My Dear Mr. Sterling:-

I have your letters of the 7th and 8th for which please accept my thanks until I see you personally. I understand that the case has been regularly docketed, and that nothing now remains to be done except that Mr. Horn told Mr. Grover yesterday he thought it would be better to submit the case under stipulation on written arguments, so as to bring it within the ninety day rule which is very important. Will you kindly see without any delay that Mr. Horn is instructed to do this, and also urge him to see that his argument is prepared and filed as early as it can be done, bearing in mind that we have to be served with a copy of his argument before our answer can be drawn and the whole matter submitted to the Court. As soon as the arguments are on file in Washington I think I can through a friend at Court, ask the Chief Justice to see that it is not delayed there a day longer than is necessary.
