Dear Sir: Your two favors of 28th received. I note what you say about drafts, and will see that you have more notice hereafter. I was in hopes to be able to get through the Monday's pay roll without a draft, but found at the last moment that I could not.

In regard to Walker Bros. they have paid up promptly every month, not later than the 10th. All they owe now is their account for June, which will not fall due until Friday. I think they will pay it all right, as they have done heretofore. I mean their rent for July, as they pay rent in advance.

Will give you statement of advertising accounts due. There is not so much due on advertising as there is on subscription. It is impossible to keep collected up on subscription. I think the bulk of it will have to run now until after harvest; but the people here as a rule are good, and will pay sooner or later. I think it is a good plan to carry the farmers along on their subscription accounts until it is convenient for them to pay. I have always

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found this policy to work well. It necessitates advancing capital, but it creates a friendly feeling and pays in the end. It is impossible, in running a paper on the frontier, to pursue the up and down business methods in regard to collections that can be pursued in a city like St. Paul.
