MACALESTER COLLEGE CLASS OF 1950

Walter F. Mondale '50 began his career in politics and public service while still a Macalester student, working for Hubert Humphrey's Minneapolis mayoral campaign in 1946 and helping to manage Humphrey's successful U.S. Senate campaign in 1948. After undergraduate study at Macalester and the University of Minnesota, he received his LL.B. degree from the University of Minnesota School of Law. He served as Minnesota State Attorney General (1960-64), member of the U.S. Senate (1964-77), Vice President of the United States (1977-81) and the Democratic party's nominee for U.S. President (1984). He spent the next nine years in the practice of law, most recently as a partner in the Minneapolis firm of Dorsey & Whitney. Earlier this year, President Bill Clinton named him U.S. Ambassador to Japan, and he was sworn in as ambassador last month.

With a religious upbringing that instilled a concern for the welfare of others along with a spiritual resiliency, Walter Mondale has, throughout his career in public office, focused on issues affecting the less privileged in our country: civil rights, housing, education and health. At the same time, he has contributed greatly to the cause of international understanding and stability. As Vice President, he traveled to 26 nations as President Jimmy Carter's representative, and in 1990 he established the Mondale Policy Forum—an annual series of conferences on domestic and international policy issues—at the Hubert H. Humphrey Institute of Public Affairs at the University of Minnesota. He has also served as Chairman of the National Democratic Institute for International Affairs, which helps maintain and strengthen democratic institutions in countries around the world.

Born in Ceylon, Minnesota, Walter Mondale grew up in the nearby town of Elmore. He is married to Joan Adams Mondale '52, daughter of the late John Maxwell Adams, long-time Macalester chaplain. Affectionately known as "Joan of Art" for her passionate and forceful advocacy for American arts and crafts, Joan Mondale is a Macalester trustee. The Mondales have three adult children: Theodore, Eleanor Jane and William.

Author of the book *The Accountability of Power: Toward a Responsible Presidency*, Walter Mondale is himself the subject of a biography by Finlay Lewis and of a political study by Steven Gillon entitled *The Democrats' Dilemma: Walter Mondale and the Liberal Legacy*.

THE HONORABLE JIMMY CARTER

President of the United States from 1977 to 1981, former Georgia governor Jimmy Carter achieved notable foreign policy accomplishments including the Panama Canal treaties, Camp David Accords, treaty of peace between Egypt and Israel, SALT II treaty with the Soviet Union, and establishment of U.S. diplomatic relations with the People's Republic of China. He championed human rights throughout the world. His administration's domestic achievements included a comprehensive energy program, deregulation in energy, transportation, communications and finance, major educational programs and environmental protection legislation.

In 1982 he became University Distinguished Professor and founder of The Carter Center at Emory University in Atlanta. The center works to resolve conflict, promote democracy, protect human rights and prevent disease and affliction in this nation and abroad.

MACALESTER'S INTERNATIONAL FOCUS

Decades before the notion of a global village became popular, Macalester began building an international component into the campus experience. An international perspective is reflected in Macalester's students, faculty and programs.

The college's longstanding relationship with Japan exemplifies this tradition of internationalism. During World War II, President Charles Turck helped young Japanese-Americans leave internment camps to settle in the Twin Cities and attend Macalester.

Today, the college offers a unique and intensive approach to Japanese language study. Japan Studies is a popular major among students. Exchange programs with three Japanese universities serve both students and faculty; one of these programs is among the oldest such arrangements between a U.S. institution and a Japanese national university.
