyopanyan
brought Red home with his horses
The Tanner brought the draw knife
home We had five Indians in for
supper and some half dozen crowded
out before supper time

Feb 4th We got letters from
our children in Ohio The Tanner
& his wife brought things to lay a
way Jane W. is somewhat sick

Feb 6th 1846 Dr. W. & I went to
look at Ned, found a cow
and calf a red cow & white
calf Psincinea Tawa

Feb 8th Nearly forty at
meeting Old Roy & young Roy
were among the number

Feb 9th Sister Fanny some-
what sick I helped Aunt Jane
in school ten girls & women
sharpened Aunt Jane's ^(knives) pen knives

Feb 18th Cleaned the clock

Drew off a psalm into my Sioux Hymn-
Book

1846

Began to seed wheat
March 9th sowed
oats March 16th

Brothers of Hokaida
Rupaiasna and
Marpiya catka
Anogite

Waxtete & Waxtchinampe
Tahonpe
Bukita Siwanka

March 26th 1846

Our third son & sixth child
was ^{born} at half past twelve O.C.
A.M. present Dr. W. & Wife

April 5th Mr. R. Died

April 12th ^{Renville} gave to
Mr Renville's children

forty lbs of flour & five
lbs of dried Buffalo meat

April 24th 1846 Helped
Antoine Renville plough
His Garden

25 ploughed Mr. McLeod's
Garden & some for us
in our field and run
off in rows with J.C.

Gravesides Sioux
Jan 5th 1847 Found
water in the well

April 15th 1853 Moved
out to Hickory Hill

April 18th Hauled two loads
of posts & the Currant Bushes

Sept 14. 1853 Settled
with Charles & John Snyder
for building our house



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
