POPULATION 80,000.

have made an error, as the monthly state-
ment sent you is taken from the copying
book and agrees with my books here
and if I should have told any coal
wrong, that is store for goats, the parties
to whom consigned would have discovered
it. You will find a Sunday account in
the trial balance. This is what is due on goats
sold here on unfilled orders and I wish to
close this cargo up and not have it come
into what a future are. I paid the
Yardmaster a box of cigars in the fore part
of last month. I wrote Mr. Saunders about
it before making the present and got
his receipt. Anything you do not un-
derstand please let me know.
