Dear Sir:-

Your favor of the 23rd received in Mr. Hill's absence.

It is quite possible the company who installed the plant may claim that the work of installation was completed in February last. Nevertheless, the batteries have never been charged nor has the rest of the work been completed to afford an opportunity of making a proper test of the work done by the Electrical Company referred to.

There is another reason which has influenced us in withholding payment of the balance due on the batteries, viz: That I was informed that a decision has some time since been given by the United States Courts against your company and a perpetual injunction was at that time obtained prohibiting your company from making or selling batteries. It will be necessary, therefore, for us to have proper bond of indemnity to fully secure Mr. Hill against any claims for royalties or infringement of patent rights which might be made by the other Storage Battery Companies who have been successful against you in the courts.

I may add that I expected the work of installing these batteries together with the other parts of the machinery, would have been completed ere this and all questions other than the right to make and sell these batteries would have been determined, thus lessening the number of points to be borne in mind in making final settlement. I shall take up the question of the nature of the bond which we should have with our attorney and shall be glad to learn at an early date what you have to suggest in this connection. Mr. Hill certainly has no desire to unduly delay the settlement of your bill.
