out and throwing ridiculous sums
of money away buying things, on
all sides evidently without the
slightest discrimination or knowledge
of their merits or demerits, like
a California miner in 49, only on
an enormous scale. I suppose there
is no ~~prob~~ previous instance of
an educated man going on to such
an extent, in absolute ignorance of
what he is doing

You would be very much amused
if you saw this place. I have been

acclimatizing. American mud
turtles snapping turtles bull
frogs and other frogs in some
small ponds. and they are
some of them beginning to breed
I found a tortoise's nest with
some eggs a day or two ago but
another tortoise came round this
morning & eat all the eggs. The
bullfrogs have spawned, and
all the neighbours come to look
at the enormous bull frog
tadpoles. We have no large

frogs or croaking frogs native
 to this country. And the note
 of the American tree frogs delight
 us all. I've got a turtle
 but he isn't a success in fresh
 water.

Years ago I went up the
 Labrador coast in a Gaspé schooner
 in search of a salmon river
 but I found no river that
 seemed tempting to an angler
 though I delighted in the coasting
 trip, in other ways. I'm not
 quite sure that I didn't like

my trip all the better for not
having found the right sort of
river. I wish I could manage
to get over to St Paul next
year. but I know something
will crop up to keep me at
home. at the last moment. and
it is no use hoping that I shall
get out of the regular groove
of my existence. In your Chicago
speech I delight in your assertion
that next to the Christian religion
railroads have been the greatest bene-
factors of the human race. I think
you would not have been far wrong

if you had given the Christian
religion the back seat. certainly
as regards the Great Northern of
Minnesota. R.R.

About 30 years ago I spent some
time in Martinique, I thought it
was the most beautiful place I had
ever seen. and the pleasantest
climate. at all events in winter as
one could live at a considerable
height above sea level on the mountain
side. And one had no more idea
