
Dear Sir;-

We take the liberty of applying to you for information in regard to the present and future prospects of the city of Great Falls, Mont. Parties are here now negotiating with us in regard to placing the bonds to be issued in the construction of gas works under a franchise granted by the Common Council of the above mentioned city. The probable cost of the plant will range from 50 to 75,000 dollars. Dear Mr. Hill,

Trusting you safely returned from your tour, I now beg to express my thanks for having had an opportunity of inspecting your collection of paintings, though I greatly regretted not having had the pleasure of seeing you while there. - In case you arrange your gallery this summer, I would suggest to do away as much as possible with the shadow boxes and glaces, as these objects greatly mar the effect of the pictures, the boxes interfering with a harmonious hanging, and the glaces with seeing perfectly the pictures. Provided however you mean,

if arranged, to let them remain permanently. For if you should on certain occasions loan any of them out, the boxes & glaces serve as a great protection.

Your gallery as a collection of the school of 1830 - 1840, is well nigh superior to any I know in this country, and there remains but little to be added, except if now and then an especially fine work of that school should be available. The gallery itself is well lighted and constructed, and the house itself and interior arrangements grand, yet in every part showing simplicity and unity of style. If anyway possible, and above all agreeable to you, I would like to pay you in the fall another visit, hoping then to have the pleasure of meeting yourself.

To-morrow morning I am leaving for
abroad, and in case you have any commissions
