## THE BAPTISM RIVER CLUB.

St. Paul, Minn., July 1892.

The Club House at the Baptism River is now open and will remain open during the fishing season.

The rate for Board throughout the season is \$1.50 per day for Members and Guests, and \$1.00 per day for Children under 12.

The Keeper furnishes the table himself and settlement must be made with Mrs. McLauchlan the Housekeeper, before leaving.

The Club House has 14 beds, with mattresses, pillows, blankets, sheets, pillow cases and towels.

Members wishing to go off on extended trips can engage skilled boatmen at Beaver Bay. The Club owns a large sail boat for use near by; a competent boatman has been engaged for the season and the sail boat can go out only in his charge. Members of the Club have the use of the Club row boats and sail boat free of charge.

The Steamer "Dixon" leaves Duluth every Sunday and Wednesday at 10 A. M., arriving at the Baptism about 5 P. M. same day. Returning the Dixon leaves the Baptism about 7 A. M. Tuesdays and Fridays, arriving at Duluth about 2 P. M. Fare \$2.50 each way.

Members are requested to notify the Housekeeper a week in advance of their intention to visit the Club and about how long they intend to stay.

Members introducing guests must secure the necessary card from Mr. Kingsland Smith, Secretary, in St. Paul, or from Mr. C. H. Graves, President, or Mr. Geo. Spencer, Manager, in Duluth; these cards are good for six days only. Members must comply with the By-Laws about introducing guests.

The Directors are making an effort to improve the fishing on the River. Trout grass to furnish fish food has been planted in the stream this Spring, also 15,000 Loch Leven fry. The attention of Members is called to the new By-Law:—"All fish caught under six inches in length must be thrown back into the river."

There are at the Club two tents for camping and one set of cooking utensils which are at the disposition of members wishing to make excursions.
