Dear Sir:-

I write you as Atty. for the Receiver of the estate of H. A. Bruns and Thos. C. Kurtz, to know if Mr. Hill will join in a lease of the farm lands which were bid in under foreclosure here on the 6th. together with other property, and I believe, in Mr. Hill's behalf. There are parties here who desire to rent the lands and to summer fallow this season and crop it next. As the year of redemption expires next July it would be necessary to have Mr. Hill, Mr. Bruns and the Receiver join in a lease, and to make a fair division of the proceeds of the lease between the Receiver and Mr. Hill.

This seems to be the only way the property can be made to pay any thing the coming year.

If you think this plan desirable will you kindly let me know what part of the proceeds of the lease you would be willing to accept in consideration of joining. The land will have to be rented if at all, for a share of the crop, same to be put on board cars at the expense of the renter. Please let me know at once what can be done, as the land must be plowed at once if it is to be summer fallowed.

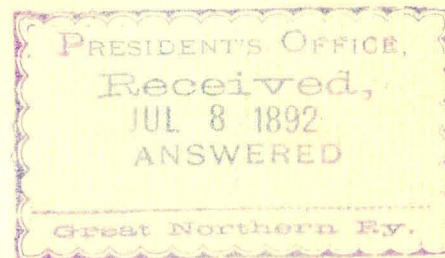

Your favor of 6th recd just

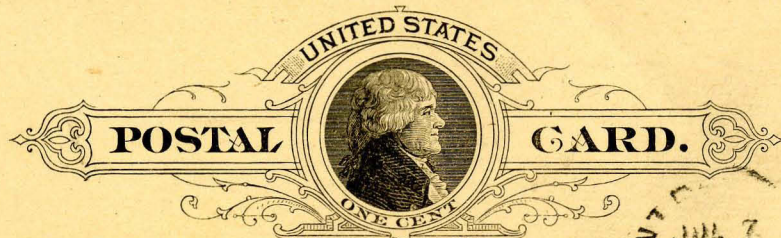
