We have agreed to pool soft coal earnings or rather profits with S&K from June 1st forward this covering all soft coal at Duluth and St Paul and Minneapolis including the Minneapolis Gas Coal - We are to have half and they half. We have all the St Paul Gas Coal and S&K have sold Mead about 1000 tons of Massillon at Duluth which is not included - I held that as an offset against our Gas Coal, but we get twice the Margin on our Gas Coal than they do from Mead - The details are not completed until Saunders returns from Duluth but this covers the whole in the main - This will prevent any competition whatever on Hotel and large consumers of Steam Coal as we will fix the compensation for handling so low that there will be no object in one doing

I got here last night had to remain over in Bismarck for stage one day. I consequently had to stop in Moorhead over Sunday. Found Hackett looking blue but all right - was waiting to hear from me. Haven't seen Doctor yet as he has gone to Fort Rice. The proportion made by Cass was to give him all south of the track and his lot in town - H asked Mr Cass if he had not already received a proportion from a party in St Paul & the said "No" he knew nothing about it. H told him that Mr Mead could tell him about it - Cass then called Mead up before Hackett & Mead said "there was some kind of a proportion made by a merchant of St Paul to pay H. two or

Three thousand dollars or something
of that kind - (This was before Hackett)

Genl Cass knew nothing about it & I
think if the proportion was made square
to Cass that you made to mead he
would accept it immediately - You
had better see Mead about it and
see when Genl Cass will return -
If it is necessary I will go to New York
to see him.

The proportion made to Doctor was that
they should pay him \$1,500 or \$2,000 down
& give him a block - (the one in which he
resides I think) but I have not seen him
yet - He is reported to have accepted but
I guess he is all right - He is broke &
will do as I wish him to do I think.

Hackett's girl is on the way up here - He
is laid up with a broken wrist but I think
it is getting better - I will write you
more fully to-morrow - Answer
immediately & tell me if Frank has
gone to Newbern yet - If he only
comes to the 5th after he is sure of two
or three thousand dollars. He will not get
a cent - in any other way.

"To be left until called for" so that I will not miss it - I shall not leave him ~~if~~ there is any need of my remaining longer - I have not been removed yet & shall not be I think - do you know if Grays has gone to Moorhead yet - I will enclose a note to him which you will please deliver. I have checked

probably \$100⁰⁰

Everything is very quiet here & business
will be very dull the coming winter
Will write you again by next Sunday
mail. & will then advise
