Yours of the 25<sup>th</sup> to hand. The only way I can account for the shortage in the Basin Hill coal is that it may have been stolen. I caution the men to be very particular and see that all the doors are locked, some however have no locks on. I have only noticed one car go from here with the door open and when speaking to the men about it they replied, it was impossible for them to close it. This morning we weighed 20 barrels each of stone and sent and averaged them. In the margin under the date I have give you the rail road receipts, the other is ours, Car # 230 for J H Ray Manfatto Glass Co we weighed all in, the rail road weight over runs 170<sup>5-1/2</sup> in the other cases it is short. Will try and fill your order as you desired it, sometimes we have to take advantage of what cars we have, and possible may change the number.

tent should be glad to comply with your

Duluth (suppose you take car weights) but

correctness than our own. Now to show  
you that our disposition is good we will  
divide this alleged shortage 4 1/2 tons @  
\$16<sup>87</sup> which we think is about as fair a  
basis of settlement of these differences as

Sir:

You will remember my remarks to you the day you were here about the manner in which your wood was being piled. You said you would give the necessary instructions. There seems to be no improvement. The object appears to be to get measurement. As a first step I have directed the men to make no more double rands. The wood must be in single rands so that the Board may be able to see both ends of the sticks. There is quite a percentage of wood that should not go into the stacks at all. Some very large, some limbs, (Crotches) & some dead wood. I shall

not fail to call the attention of the Board to these defects. We have a years' supply of wood, aside from the lot you are now putting in. You will at once see that you cannot afford to have your wood rejected. It would be more satisfactory all round to have it in the right shape to submit for inspection. This can easily be done by giving orders to have the objectionable wood thrown aside on the river bank. This letter is on record in my office and will be submitted to the Board if occasion require.
