## EXTRACTS FROM THE LAWS OF MINNESOTA.

---

### CRUELTY TOWARD CHILDREN.

A person who tortures or torments, or cruelly, or unlawfully punishes any child under the age of sixteen (16) years, or who commits any act of cruelty toward any such child, is guilty of a misdemeanor; and is punishable by imprisonment in a County Jail for not more than one (1) year, or by a fine of not more than five hundred (\$500) dollars, or by both.

### CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.

A person who over-drives, over-loads, tortures, cruelly beats or neglects, or unjustifiably injures, maims or mutilates, or kills any animal, whether belonging to himself or to another; deprives of necessary food, water or shelter, any animal of which he has charge or control; procures or permits any of the above mentioned acts to be done, is punishable by imprisonment not exceeding three (3) months or a fine of not more than one hundred (\$100) dollars.
