

Dear Sir:

The details of the work done by the Tariff Reform Committee of the Reform Club are set forth in the report of that Committee for 1891. This report has been or will be sent you.

The general features of the work are as follows:

First, the compilation of names, addresses and occupations of voters in the State of New York and other states; second, the preparation and issue of numbers of ''Tariff Reform'' and the distribution thereof by means of the compilations above referred to; third, organizing meetings for joint debate or the presentation of Tariff Reform topics, and furnishing speakers therefor; fourth, the preparing and furnishing tariff articles for circulation through the press.

As shown in the Committee's report, the lists of voters prepared for the State of New York embrace 697,661 names. Lists embracing a larger portion of the names of voters have also been obtained in Iowa, Nebraska, Rhode Island, Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee and Kentucky, and to a smaller degree in other states.

The " Tariff Reform" has been issued twice a month through the year 1891, except the last three numbers which are in course of preparation. In New York alone 272,504 numbers of '' Tariff Reform' have been distributed, in Iowa 60,000, in Ohio 42,000, in Connecticut 1,700, in Georgia 1550, in Illinois 600, in Kentucky 2,300, in Massachusetts 1,600, in Michigan 8,400, in Nebraska 1,200, in New Hampshire 650, in Pennsylvania 1,000 and smaller amounts in other states and territories. The total distribution to states other than New York is about 175,000 copies.

In New York we have held and provided speakers for a total of 95 meetings, including 11 joint debates which were attended by over 20,000 voters. We furnished speakers for 59 meetings in Iowa, 60 meetings in Ohio and 25 meetings in Massachusetts.

We have prepared and furnished for the press an average of twenty columns per month, which has been distributed through more than 1,000 newspapers in the western states.

The campaigns of 1890 and 1891 have given to the advocates of Tariff Reform the control of the House of Representatives. Our object in 1892 is to do all in our power to secure the nomination and election of a President of the United States pledged to radical Tariff Reform. For this purpose we ask your assistance. It is our purpose to hold immediately in the State of New York a very large number of meetings-as many as 400 or 500, if our funds permit, for the purpose of securing the election of delegates to the State Convention, who will represent the true sentiment of the State on this issue, and secure a similar representation to the National Convention. These meetings should be held immediately. The State Convention will be held in May, and the delegates elected in April, so that immediate action is imperative.

We also desire to continue the work as above outlined in other states, to continue the issue and distribution of "Tariff Reform", and the preparation of necessary articles for the press. The Committee pledges to you constant and faithful work for the above objects. In order to put it in their power to make them effective, they will require during the year at least \$50,000. The Committee earnestly solicits your subscription.
