

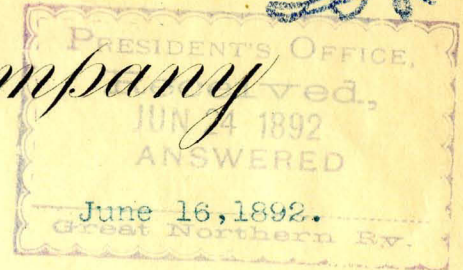

Since I was in New York last fall where I had some conversation with Mr. Cannon and other friends of yours in relation to the purchase of an interest in the stock of the Fairhaven Land Co. and the Skagit Coal & Transportation Co., from which conversations I learned that anything that might be done in the matter would be subject to your approval, and having promised to advise those parties from time to time of any changes in the situation of affairs here, I thought it best to write the facts to you and you can make such use of them either for yourself or by furnishing them to your friends as you may desire.

The paper is over-due
As the matter now stands, Mr. Larrabee holds the entire interests in the stock of Wilson and Cowgill, amounting to one quarter of the entire property, as a security for about \$175,000 which the two owe him. ~~the~~ Larrabee is over-due and I think could be procured from him together with the securities without difficulty, and you will doubtless readily see that anyone holding this security could readily get that quarter interest. Larrabee's relations to the parties are such that he hesitates to press the payment of his claims to an extent which would force a sale of the security, but at the same time I know that he would like to have his money and would sell to any other person who might desire to take the matter off his hands.

I furnish you this information so that if there is anything which you desire to do that would be assisted by knowing the facts you may have the benefit of it.

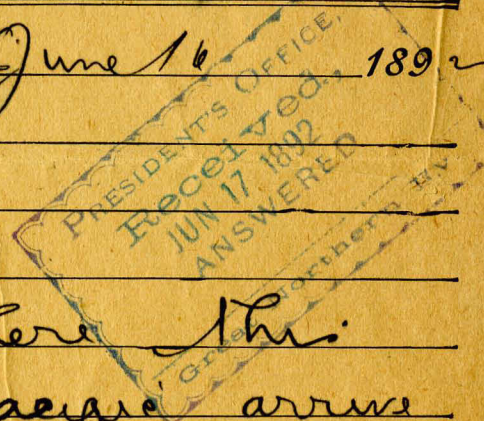
