I send you under separate cover some of our statements of March 1st, just printed, from which you will observe that the deposits shown are at the highest point of any time we have reported to the Comptroller, although as I have recently shown you by our statement book, our gross deposits on some days recently have exceeded \$21,000,000. This is of course abnormally high, owing to the general dullness in mercantile and manufacturing lines, which results in accumulations of idle money in the hands of our country correspondents and as they do not find any paper in which to invest at home, they remit the money to us to receive their little 2% interest on their reserve balances in order that the money may earn something until it is needed again. The item of profits is some smaller than our showing in December, which is owing to our having paid a 5% dividend and charged off some losses. We expect to make a partial recovery on some of the items charged off and in one or two cases expect to recover the full amount when the endorsers are


