IF WE ARE ABLE TO STRENGTHEN OUR UNDERSTANDING AND OUR APPRECIATION OF EACH OTHER, THEN VIRTUALLY EVERY PROBLEM IN THE WORLD BECOMES MORE MANAGEABLE. THE WORLD DEPENDS ON AN EFFECTIVE PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND JAPAN.

THE TRUTH IS THAT WE LIVE AT A TIME OF MOMENTOUS CHANGE IN THE WORLD.

FORTUNATELY, THIS CHANGE IS CAUSED NOT BY WAR AND DESTRUCTION, BUT BY THE PEACEFUL TRIUMPH OF FREEDOM AND DEMOCRACY. THERE IS ALSO A GROWING UNIVERSAL REALIZATION THAT OUR BEST OPPORTUNITY FOR GLOBAL PROSPERITY AND GROWTH IS WITH FREE ECONOMIES OPERATING IN AN OPEN INTERNATIONAL TRADING AND FINANCIAL SYSTEM.

THAT IS THE GOOD NEWS. YET OUR
WORK HAS JUST BEGUN, AND MANY
FORMIDABLE CHALLENGES REMAIN.

TO MENTION ONLY A FEW, WE NEED TO ENSURE
THE HEALTH OF THE WORLD ECONOMY;
ADVANCE THE CAUSE OF DEMOCRACY AND
HUMAN RIGHTS; HALT THE SPREAD OF
WEAPONS OF MASS DESTRUCTION; AND
PROTECT THE GLOBAL ENVIRONMENT. NOBODY
HAS MORE TO CONTRIBUTE TO THESE, AND
OTHER, EFFORTS THAN DO THE UNITED STATES
AND JAPAN.

BUSINESS AND GOVERNMENTAL EXPERTS ON

Arrival Statement in Tokyo Ambassador Walter F. Mondale September 14, 1993

Thank you for greeting Joan and me here this evening. We are delighted to be in your wonderful country and we look forward to living with you during my term as Ambassador.

President Clinton has asked me to thank the people of Japan for your generous kindness, which made his recent visit here such a success.

The President has often said that no relationship in the world is more important to the United States than our partnership with Japan. If we are able to strengthen our understanding and our appreciation of each other, then virtually every problem in the world becomes more manageable. The world depends on an effective partnership between the United States and Japan.

The truth is that we live at a time of momentous change in the world. Fortunately, this change is caused not by war and destruction, but by the peaceful triumph of freedom and democracy. There is also a growing universal realization that our best opportunity for global prosperity and growth is with free economies operating in an open international trading and financial system.

That is the good news. Yet our work has just begun, and many formidable challenges remain. To mention only a few, we need to ensure the health of the world economy; advance the cause of democracy and human rights; halt the spread of weapons of mass destruction; and protect the global environment. Nobody has more to contribute to these, and other, efforts than do the United States and Japan.

Over the past few months, I have met extensively with American academic, business and governmental experts on Japan. In the weeks ahead, I look forward to meeting with Prime Minister Hosokawa and the other leaders of your government — as well as with Japanese experts and leaders from many fields of life.

Joan and I want to deepen our understanding of your marvelous culture and history. We look forward to traveling throughout Japan to meet and make many new friends. We know we will love our stay here.
