


Dear Sir: - Our Engineer telegraphs us that the Engine only opens two hundred and ten lamps and that this is all it will do, with 40 lbs. pressure and 650 degrees of heat, and that the Engine must come out. With this pressure 40 lbs. and 650 degrees of heat, the Engine is delivering at least 40 Horse Power on the Dynamo.

Now this only results in 210 lamps useing about one Horse Power for every 5 lights produced. The Edison and Thompson & Houston people guarentee from 10 to 14 lamps. At 10 lamps only 21 Horse Power is needed, while we produce 40 Horse Power and only open up 210 lamps.

Now allow me to respectfully state that there is something seriously wrong, either purposely or otherwise with the Electrical Plant, and I believe it will be well for you to look into this matter, as I have heard from several sources, that great opposition on the part of the Electrical people, was shown to the Engine, and it would be very easy by means of resistance coils or some other devise, to throw a load on Engine of double the amount, shown in lamps produced.

At Mr. Villards at Dobbs Ferry with an Engine of only one half the power of yours, we readily open between 200 and 300 lamps of 16 candles, Edison System, the Engine running finely and satisfactory.

Now in case ,after all I have written, you decide to take out the Engine, I am powerless to prevent or even influence you, still if you do decide to remove it, we will be satisfied if you will pay us a reasonable sum for our great trouble and expense in placing the Engine in St. Paul. If you will pay us Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2500) and return the Engine to us at Boston F. O. B. St. Paul, we will call the matter between us settled. If you decline this proposition, when

we receive the Engine we shall test it with Edison Dynamo, and if it opens up the lights resulting from power, as per our contract, when we sold you the Engine, we shall hold you responsible for the whole bill, price of Engine, and expenses incurred in setting it up, and the several tests made.

I certainly feel we are just and reasonable in this proposal, and I have but little doubt you will coincide with us, on the receipt of the\$2500 you can at once ship the Engine to us.

I need only to add, when we sold you the Engine our understanding was, that it was to be used in generating electricity for a storage battery system and not more than 30 or 40 Horse Power would be required, and we sold the Engine only guaranteeing it to indicate 64 Horse Power, and deliver about 70 per cent as per Mr. Barrus tests as stated in our catalogue sent you, and to consume 1 1/2 lbs. of coal per indicated Horse Power per hour tests to be made same as in the Barrus tests.
