I return to you
to-day 1 Lot Paper sacks too
Large for our use. Fred says he
did not order any such size. I
Should think they would hold a sack
of flour 98" We cannot use them
for anything. I was over yesterday
to measure Barns wood. He had
250 cads. I gave him a Draft
on you for 75 dollars, and one Draft
of \$20 to Guffitt one of Parkers choppers.
one to A. Smith one of Johnson men
one to S. S. Johnson \$96⁵² one to
E. J. Barns 75 dollars. The above is
all we have given ^{up} to this date
Johnson is Banking for us again.
I will have about 100 cads to measure
for Mr Maxwell on Crystal Bay
in a few days over

You may send 1 sack Rio
Coffee. Perhaps it would
be better to send two sacks
as it will be bad going down
and we cannot get it so well
from Maple Plain. Besides there
is some prospect of selling the
team. The goods that were ordered
when Mr Aoken left have come
although they came in two or
three different lots. I have
not got the bill yet for the
goods I had got. I will probably
get them to-day.

Gentlemen you would
please let me if you would inform
me what price you are going
to pay me for my wood as
I am situated so that I can
put my wood on either side
of the line drawn between
you & Briggs & Co and it is not
likely that I will sell it
for less than they will pay
me as it is more convenient
for me to put it on Briggs
side yet I prefer to sell to you
at the same price I sold
to Mr Marsh some time since
but got no satisfaction

as he could not feel whether
you would be satisfied to
pay or not the price offered by
Miss Miller is also getting all
the farmers to put their work
on the east side of the Crossing
John wants you to advance me
\$1000 on word if you are
satisfied to take it on the above
terms or I can get it if you
not satisfied with the above

height and I have a good round
measure.

He has 102 $\frac{1}{2}$ cord Maple
33 $\frac{1}{2}$ cord Oak 119 $\frac{1}{2}$ cord Bass
wood. I have paid him
10 dollars in currency and given
him a draft for 25 dollars
and we are yet owing
him some on the wood measured.
I am obliged to give drafts
whenever they want to be paid
as I have no currency to spare
I have to let them all have
some currency to pay off their
men.
