MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT, between Walter P. Warren, Dudley Tibbits, John W. Griswold, Howard H. Burden, J. Russell Parsons, and other stockholders of the WALTER A. WOOD MANUFACTURING COMPANY, of Hoosac, New York, representing the majority of the stock of the said Company, parties of the first part, and JAMES J. HILL and W. R. MERRIAM, of St. Paul, Minnesota, on behalf of certain citizens of St. Paul, parties of the second part.

WHEREAS, the Wood Company is engaged in the manufacture and sale of agricultural implements, and is willing to dispose of its right to manufacture and sell such implements in the territory, in the United States, and Canada, west of the meridian line forming the western boundary of Ohio, following the Ohio river from the said Western boundary to the Mississippi river, and thence to the Gulf of Mexico, including the good will of the business and the right to use all patents which may now or at any time hereafter belong to or be controlled by it, on basis of cost of such future patents;

AND WHEREAS, it is intended by the parties hereto, to organize a company, having its principal office at St. Paul, with a capital stock of not more than \$2,500,000., for the purpose of carrying on the said business in the said territory;

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED:

1. A Committee of five persons shall forthwith be appointed for the purpose of appraising the value of the use of the good will and patents of the Wood Company in the said territory West of the Meridian line, and of all appliances and other property which may be necessary for the proper carrying on of the new company's business. Two of the members of this Committee shall be appointed by the parties of the first part, two by the parties of the second part, and a fifth by the persons thus appointed, in case the four so appointed cannot agree. The valuation of the Committee shall be final; and capital stock of the new Company, representing, at par² this valuation, shall be issued to the

Wood Company, in full payment therefor. The Wood Company shall thereupon execute and deliver to the new Company an instrument properly securing such rights.

III. The parties of the first part shall subscribe and pay for \$750,000. of the capital stock of the new company, and the parties of the second part shall subscribe and pay for the same amount of such stock. The said stock shall be taken and paid for at the time and in the manner required by the new company.

III. The new company shall be entitled to take, as its corporate name, the corporate title of the present Wood Company or such other title as may be determined upon by the parties in interest.

IV. The new Company shall have the absolute right to engage in the same business in its territory which may, at any time, be carried on by the present Company; and each Company shall forever have the right to use in its own territory the patented inventions of the other Company.

V. A Committee of six persons shall be appointed, with full power to carry out the terms of this agreement, three of such persons to be appointed by the parties of the first part and three by the parties of the second part.

This instrument executed at the City of New York this twenty-seventh day of November, 1891, shall be subject to the ratification of a legal vote of the stockholders of the Walter A. Wood Manufacturing Company and the parties represented by said Hill and Merriam before the same shall be binding on either of the parties hereto.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT, Between Walter P. Warren, Dudley Tibbits, John W. Griswold, Howard H. Burden, J. Russell Parsons, and other stockholders of the WALTER A. WOOD MANUFACTURING COMPANY, of Hoosac, New York, representing the majority of the stock of the said Company, parties of the first part, and JAMES J. HILL and R. R. MERRIAM, of St. Paul, Minnesota, on behalf of certain citizens of St. Paul, parties of the second part.

WHEREAS, the Wood Company is engaged in the manufacture and sale of agricultural implements, and is willing to dispose of its right to manufacture and sell such implements in the territory, in the United States, and Canada, west of the meridian line forming the Western boundary of Ohio, following the Ohio river from the said Western boundary to the Mississippi river, and thence to the Gulf of Mexico, including the good will of the business and the right to use all patents which may now or at any time hereafter belong to or be controlled by it, on basis of cost of such future patents;

AND WHEREAS, it is intended by the parties hereto, to organize a company, having its principal office at St. Paul, with a Capital Stock of not more than \$2,500,000, for the purpose of carrying on the said business in the said territory;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED:

I. A Committee of five persons shall forthwith be appointed for the purpose of appraising the value of the use of the good will and patents of the Wood Company in the said territory West of the Meridian line, and of all appliances and other property which may be necessary for the proper carrying on of the new Company's business. Two of the members of this Committee shall be appointed by the parties of the first part, two by the parties of the second part, and a fifth by the persons thus appointed, in case the four

so appointed cannot agree. The valuation of the Committee shall be final; and Capital Stock of the new Company, representing, at par, this valuation, shall be issued to the Wood Company, in full payment therefor. The Wood Company shall thereupon execute and deliver to the new Company an instrument properly securing such rights.

II. The parties of the first part shall subscribe and pay for \$750,000 of the Capital Stock of the new Company, and the parties of the second part shall subscribe and pay for the same amount of such stock. The said stock shall be taken and paid for at the time and in the manner required by the new Company.

III. The new Company shall be entitled to take, as its corporate name, the corporate title of the present Wood Company or such other title as may be determined upon by the parties in interest.

IV. The new Company shall have the absolute right to engage in the same business in its territory which may, at any time, be carried on by the present Company; and each Company shall forever have the right to use in its own territory the patented inventions of the other Company.
