My dear Mr. Hill,

When your favor of the 8th Ult. was received here, I was so unwell as to be unable to give any attention to business, or indeed, to take part in correspondence at all. But as soon as I could manage to go to Ottawa, I did so, and there saw the Minister of the Interior, with whom I discussed the subject relative to your friend Mr. Dunbar and his two sons, referred to in the letters you were good enough to enclose to me. Mr. Dewdney promised to enquire into the matter carefully, and when there again, a few days back, he informed me, that he had given it every consideration; and that unless Dr. McEachran meantime, made a satisfactory settlement, with the Messrs. Dunbar, he would see that they were sustained in their possession of the Homesteads allotted to them. Mr. Dewdney, however, explained that these Homesteads had been given them by the Local agent, without the authority of the Department, at Ottawa, and from this arose the difficulty in the case.

The visit of my friends and myself, to the Pacific Coast, by the Canadian Pacific Railway and back by your Road, was full of interest and enjoyment, and we were all struck by the great resources of the mountain country, and the facilities afforded, at Great Falls, for developing the mining interests of that region.
