E. had done every thing a gentleman could to get them to go to Gibson, and they had promised when the cancer nomine dropped out that they would, they offered to go with me to Miss Gibson & Daly and tell them so, but both of them thought it better not to bury it up, but they have written me the enclosed letters, which I enclose.

On my arrival here that Charly worked against him, and that although he brought ~~good~~ of Howard he had not been ~~able~~ to do anything for him.

When you interested us with you in Kalispell and invited us to move to the Falls we did so to work entirely with you and for your interest in every way which we have done and will continue to do, we bought Ham out of our Books at Falls, so as to be free to have nothing to do with him and we are working as honestly for and with you as any men you ever ever interested with and I trust when the heat of this matter is over that any one who has represented otherwise will come

to you and tell you they were
mistaken, Matters are now
at such heat a brush may be
made, there is ^{now} no prospect
of me getting in, ^{and} it should
occur you will find I will
be the best ~~supporter~~ ^{supporter} for you
or any of your interests that

I consider you have done more
to develop Northern Montana
than any one, and have asked
no aid from the National Govt.
Mr Ward one of Dixon's supporters
tells me that he talked with Clark
knew his views and intends to go

In reference to our conversa-
tion yesterday will say

When Mr. C. E. Conrad arrived here I
was committed to Mr. Hawser and Mr. Conrad
did all he could to influence me to work with
Mr. Gibson but my pledges were such at
the time they had to be carried out
I assured him when a freak name I would
work with Mr. Gibson as our interest are the
same. Afterwards we had a caucus and I felt
bound as a Democrat to stand by its
decision, have been expecting it to break every
day since as to carry out your brothers
wishes. Had Mr. Daly mentioned this matter
sooner every member of Missoula County
would have been working with him

Hon. W. S. Conrad
Dear Sir:

In regard to the conversation I had with you as to C. C. Conrad's attitude on the Senatorial question here, allow me to say:— Mr. C. C. Conrad knowing we would have a certain amount of opposition came to Helena to aid in the passage of the Flathead County bill, of which I was the author. A short time after his Mr. C's arrival here, he told me he was satisfied from what he had learned since arriving, that the interests of the Great Northern and consequently — as he then put it — the interests of the Flathead Country — would be best served by our aiding Mr. Dixon and his friends. I at that time told Mr. C. I had been elected as a Democrat and should support the caucus nominee of the party, who ever he should be. Several times, and as I remember once particularly — just before

Mr. C. left Helena some three or four weeks ago - he asked and requested me very earnestly - that when there was a break in the lines of the senatorial contest, and it looked as if one could, or was decided to go to some third candidate - to use my influence and vote to make Parrotson the Senatorial nominee or candidate.

Allow me to state in closing - that having a warm friendship, and a great deal of respect for your brother Mr. C. E. Conrad - I would have been much more likely to have acceded to his request than to the other methods and efforts that were used to persuade or force me to act in opposition to my caucus obligations and what I considered the wishes of the majority of my constituents and party.

In route to St Paul snowbound here a week, White wires meeting adjourned waiting my arrival. Come at once. Some one has sold Hill I did not use my influence in his interests. Gibson knows better and should both wire and write Hill explaining Butler & Loring both promised to work with Gibson when Clark's caucus was broken up. - C.C. Conrad
