- 1. Energy. You should stress the fact that you are hopeful that the conferees will resolve the differences in these bills in the Administration's favor. You might reiterate that you believe the energy program is the most important domestic policy initiative of your Administration, that the success of this legislation will determine the success of your Presidency's first year and that it could be a benchmark for your entire Presidency. You might also remind the leadership that you are not the only one with an important stake in this matter the American public will also be watching the Congress very closely to determine how it deals with our energy problems.
- 2. Energy Tax Bill. You might direct some comments on the energy tax bill toward Senator Byrd. The tax bill which will be reported by the Finance committee later this week represents an approach entirely different from that proposed by the Administration, but it is probably the only type of energy tax legislation which could pass the Senate at this time. We need to get a bill to conference and this bill cannot be one that is more generous with tax credits and tax incentives than the Finance committee's bill.
- 3. Panama Canal Treaties. You might want to discuss the treaties in light of the statement of understanding issued last Friday.
- 4. Nuclear Non-Proliferation Legislation. The bill which was passed unanimously by the House on September 28 and

reported unanimously by the Senate Foreign Relations and Governmental Affairs Committees is now on the Senate calendar. Senator Byrd, however, will not schedule any bill for which he cannot get a time agreement. Senators McClure and Domenici have several amendments they have threatened to bring up and they will not agree to a time limit. You should let Senator Byrd know of your interest in prompt consideration of this bill. We will lose 3 months in the renegotiating process if we do not pass this bill.

5. Social Security. We are working with the leadership to secure passage of a bill this year. In the Senate, the Finance Committee remains deadlocked at 9-9. Senator Nelson who is managing the Administration's proposal in the Committee is modifying his approach somewhat in an effort to pick-up enough votes to break the tie.

In the House, we are working to secure passage of the Fisher amendment. The bill as presently written makes no sense -- it legislates a study but requires universal coverage regardless of the outcome of the study. The Fisher amendment would revise the bill by authorizing a study and then implementing the findings of that study. Without the Fisher amendment, the votes are not there to pass the bill.

- 6. <u>Hospital Cost Containment</u>. The bill is probably dead for this year because there is no agreement on the major issues addressed in the bill. The Rostenkowski Ways and Means Subcommittee is the key to breaking the logjam, and he is displeased with us because he believes we have ignored his candidates for slots within the Administration.
- 7. IFI's. The bill will be taken up by the House on Tuesday. You need to ask the leadership to take a major role during the floor debate. If they are not active, the bill is in real trouble. You should also ask the Speaker to get Mahon involved actively.
- 8. Supplemental Appropriations (B-1 and Clinch River Breeder Reactor). Will be taken up on the Floor of the House on Wednesday. A move will be made to remove the contingent authority from the \$80M appropriation for CRBR. If this is done, it will be questionable if a veto of the ERDA Authorization bill would actually stop funds from going to the CRBR.

Congressman Sikes plans to offer an amendment to authorize \$1.4B for FY'78 to continue production of the B-1.

You should let the leadership know just how seriously you view these moves.

Miscellaneous

- 1. You should speak privately with Senator Byrd either before the breakfast or ask him to stay for a few minutes following the meeting. You should advise him that you are meeting this week with various Senators on energy and that Frank will keep him advised of the time and participants of these meetings. You should tell him that you welcome him to sit in on any or all of these meetings.
- 2. The Speaker will be having breakfast with the Vice President on Wednesday.
- 3. As a result of your asking at last week's breakfast, two things have happened:
 - a. The Outer Continental Shelf bill will be given a rule on Wednesday.
 - b. The conferees have agreed to a 4-year extension on minimum wage.

You should thank Senator Byrd and the Speaker for their help on this.

III. AGENDA

- 1. Energy. You should emphasize the need to reach a resolution on this bill. The public is expecting legislation from this session of Congress. You should state that you are willing to do what you can on this matter so that the mutually agreed upond adjournment date can be met.
- 2. ERDA Authorization (Clinch River Breeder). This bill contains \$80M for the Clinch River Breeder. Your present intention is to veto the ERDA authorization. You should be aware that the supplemental appropriations, which will be taken up by the House this week, contains \$150M for the breeder contingent upon authorization. The information we have is that the supplemental appropriations bill will be amended to strike the phrase "subject to authorization" which will in turn make a veto of the authorization bill useless. You should discuss this issue with the Speaker.

Supplemental Appropriations. You asked for a report on the provisions of the supplemental. I have attached a copy of the House report with appropriate passages marked. (Tab B)

3. B-1. The supplemental appropriations will also be used as a vehicle to fight the B-1 issue in the House. Congressman Sikes plans to author an amendment authorizing \$1.4B to go ahead with full scale production. You should let the leadership know that this is very much on your mind.

- 4. White House Authorization. You should mention privately to the Speaker that the Vice President is working with Congressman Udall to develop the bill that you will be sending to the Hill shortly on White House authorizations. You should ask the Speaker for his assistance is seeing that the bill is passed as submitted.
- 5. Public Financing. The House intends to pass and attach to the Senate-passed bill, a provision for public financing of House elections thus forcing the Senate to fish or cut bait. The Speaker may raise this issue tomorrow. You should stay far away from this internal struggle.
- 6. Tax reform package. If the question of the timing of your sending this package to the Congress is raised, you should avoid making a commitment. Discuss with the Speaker privately.
- 7. $\underline{\text{IFI's.}}$ You should thank the Speaker and Jim Wright for all of their help on this issue. The vote will be Wednesday afternoon.

Further on Jim Wright. Jim may bring up the matter of the move of HUD employees in Forth Worth. (See attached memorandum at Tab C). I have spoken to Jay Janis on this matter. He said it would require a decision by you for HUD to make this move. While Pat Harris is not insensitive to Jim Wright or caustic or rude, she does not want to be pushed around by him.

- 8. Hospital Cost Containment. Rostenkowski believes that there is no chance to pass this bill this session. There is simply no way to get the membership of the Health Subcommittee to agree on what the bill should contain in the time left.
- 9. Outer Continental Shelf. Now pending before the Rules Committee. Had been a high priority of ours earlier. You should talk to the Speaker. It is important that we get this bill passed this year. We will have a very hard time passing it next session. Industry will mount an intensive effort to kill it which they were not able to do this session because of their preoccupation with energy.
- 10. Charlie Ferris' Swearing-In. Speaker may discuss with you. (See Tab D)
- 11. Because of your interest, the stage in the Congressional process and outside pressures, the following could be passed in the House this session if we stress their importance:
- a) Bankruptcy; b) Regulation Q; c) Indo-China Refugees; and

d) Public Officials Integrity.

12. Jim McIntyre will attend this meeting. You should introduce Jim to the Leadership and point out his importance to you during the budget process.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

As you know, during the election, Jim Wright coordinated our North Texas campaign, stepping in with his personal prestige and settling the dispute between old and new Carter supporters.

He met with members of the Peanut Brigade, rode with them on the bus, and spoke well of you in every campaign appearance 60 170 he made while he was running for Majority Leader.

He had a completely different idea from you on economic stimulus, but once yours was decided upon, he backed it to the hilt. Wright helped us forge the coalition in the House that allowed us to defeat deregulation of natural gas which is tough for a Texas Congressman to do, and he took plenty of heat on it at home. He is out-front on the Panama Canal because he believes in it, but he could believe in it and do so quietly. He and Chairman Mahon are pulling our chestnuts out of the fire on IFI's.

Jim Wright has asked for three appointments; we have given him one part-time appointment. He asked for an Administration spokesman to go to address the Texas Municipal League; Pat Harris, Bob Embry nor any of the HUD hierarchy were able to help him. He has now asked me to help him on something and I think we should do it.

During the Nixon Administration, over 200 HUD employees were moved from the regional office in Forth Worth to quarters in Dallas. The building which HUD occupies in Dallas is shared by the Federal Courts, and they are about to make a formal request for use of the entire building. GSA has indicated that there is space available in Forth Worth for relocation of the HUD offices. In view of the fact that most of the HUD employees maintained their homes in Forth Worth after the move, Jim Wright asks that this move back to Forth Worth be approved.

Jim will continue to be a good soldier even if we do not deliver on this, but I hope that we can help.

It is possible that the Speaker will raise this issue with you at breakfast. I have not had a chance to discuss this with you and the Vice President has been reluctant to do so. In order to have Charlie's swearing-in here, we would need your personal approval.

Dear Tip:

As we discussed on the phone this morning, the failure of the Congress to enact the fiscal year 1978 Appropriations Bill for this Department and others has become a matter of grave concern. It is imperative, if this Department and State and local governments throughout the nation are to function responsibly, that the Congress either enact the Appropriations Bill this week or pass a continuing resolution.

As Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, I am, of course, immediately concerned with the more than 135,000 HEW employees who next Tuesday, October 18, will receive only half the paycheck to which they are entitled. But it is essential for the Congress to recognize that in addition to these Federal employees, we contribute to the salaries of 650,000 employees at the State and local level. Every single State and most cities and counties are affected by the inability of Congress to act.

The Department of Health, Education, and Welfare is the chosen instrument of the Congress to work with the most vulnerable citizens of our society -- the poor, the disabled and handicapped, the children, the sick, and the old. Thousands of these individuals will not receive benefits to which they are entitled if the Congress does not act this week. I know that you are as anxious as I am to avoid the profound and severe human suffering that will result if Congress does not act.

Here are a few specific examples:

-- If there is no appropriation by the end of the month, 475,000 Black Lung beneficiaries cannot receive their check due the first week in November.

-- Under letters of credit, States are not allowed to draw cash to cover any FY 1978 costs for formula grants. Some allocations under the following formula grants are due in October:

Maternal and Child Health State Health Departments (314-D) Impact Aid Education for the Handicapped Aging Rehabilitation

We do not know what States will be able to operate with carryover funds; however:

- o Texas has informed us that it will furlough 612 employees on October 12 because of the lack of Maternal and Child Health and State Health Department formula grants;
- o Idaho does not have any carryover money to fund its nutrition and community service programs for the aging;
- o Kansas and Missouri report that they do not know how long they can keep their employees on the job to administer their 314-D and Maternal and Child Health Programs.
- -- State rehabilitation agencies are beginning to run out of money to process eligibility determinations for applicants for Social Security disability benefits. No obligations for this purpose can be made after October 1. This means that many eligible disabled people will not be able to receive benefits until there is an appropriation. We have been informed that as of October 12, New York State will be unable to meet its payroll for employees to process the determinations.
- -- About 12% of the Head Start programs serving 35,000 children would normally receive funding in October. A significant number of these programs will run out of funds this month. There will thus be no pay for Head Start workers in those programs, most of whom are among the poor or near poor. It will also mean that thousands of Head Start children will not be served.

- There are more than 1,700 health project grants due for refunding in October, including grants for mental health and community health services. We do not know which grantees can continue on credit or carryover funds, but some will undoubtedly not be able to do so. For example, on Friday, we were informed by the North Memphis Health Center, which was due \$100,000 on October 1, that it does not know how long it can hold out.
- -- More than 135,000 of our employees will receive only one week's pay (half their normal paycheck) on October 18 if we do not have an appropriation by Thursday, October 13, and no pay thereafter.

As you can see, the operations of this Department are being seriously disrupted. Critical problems are developing which affect our beneficiaries, grantees, and contractors for essential services. These problems are intensifying as each day passes. We have set up a daily reporting system within HEW to identify specific emergency situations and I shall keep you advised.

I realize that the House and Senate have been deadlocked on an issue of deep conviction to both sides -- under what circumstances Federal funds should be used to pay for abortions. I also realize that men of great talent and good faith on the Appropriations Committees of each house of Congress have been working to achieve a resolution of their differences and that these differences involve matters of public policy and conscience. If it will take more time to resolve their differences, then I think it grossly unfair to hold the vulnerable people of our nation and thousands of Federal and State employees hostage to these complex and emotional negotiations.

If it is impossible to reach agreement by Thursday, October 13, then I urge you to pass a continuing resolution, for however brief a period of time, so that public servants can continue to get paid and so that the old and the young, the disabled and the poor may receive benefits to which they are entitled. These are innocent bystanders to an issue that deeply troubles this nation and the Congress. They should not suffer because that issue, as it surfaces in the Appropriations Bill, has not be resolved.

I know how deeply concerned you are about this matter and I ask you to do whatever you can to assist.

I am sending a similar letter to Chairmen Mahon and Flood.

SUBJECT: Canadian Gas Pipeline Approval Legislation

The Alaska Natural Gas Transportation Act of 1976 assigned to the President responsibility for selecting a route for bringing natural gas from Alaska to the lower 48 states and set forth a specific method by which Congress is to review the President's decision.

Under the statute, a Joint Resolution approving the President's decision must pass the Congress within 60 legislative days after the President reports his decision or the President must make a new decision. The Joint Resolution becomes privileged 30 days after the President submits his decision.

President Carter submitted his decision (the Canadian route) on September 22. The Dingell Energy Subcommittee of Commerce completes hearings on the decision this week and the full Committee will markup and report a Joint Resolution on October 18. The Committee will be ready to bring the Resolution (which is privileged after October 22) to the Floor on October 25. It must be considered this Session to meet the 60 legislative days requirement.



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
