

Replying to yours of January 28th., which could not be answered before as the batteries have only now been completed, would say, there are 120 cells set up and in operation; 8 extra jars and 2 extra cells have been left for emergencies; 6 glasspars were broken in transit, and 2 glass jars were found to be thin and defective while the Accumulator Co. were putting in the plant. This is all of the material that was left in connection with these batteries. Hoping this information will meet your requirements, I remain Chief Engineer.
