Permit us to call your kind particular attention  
to a celebrated painting by Delacroix which we  
now own. It represents a Zion, in a landscape  
bordered by mountains, measures 11+14 inches, and is  
dated 1851. Alfred Robaut describes and engraves it  
in his well known work on Delacroix on page 36,  
under No 105. The painting is favorably known in  
Parisian as well as American art circles. It brought  
already 11 years ago a sensational price in the  
Hartmann sale and was exhibited in New York  
at the Barge Exposition of 1889.

We sincerely believe this painting to be  
worthy of a place in your great Collection

The Delmonico gallery has three new French pictures of importance. A small panel by Isabey, representing Louis XIV le King mass in company with his mother and Cardinal Mazarin and saluted by his courtiers and guards, is in his most temperate manner, crowded with figures but thoughtfully composed, rich in color yet not vulgar as some of his pictures are. A river scene painted near Constantinople by Diaz, who for this occasion forsook his fairy-like grapes and disposed two or three ordinary natives near an equally commonplace bungalow, is likewise in a quieter and more subtle vein than usual; less Oriental in color, in fact, than some of the well-known Fontainebleau forest scenes. The third picture is a study of a lion by Delacroix, executed in 1831 after for many years in the Hartmann collection in Paris, which obtained a kind of celebrity on the ground of its containing only works by Delacroix, Rousseau and Millet. This work, a very small one, is still one of Delacroix's strongest, not only in truthfulness to the snarling ferocity of the lion, but in the transparent blue tones which beautify the noble mountain range in the distance.
