Dear Mr. Hill.

You were so kind when I last wrote to you that I feel emboldened to write to you again. You are probably aware that the Chicago St. Paul Kansas City N.R. says that it cannot meet its Jan. '93 coupon on the 1st Mortgage bonds, & that a reorganization scheme has been drawn up - a Messrs. Brewster Co.

are inviting the deposit of bonds for conversion into new securities. The scheme has not been accepted by a majority of the Minnesota & N. Western bondholders, who having ~~been~~ purchased their bonds nearly all at the price of a very good security are very sore at being placed on an equality with the Chic St. Paul & K.C. bondholders, who hold at much lower prices. Moreover there is a belief that the Terminal facilities at South St. Paul & the Minnesota & N. Western line are worth more than the

the rest of the line and that
if the worst came to the worst
they could be sold to one of
the existing ~~Chicago and Paul~~
large Companies who either
have or would like to have
a line between Chicago & St
Paul and that better terms
could be obtained than those
offered in the scheme. Two
trust Companies, one pretty
influential has offered to head
the opposition so probably nothing
the scheme will not be closed up

for some little time. My object
in writing is to ask if you would
mind telling me if you think
this belief has any foundation
in fact. If the Minnesota trustees
refused to come in and having
a majority prepared to foreclose
whether the line is sufficiently
valuable to any other company
to make it likely ^{they} ~~we~~ could get
better terms than they are now offered.
If you can help me again
I shall be very grateful.
