My dear Hill.

The Democrats have carried I think the legislature - we have only one majority, but I think that will be enough. Hauser, Clark and Dixon are out for the Senatorship; but I have got more personal friends in the legislature than any one of them. Clark claims it on the ground of his expenditures that the other side should have it, and that the Democratic party to be consistent must condemn its platform, and its denunciations of the theft of two years ago, by the re-endorsement of the men whose seats were stolen, and of those who that he is to be 'the first for the reasons above stated. Hauser simply wants it, he did not contribute to the bank campaign - and except a few fellows that he can purchase and one or two employees of the N. P.

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in the legislature he can not get the party out here - The Democrats recognize that to elect him would be self-stultification and would virtually be the end of Democracy out here. Mr. Daly has about thirteen votes from his two counties Deer Lodge and Missoula. He does not want Clark elected - Clark has three votes from Silver Bow and four on this side of the mountains. We can get any more, although he claims that Joe Dool is pledged to his support, at least he takes one so. Mr. Dixon has declared himself a candidate and it has fallen flat. The people recognize that he has no right in it. A respectable lawyer he has not the force to be a leader - and without ever doing anything for the party - we have done a great deal for him. HE can not get a single vote on his own strength - Not one that Mr. Daly

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does not give him and many of those
will be given reluctantly and under
pressure only. It is said that Daly
has brought him out, but this is denied. If
he has then Daly has made a mistake for
Dixon can not give Daly a vote - and would
be a weight to him - that he would have
to carry on the Capital and every other question
I am told that Daly has not done so and
I have every reason, from myself and from those
near to him to think that he is for me - and if
he is I can turn him votes enough to make
a winning combination. Now I know
you have great influence with him, and
on account of old acquaintance, and
some good service done to you ~~to~~
I feel that I have a claim to ask
you to use your influence with him
in my behalf and I believe it will be
conclusive. I do not want any office
in Washington. The only place I could feel

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with credit would be Secretary
 of War and that I could not get.
 The details of Executive Bureaus are
 not to my taste, and I know that in
 a legislative body is my place -
 to that I am named and fitted and
 could make a word for my state and
 myself and do of benefit to my
 friends and country. I am sorry to
 trouble you with this long letter on my
 own affairs, but I am satisfied that
 if you press this matter on July I can
 have this position to which I have aspired
 and which would now be assured
 if our friend Broadwater was
 alive
